

The Cruz family will visit every supporting congregation as an expression of their gratitude. The Cruz family will be at all worship services at CTK on Sunday, April 16th and at Community Dinner and worship on Wednesday, April 19th. The family includes Ariac, Andrea, Randy, and Kamil. The Cruz family coincides with a visit from the pastor in residence for Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services (LIRS). Pastor Eric Shafer will both preach and present at Faith Continuum on the weekend of April 15/16. Pastor Shafer travels to Lutheran congregations for the purpose of reinforcing LIRS' Lutheran identity by connecting the plight of contemporary refugees to historic Lutheran values.

Our Prayers Should Be Persistent

Jesus wanted to teach his disciples "about their need to pray always and not to lose heart" (Luke 18:1 NRSV). So he told them two parables, one about a persistent friend (Luke 11:5-8 KJV) and the other about a persistent widow (Luke 18:1-8). The persistent friend came at midnight to ask his friend for bread, which the sleepy friend eventually got up and gave to him because of his importunity. "Importunity" is like persistence, but with a heightened sense of urgency, a shameless boldness, an insistence on having the thing you want. Likewise, the persistent widow repeatedly appeared before an unjust judge, "who neither feared God nor had respect for people," to request justice. The judge initially refused to grant the widow's petition, but later relented because she kept bothering him and wearing him out. Jesus suggested that God will quickly grant justice to his people who "cry to him day and night" (Luke 18:7).

This is the nature of true prayer—to boldly cry out to God for what we need, or for what others need, and to never give up. Such prayer persists in asking even if the thing seems hopeless or impossible. Such prayer is rooted in faith that God hears, God cares, and God is able to do what we ask.

But why, if God intends to answer our prayers, does he sometimes delay? If we pray with faith and confidence the first time, why do we have to repeat ourselves, sometimes for years before an answer comes? Perhaps it is because God wants to cultivate in us the kind of faith that can wait with patience and not become discouraged, that is able to trust God and wait until the time is right. The Bible says that, for God, "a thousand years . . . are like a day that has just gone by" (Psalm 90:4 NIV). Yesterday, today and tomorrow are all the same to God, so from God's perspective, there is no delay in answering our prayers—just the perfect time.

Whatever you are asking from God, persevere and do not give up! Do not lose heart or grow weary no matter how impossible it may seem. Our God is faithful. He has promised to answer persistent prayer, and he does not lie or forget or change his mind (1 Samuel 15:29; Numbers 23:19). We can trust that God will keep his promises to us.

Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer.

Meet the Cruz Family

Extreme instability propelled this young family to risk everything in a harrowing journey from Nicaragua to the United States. Meet Ariac and Andrea Cruz and their young sons, Randy and Kamil.

While Mankato families slept peacefully, cocooned in their beds completely unaware of the brutal cold and record breaking snow to which they would soon awake, Shellee Hintz sat in her living room anxiously awaiting the middle-of-night arrival of her refugee guests. As the hours passed, she wondered, "Am I ready for them? Do I have the right food? Will they be scared? Will we be able to communicate?"

Her special guests had endured a very long and horrific journey from their home country of Nicaragua to America. Promised housing with a family member who had already settled in the United States, the family was devastated when the invitation was withdrawn. Now what? What will happen to us? Where will

we go? Who can help us?

Frantic, they realized that they were literally stranded in an unfamiliar country. The terror of their situation was palpable. It seemed that nobody could help them until they met a kind and gentle social worker. This border employee, on hearing their story, laid the groundwork for them to travel to Minnesota where Shellee and countless other volunteers from five Mankato-based ELCA churches stood ready to help.

At 3 AM, the doorbell rang and in tumbled the exhausted Cruz family.















In the months since the family arrived, there have been many first-time experiences. They have gone sledding in Spring Lake Park and been swimming at the Y. Special family friends took Randy, age 7, to Underwater World at the Mall of America. Dinner at "King Burger" otherwise known as Burger King, has been a big a hit! They marveled at the Kiwanis Christmas lights and absolutely love the snow! Dishwashers, washing machines, furnaces, vacuum cleaners and garage doors mesmerize them! Andrea, of course, wanted to help out in the kitchen but her unfamiliarity with canned goods resulted in a supper of tuna blended with marinara sauce! As Shellee said, "It made for an interesting supper!"

Randy has already started school. He can hardly wait to meet his friends on the playground every morning before school starts. Excited for his very first Valentine's party, he sat at the kitchen table for hours proudly writing out, in Spanish, heart-shaped cards for his classmates. Luckily, the English language is coming easily for him.

The couple found an apartment and Ariac helped the landlord with some renovation work and the painting of the interior walls and ceilings. After looking at several possibilities, they chose this home because Andrea was particularly excited about the huge backyard with lots of space for a garden. They have now moved into their new home.

There are many hurdles that must be overcome before this family can be entirely self-sufficient. The parents need to learn oral and written English, earn their GED's and find employment that brings them joy as well as a livable salary.

A partnership representing Bethlehem, Calvary, Christ the King, Grace and Messiah has pledged to support the Cruz family. As a part of this partnership, we know that you'll want to help and one of the ways to help is financially. In fact, we need your help as our five churches are paying for rent, utilities, food and general day to day living expenses for this family of four until they become self-sufficient. Your prayers, your in-kind and cash donations, your friendship and your support will propel this family to independence. We sincerely thank you.
