During Lent, our congregation collected and delivered items for the Logan County Humane Society, Christian Child Care, Head Start, Home Sweet Home Ministries in Bloomington, and Inner City Mission in Bloomington. The MOH Team thanks everyone who contributed to this Lent Giving project. We also collected books to give away at our table at the Juneteenth celebration this summer. <u>We will continue to</u> <u>collect adult and children's books by and about</u> <u>African-Americans during May and June;</u> you may leave books in the tub at the back of the Sanctuary.

Through its community education and engagement initiative, the MOH Team purchased a sponsorship of CAPCIL's "Cheeseburgers in Paradise" event on April 22 at the Lincoln Banquet Center. A total of twenty folks from First Presbyterian Church attended the event. It was a terrific demonstration of the church's support for this important organization, and a wonderful fellowship activity as well. Also in April, we purchased a sponsorship of the Logan County Pride Festival which will take place downtown on June 3. We encourage you to come out, visit our table, and show support for this event.

Through our direct contributions initiative, we made gifts totaling \$6,500 to the following organizations in April: Logan County Food Pantry, Community Action, and SIU Dental. In May, we will provide direct support of \$2,000 to Kemmerer Village.

Planning for the Summer Food Program is also underway, and First Presbyterian Church will once again participate in this important service.

The UNION CHURCH

Someone recently brought to the church office a postcard showing the old wood framed Presbyterian Church at Union Station (north of Lincoln on Nicholson Road about 8 ¹/₂ miles) in Eminence Township.


After a revival in 1856 led by Rev. Thornton K. Hedges, a congregation was formed in the Union area.* Originally, it was started by individuals of various denominations, eventually becoming a Presbyterian congregation. The Union Church building was built by neighbors from hand hewn logs on ground deeded by Arthur and Henry Quisenberry in 1859. It should be noted that often students from Lincoln College preached and conducted worship services on Sunday mornings. At other times the Pastor of the Lincoln Presbyterian Church or the President of Lincoln College conducted worship services. Sunday School was always an important activity of the church as was the Bethel-Union Missionary Society. The members were the women of the Union Presbyterian Church and the Bethel Christian Church.

In 1925, the Church was renovated, with a brick exterior and a basement at a cost of \$6,000. This building is no longer a church, but it still stands and is in use as a private residence located near the old interurban station in Union.

The congregation of the Union Church united with the First Presbyterian Church of Lincoln on January 9, 1966. The chapel of the First Presbyterian Church was named in honor of the Union Church and its members.

The 2007, *Our Church History, a* sesquicentennial history of our church contains more about the Presbyterian Church of Union. If you are interested in reading more on this subject you can find a copy in the Church Library.

* In 1857 Rev. Hedges became the first Pastor of the Lincoln Cumberland Presbyterian Church. The Cumberland and Old School Presbyterians merged in 1906 forming the First Presbyterian Church of Lincoln.





Kirk Night MAY 2023


