

Message from Pastor Sean

Do you enjoy learning about your family history? It has become a major industry, especially in the United States. The annual revenue of Ancestry.com, a genealogy company, is estimated to be over \$1 billion. They have a new, fantastic slogan: "You have questions, we have ancestors." They are selling the idea that our past tells us something about ourselves today.

As I traveled to England to trace the footsteps of John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, I had the opportunity to learn firsthand that church families aren't any different. Through the powerful movement of God in his own heart, he led a movement that was determined to take this message of grace to all people. At the time, in order to attend church the expectation was to essentially purchase a ticket each week. This simple practice eliminated many people from even being able to hear the good news of Jesus. Following the lead of a friend, Wesley was no longer bound to a church building or service to share Jesus. He began to preach outside, on the streets, in the hills – especially targeting the poor in communities across England. It was precisely because the message of Wesley focused on the grace of God that people of all situations, stations, classes, political standing and otherwise were able to worship together, study together and serve together. The theological truth that God's grace is offered to us and in fact chases us down long before we ever respond to it led the people called Methodists to believe in a faith that drove them to minister in prisons, to visit the sick, to start church in the mines and more.






The social reputation of the Wesleyan movement was not great, because they were going to places they weren't supposed to go. They were loving and sharing grace with people they weren't supposed to. They were viewed as radicals simply because their ministry reflected the actual ministry of Jesus a little bit too much. Because a gospel that changes an eternal destination isn't enough. A message of Jesus that proclaims salvation isn't enough. It's a world transformed by the sacrifice of people who have been radically changed by the love of Jesus. The real evidence that one's heart has been taken over by God's grace is that they share grace with the world! For Methodists, there has never been a time where our faith wasn't about both personal piety (individual faith, devotion, repentance etc) and social holiness (serving the world). This is what led to one of the greatest Christian revivals in the history of the church.

And here's some more good news: if you are reading this letter, this is your heritage. This is your faith DNA. This is what it means to be Methodist – to be radically gracious, ridiculously generous and unreasonably sacrificial for others. If this is our DNA, then our charge is simple: let nothing stop us from chasing others down with grace. A lot has changed in the nearly 300 years since Wesley began the Methodist movement, but somehow, some way, through all of the ups and downs, what hasn't changed is who we are. This has always been us. This will always be us, come what may. It doesn't matter what has happened in the past. It doesn't matter what they say. It doesn't matter what our reputation is. We are going to relentlessly bring hope to the world. Because this isn't just the way of Wesley or the way of a Methodist, but this is the way of Jesus.

Greetings Church Family,

Six years ago, the Freda Ellis Estate fulfilled Freda's desire to help children by donating \$350,000 to our church to manage with the intent of helping to fill the needs of children in our community. At that time the primary focus was to provide coats for area children. For the past 6 years we have been spending the interest generated by this generous donation to purchase coats and distributing them through our church office, area schools and Ozark Action. Fashion trends have changed over the past 6 years as more children are wearing hoodies and other clothing rather than heavy winter coats. Our committee is exploring other ways we could use these funds to fulfill Freida Ellis's wishes to meet the needs of more children in our area. This donation has impacted numerous children in our area, and will continue to do so for many more years.

This summer's heat wave has finally caused two air-conditioning units in the CLC to quit working. Replacing these 30-year-old units will cost \$32,245. In addition, we have a heating/cooling register in the original part of the church that needs to be replaced at a cost of \$4,217. Thanks to the past generous giving by our congregation and conservative spending, we have developed a reserve fund so we can cover these expenses, however they have greatly cut into our reserve. If you would like to make a one-tine donation to help cover these unbudgeted expenses, please include "air conditioning" on your check.

The first phase of our security grant was completed this month with the replacement of the fence around our playground, just in time for preschool. The new fence is taller and stronger than the original fence. Be prepared for more construction projects around church as we work to improve lighting outside the building and improved security within.

Saturday, September 6, your Church Council will hold a planning retreat with the intent of incorporating items discussed during an "Onboarding" session and at the Donuts and Discussion sessions with Pastor Sean. We hope to develop framework where we can plug in ideas with our church's mission of Making Disciples of Jesus Christ for the Transformation of the World.

Since we will hold a planning retreat in September, we will not be holding our regularly scheduled Church Council meeting this month. However, our regularly scheduled Church Council meetings are open to all who are interested. If you have an item, you would like the Council to discuss, please notify the church office at least one week before our meeting. If you would like to attend a meeting, please join us on the second Monday of each month in the Fellowship Hall at 5:30 pm. We remain a church family whose desire is to "Make Disciples of Jesus Christ for the Transformation of the World."
