# The Conversation Is Ongoing

like to ask questions. I also like to think that, every so often, I come up with good and important questions. Unfortunately, I often have a knack for missing the opportunity to ask my questions.

For example, I'll have a conversation with someone, or I'll attend a meeting, a discussion, or a presentation and a couple of hours afterward I'll think of an important question that I wish I had asked. This happens somewhat frequently. I find myself muttering, "I wish I would have asked that question when I had the chance," or "I wish I had made that point when I had the opportunity."

My sense is that this is not a challenge that

is unique to me. Many of us have been frustrated because we think of the perfect question or important points we wanted to make but have seemingly missed our opportunity.

Over the years, I have learned and frequently used what I believe to be a very important invitation: the conversation is ongoing.

If you come to a worship service, or a Bible class and you hear something that piques your curiosity and has you still thinking the next day. If you attend a meeting or an event and something is not quite clear and leaves you wondering. If you read something in this newsletter or a church email, or you see something around the church and you are in the process of formulating a

Ask me. Ask another person on the staff. Ask a member of the Church Council. We will all do our very best to give you the answer or point you in the right direction. If you ever have ideas or want to discuss anything that's happening or not happen-

ing at Resurrection, let's have the conversation.

Resurrection is more than a congregation, we are a family of faith, united in Christ. Like all families, we aren't always 100% on the same page. Sometimes we need more information or further clarification.

We won't always completely agree about anything and everything. But we all can agree that our common life together is defined by the love and grace of Jesus Christ. As we live in the midst of these exciting times and look forward to more exciting times to come, please remember that the conversation is ongoing.

# Reflect

ast week was the first fall class of the 2023-2024 Confirmation season. We welcomed close to 50 students to come learn, grow, and deepen their understanding of their faith, and who, God willing, will make a public profession of this faith at the end of their 8<sup>th</sup> grade year.

We have a wonderful group of students and a very special

program to offer them. However, one of the challenges of the program is figuring out how to present, and re-present, the same topics to the kids each year, without it being redundant.

... the purpose of the 10

For example, we spend a few weeks each year covering the 10 Commandments, so we must figure out a way to present the same 10 Commandments in a fresh, new, and thought-provoking way in 6th, 7th and 8th grade.

In an effort to do this, I started looking back at my notes from last year, and one word stood out to me: reflect. One way to explain the purpose of the 10 Commandments is to describe them as, among other things, a mirror, which reflects our sins and failures back to us, while also showing us our need for Jesus.

Yet, when I stopped to think about this

ast week was the first fall class of the 2023-2024 Confirmation season. We welcomed close to 50 scribe projecting images outward, while also encouraging us to look inward.

We hear about this in Proverbs 27:19: "As water reflects the face, so one's life reflects the heart." It should be our hope that our lives outwardly project the goodness contained in our hearts, while also allow us to look inwardly, and hon-

estly assess our shortcomings. However, when confronted with the Law, sometimes, this might be more challenging than we would hope.

The Law shows us what we, at times, refuse to see when

we look within ourselves, and the Law projects a different version of how we think our outward self might appear. When we inwardly reflect on our outward image, it's easy to get overwhelmed, and feel as though we constantly come up short. However, it's these reflections that actually remind us of how grateful we should be that Jesus came not to abolish the Law, but to fulfill it, so that, no matter what image we see, we know Jesus' promise of salvation is always there to save us from our own reflection(s).

# Fall, Family Fun



# Thank you, Resurrection!

Pastor Browning and members of the Lutheran Church of the Resurrection:

Grace and peace to you in the holy name of Jesus, who is our resurrection hope.

On the first day of this month Pastor Browning, Vicar Peter Burch, and DCE Michelle Kollmeier trucked into Brooklyn to deliver 450 backpacks and several dozen boxes of school supplies to St. Paul's, in Bushwick. A team of our volunteers met you at St. Paul's, and we enjoyed unloading all of those boxes with you and showing you around our buildings.

It is wondrous to witness the positive "ripple effect" your gift is having here in Brooklyn, and way beyond. I have heard accounts of dozens of backpacks dropped off at family shelters in our communities, and of backpacks going to immigrant families from Yemen. A St. Paul's contact person is shipping some to Guyana, South America. Some members of St. Matthew's, Canarsie are shipping backpacks to Haiti and to Jamaica. A nearby daycare serving low-income families is receiving some of the supplies you sent. Members of both congregations have given the backpacks to neighboring families as a way of reaching out, and saying, "hello" to those with whom they've not yet made contact. "Little children, let us not love in word or talk but in deed and in truth." (1 John 3:18) So we are commanded in the New Testament; your gift is helping us do that locally, and internationally.

On this solemn day when many of us cannot help but remember the evil effects of the terror attacks on our city and nation, it is a blessing for me to think about how God is using your generosity and hard work to help so many hundreds of children and their families. Thank you, in Jesus' name. Your work has, by His grace, borne good fruit!
