what we are as people of faith. In his letter to the Romans, Paul captures the miracle of baptism. He writes:

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with Him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with Him in a death like His, we shall certainly be united with Him in a resurrection like His. Romans 6:3-5

In baptism, God redefines our entire existence. The language that Paul uses is jarringly specific. Through that water, we become one with the death and burial of Jesus Himself. He literally grafts us into the ultimate act of love, his atoning sacrifice for all of humankind. Jesus' fate

becomes our fate. He rose from the dead, and so will we. Sin and death are put to death. Resurrection becomes our eternal destiny. We are made alive in Christ, and we will rise again.

As we sing following every single baptism, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow." Sing it loud. After all, we have cause to celebrate and rejoice. We're witnessing and participating in something truly extraordinary, the greatest moment of life as we know it in this world. God is transforming death into resurrection. He is turning temporary into forever. He is recreating us as His children, eternal citizens of His kingdom, people of the resurrection.

What's happening in baptism is a miracle in the fullest sense. Never forget the gift of baptism. And join me in praying that God blesses the Lutheran Church of the Resurrection and the Church throughout the world with many more.




The Pig Roast celebration will have a block party feel, with a DJ, a snow cone truck, and games for the kids.

Why Filling the Pews Can Help Keep People Alive

Come to church.

It might help

keep you alive.

t's an utterly depressing term for our era: **Deaths of Despair.** It refers to causes of mortality that include suicide, drug overdoses and deaths from alcohol-related liver disease. None of these are new causes of death. But what has been a trend in the last 30+ years is how much they've risen, and in particular how much they've climbed in a particular demographic: white working-class people.

Could going to church help reverse the rise?

This is not one more oft-heard plea to come to church on Sunday. The question is posed in a recent study by the highly-respected National Bureau of Economic Research (NBER). A recent working paper published by

NBER, and the topic of our Men's Ministry discussion in April, is its title: "Opiates of the Masses? Deaths of Despair and the Decline of American Religion."

The title is a play on Karl Marx's declaration that religion is the "opiate of the masses." But the reality of course is that Marxism is still only operating in a few countries and has failed miserably everywhere, while the tomb very much remains empty.

The NBER study looks at the rise in deaths of despair going back to the late '80s. That time is chosen because the authors say data shows that is when attendance at church in the U.S. began to drop.

And what also was going on then?

The end of "blue laws" which kept most businesses closed on Sunday.

According to the study, it's been a toxic combination. The end of blue laws weakened church attendance. And weaker church attendance has correlated with the increase in depths of despair.

The study further shows that the rise in deaths of despair has not been evenly distributed across the country. States with a high degree of what the authors call "religiosity" have fared relatively well in the rising tide of these sadness-wracked deaths. Those with low numbers have not. (North Dakota has fared particularly well in those comparisons. I wonder what denomination a lot of them are up there?)

Deaths of despair have often been tied to the rise in opioids. And while the authors don't ignore that, they cite other data that shows that deaths of despair

began rising in that period between the end of blue laws and the introduction of OxyContin.

These findings are probably not stunning to the members of Resurrection. We know that the natural state of affairs for many is darkness but that we accept the Light of the World.

But now it's an academic study that gives us a very practical conclusion: Come to church. It might help keep you alive.

Here is part of one of her blessings for the lives we actually have-not the lives we hoped for, not the lives we wished we had, but the in-between of God's perfect heaven, and the challenges of this world:

Let today be a divine exercise in yes... and...

Yes, I have so much to be thankful for, and this hasn't turned out like I thought it would.

Yes, I feel moments of joy, and I have lost more than I could live without.

Yes, I am trying to be brave, and I feel so afraid.

Make me capable of great joy, great love, great risk, even fear. as you expand my heart with this yes... and... today.

The Importance of Play

At Lutheran Preschool, a large part of our day is centered around play. While playing in the classroom, in the gym, or on the playground, the children are constantly learning new skills. Throughout our school day, there is no doubt about it—we learn while we play!

In the classroom, students use toys such as blocks to foster their problemsolving skills. When they work to build a tall tower, they find the right combination to build a sturdy foundation or sort the blocks by color. The students are learning through trial and error and using their creativity and imagination to accomplish their tasks.

Through play, students can strengthen their fine-motor skills in activities such as stringing beads and playing with play dough. On the playground the children work on their gross-motor skills by climbing the stairs, running and jumping on and off the seesaw.

Throughout the school year, we see a tremendous increase in the children's communication skills. The children learn that they need to ask for things in order to share and play with their friends. We teach the children phrases such as, "Can we play together?" and "Can I use that when you are done?" Play helps children learn to work together and aids in the enhancement of their social skills.

It's such a joy watching our little ones grow and learn throughout this school year. We can't wait to see the great things they will accomplish as part of the Lutheran Preschool 4's program next year!

Chances4Children: Haiti Mission Update

esurrection continues to support the feeding program of Chances4Children, (C4C), a Christian organization providing hope for Haitian children and families. Despite political upheaval, gang violence, kidnappings and devaluation of the Haitian currency, C4C continues to serve over 7,000 children, thanks to God and a dedicated Haitian staff.

C4C's mission is taking Haitian communities from survival through stability to sustainability via orphan care, feeding programs, medical/dental care, education, church/community

development, agriculture, and economic programs. The feeding program provides food to 6,400 children in 15 villages, partnering with Feed My Starving Children. Food is received from the docks in Port au Prince or Cape Haitian and trucked to secure locations, then distributed via motorcycles when it is safe to travel.

Our support feeds 500 children in Model, a church community, where they are fed three days a week. For many this is their only reliable food source due to ongoing food insecurity caused by shortages and increasing prices. This also provides jobs for five workers, who transport the food and cook in large vats in the villages, helping provide stability for entire families. In 2019, Sharon Meyer and I had the opportunity to visit Model's church, school and feeding site; assisting with the distribution of these meals.

Pastor Bourdeau (Model) recently sent this message: "Good afternoon, sponsor, supporting our church and children. You all deserve to be thanked for continuing to think about us. We continue to pray to God, so that the insecurity situation can pass away. The feeding program is a big help to the people in the community and the church. The parents have a program where they know their kids are going to eat. We have many who come because

they are very hungry, and the MannaPack is very important. So, in the name of all parents and children, I want to thank you. We will be praying for you for more blessing and grace for you as our supporters. God bless you all."

In August I returned to Haiti, staying at the orphanage/medical clinic compound and interviewed/hired doctors and nurses to

travel to our remote sites to continue necessary medical care. CPR and staff development classes were also taught.

Despite all their travails, the people of Haiti persevere. The latest input from staff and contacts in-country indicate that with God's help, the worst of the political and civil upheaval may soon be ending.
