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Lent 2023: The Countdown Has Begun

n February 22, the Resurrection community joined with Christians throughout the world in observing Ash Wednesday.

At our worship services and throughout the day, people came to take part in one of the most unique practices of people of faith. We received ashes on our foreheads, just as God's people have for thousands of years. The ashes symbolize penitence and mortality, an acknowledgement of our helplessness and need for God's mercy. The ashes are meant to capture the essence of what it means to be "onlv human."

As God tells us in the Biblical Book of Genesis, and as we reminded each other on Ash Wednesday, Remember you were made from dust, and to dust you shall return. As human beings, we are forced to come to grips with the fact that we are in a constant state of deterioration. Our lives in this world are temporary. Our time is short and fleeting.

But Ash Wednesday is ultimately a day of hope. The ashes on our forehead are purposefully made in the shape of a cross. The cross of Jesus Christ is the focal point of Ash Wednesday. The cross is an eternal reminder that Jesus lovingly laid down his life to set us free from sin, death, and all that it means to be "only human."

Ash Wednesday marked the beginning of

the Lenten season, forty days that culminate in the celebration of Jesus rising from the dead, on Easter Sunday. Jesus changed everything for us when He emerged from His tomb that very first Easter morning. He gave us a new life, changing our span of existence from temporary to forever. Just like Jesus, we too will rise again, and we will live forever.

The Lent season begins with a focus on our mortality but concludes with a celebration of our immortality through Jesus.

And the Lenten journey continues throughout this month of March. Lent is meant to be a time of solemn reflection. We are invited to use this time to turn and put our focus squarely on Jesus Christ and His great love for us. He willingly endured suffering and death for our sake. We recognize that we have a tendency to fall away and turn away from God. Our priorities become askew. Our focus turns to so many other things, but often not to God.

But God never stops calling us back. This truth is captured again in God's Word, as recorded by the prophet, Joel: Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and merciful and abounding in steadfast love. In Lent, we give thanks because we remember that God always wants us to return to Him. We turn to the Savior who loves us more than anything, who loves

s many people know, we at Resurrection provide a bimonthly Christian worship service to the residents at the Dominican Village nursing home in Amityville. Over the past two years, we've had the opportunity to spend time getting to know the residents and have had the chance to worship together throughout the month.

Recently, I was speaking to the residents at the Dominican Village, and we were talking about the beginning of the Lenten season. Inevitably, the conversation turned toward a familiar question: "What are you giving up for Lent?" Redeemer-Bronx Gives Thanks

Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran Church in the Bronx has been a long time partner in ministry and recipient of Special Missions donations. Pastor and newly appointed Atlantic District President, Reverend Dr. Dien Ashley Taylor, recently provided this update. Also included is information regarding our Atlantic District support.

hanks be to God for the mission support that Lutheran Church of the Resurrection in Garden City has provided to Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran Church in The Bronx!

Redeemer has been thrilled that the mission dollars have supported our efforts to reach youth with the love of Jesus. Our Youth Catechumenate is in full swing as young people are learning from the Holy Bible and from Luther's Small Catechism as they prepare for baptism and confirmation. Many new youth have been learning to assist in the Liturgies as altar servers. They have sung for worship services and have played handbells and Orff instruments.

Our liturgical dancers also shared their gifts on Christmas Eve (the first time since the pandemic began), and we look forward to their next offering at the end of January. A clothing drive also was conducted with the youth who packed more than 80 yard-size bags of clothing for a neighborhood hospital's outreach to immigrant families. Youth also counted and collated men's underwear products that were collected during Advent for a men's shelter in our neighborhood. The youth also made a nineteen-part video drama that accompanied the in-person Sunday School Christmas program this year; this was the first time that our program had both in-person and pre-recorded video components done exclusively by the young people.

We are excited to share that The Lutheran Church--Missouri Synod has selected Redeemer to be a pilot congregation to field test its "Set Apart to Serve" materials geared at encouraging young people to consider churchwork vocations. Resurrection's support helps Redeemer with these many projects. Redeemer remains profoundly grateful for Resurrection and the partnership we enjoy in Jesus' Name.

An Atlantic District Update:

Lutheran Church of the Resurrection's support of work in and through the LCMS Atlantic District helps the Atlantic District in its mission: "The Atlantic District's congregations, workers, and agencies share God's grace in Christ Jesus to nurture Christians and reach out to others." In doing so, not only have individual congregations received guidance, support, and funds to continue "Engaging the World with the Gospel of Hope" but missionaries have been supported who share the Good News of Jesus with unchurched people.

Baptisms of children, youth, and adults throughout Long Island, New York City, and the rest of the eastern half of New York State proclaim the wonders of God's love in Jesus Christ. Atlantic District missionaries are receiving special training in leadership development and strategic planning for their work.

Two pastoral vacancies have been filled on Long Island (one in Queens and one in Suffolk). The Atlantic District looks forward to hosting the "Festival of Workshops" in March of 2023--the first one since the pandemic began--so that people may be energized with the theme, "Making Disciples for Life."

Resurrection's partnership, support, and prayers continue to help congregations, workers, and agencies in New York to "live loved" by God as we share that love with the world. Thanks be to God for the Lutheran Church of the Resurrection!

Early Literacy

Early literacy skills are essential for a child's success in school. As a parent, there are many ways to help your child develop these skills.

First, read to your child every day. Reading aloud to your child helps them to develop language skills, learn new words and understand the world around them. Make sure to choose books that are ageappropriate and interesting to your child. Let them make choices that they especially enjoy.

Second, talk to your child about the characters, and the pictures. Talking to your child helps them to develop their language skills and better understand the world around them. Ask questions about what they are doing and what they are learning each day. Encourage them to ask questions and express their thoughts and feelings.

Third, provide your child with opportunities to write. Writing helps children to develop their literacy skills and express their thoughts and feelings. Provide them with paper and pencils and encourage them to write stories, draw pictures, practice their letters.

Fourth, encourage your child to explore. Exploring helps children to develop their literacy skills and understand the world around them. Take them to the park, or the zoo. Let them explore and ask questions.

Finally, be patient and encourage learning. Learning new skills can be difficult and frustrating. Be patient and encouraging. Praise them for their efforts and help them to stay motivated.

By following these tips, you can help your child develop their early literacy skills and set them up for success in school.

My brother, Richard, would often be found at the church fixing a plumbing problem or as an usher. As for me, I became more involved in the church when I was blessed with my children, Paula and Sandra. I became a VBS Director, then on to an assistant in the Mommy and Me program, and then church Office Manager, followed by various activities and committees associated with the church after retirement.

I thank God for my home away from home. I often wonder what path would have been laid if not for God by my side.

For as we share abundantly in Christ's sufferings, so through Christ we share abundantly in comfort too. 2 Corinthians 1:5

C.S Lewis, author of the Chronicles of Narnia series, once said, "If you want a religion to make you feel really comfortable, I certainly don't recommend Christianity."

I think C.S Lewis understands what Paul is saying in this verse. We as the fellowship of believers, the church, share in the glory of God through our Lord Jesus Christ. But just as the world hated and rejected our Lord, it likewise rejects His message and His people, the church. To suffer in this world is to imitate Christ, but just as Jesus rose from the dead so will all who trust in Him be raised from the dead and healed from all afflictions and their sins removed from them. That is why Paul writes that we share in Jesus's sufferings, but we also share in His comfort, a comfort beyond any afflictions this world can throw at us.

Any and everything that causes us to suffer will be wiped away, and we will know the true joy and comfort of God when Jesus comes again.

So, like C.S. Lewis says, Christianity is not a religion that will always feel comfortable during our lives, it won't always be easy. But we have the hope of what's coming next—the hope that even when we suffer in our lives we have the comfort of Jesus and the hope in Him.
