Message from Pastor John

I thank my God every time I think of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, thankful for our partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. Philippians 1:3-5

I was ordained into the American Lutheran Church on July 27, 1975 at the church of my childhood – St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Ringsted, Iowa. Ellen and I had been married for four years and had an 8-month-old daughter who was born in Denver, Colorado while we were on internship at Christ the King Lutheran Church.

Today, as we look back over 49 years, we recall how ministry has taken us from Christ the King in Denver to First Lutheran Church in Blair, Nebraska and then on to First Lutheran Church in Milford, Iowa and for the past 28 years here at Christ the King. Along the way we were blessed with another daughter in 1976 and now, we enjoy keeping track of five grandchildren, ranging in age from 17 to 25.

During the past 49 years I did not give a lot of thought to the day that I would end my time as a pastor in active congregational ministry. I came close back in 2014 when I stepped down as the senior pastor here at CTK. You threw a big party for us and said so many nice things. Friends from our past were here and our family sang a special song for us. It was just a wonderful day that we will never forget. A year later, I was back and have been enjoying my role as a Pastor of Senior Ministry ever since.

And now the day has come for me to bring my time at CTK or any other congregation to an end. Several weeks ago, I informed Pastor Melanie of my decision. I have three weddings coming up this summer and that seemed to give impetus in determining an appropriate ending date. On August 17th I will conduct my final wedding as well as bringing to an end the performing of any other pastoral acts such as funerals and baptisms. I will participate in the worship services on Sunday, August 18th and then I will be officially retired.

We will hold in our hearts all of the people whose lives have intersected with ours along the way. Together we have celebrated and together we have suffered. We have studied the Word, been renewed and refreshed with bread and wine, stood together at the font where with water and the Word we have welcomed another worker with us in the Kingdom of God. I've listened to hundreds of couples speak their vows of love to each other, and more times than I can remember I have led family processions down the aisle as we have gathered to commend into God's hands one whom we have loved. What a privilege it has been to share this partnership in the gospel.

I am certain along with Paul that the good work that began here in this place will come to completion when the time is right. In the meantime, I am confident in the ministry of Pastor Melanie. She has a heart for the gospel and the gifts to share it effectively. She knows that faith is a living, daring confidence in God's gift of grace – that grace that is forever the same and that God uses every day to make things new in your life and mine. What a joy it has been to serve together with her and the other members of the staff at CTK.

As we take our leave, we will continue to thank God for you every time we think of you. Ellen and I will hold you in our hearts as we continue – wherever life takes us – in our partnership in the Gospel.

Praying the Creation Psalms

In his book <u>Psalms: the Prayer Book of the Bible</u>, Dietrich Bonhoeffer identifies Psalms 8, 19, 29 and 104 as "creation" psalms. About these psalms, Bonhoeffer writes, "The Scripture proclaims God to be the Creator of heaven and earth. Many Psalms summon us to bring him honor, praise, and thanksgiving. There is, however, no single Psalm which speaks only of the creation. It is always the God who has already revealed himself to his people in his word who is said to be known as the Creator of the world." [Id. page 28]. With that in mind, let's read Psalm 104, a magnificent psalm that honors the Creator.

It is interesting to see how closely Psalm 104 mirrors the creation story found in Genesis 1. Psalm 104 recounts how, in succession, God created light [vs. 1-2]; the heavens (sky) and the waters [vs. 2-4]; the earth, seas and vegetation [vs. 5-18]; the sun, moon and stars [vs. 19-23]; fish and birds [vs. 12, 17 and 25-26]; and, finally, animals and humans [vs. 11, 14-15, 18 and 20-23]. But it doesn't end there. The psalmist declares that God is not only the creator, but also the sustainer, of all life. Every creature is dependent upon God for life and health, and looks to God to "give them their food in due season" [vs. 27]. Thus our lives, and our very breath [vs. 29], are dependent upon God's provision.

As we meditate on the works of this awesome Creator and bountiful Sustainer, we are called to praise and worship: "O Lord, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all; the earth is full of your creatures." [Psalm 104:24]. "May the glory of the Lord endure forever; may the Lord rejoice in his works— who looks on the earth and it trembles, who touches the mountains and they smoke." [vs. 31-32]. The creation brings glory to the Creator by reflecting his glory.

Think of this the next time you see a beautiful sunset, hold a new baby, or experience the buds and blooms of spring. Think of this when you take a deep breath of fresh air, hear the call of a loon, or taste a spoonful of honey. Think of this on April 8th, as you witness the solar eclipse, along with millions of other Americans. Truly, "the heavens are telling the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims his handiwork." [Psalm 19:1].

I will sing to the Lord as long as I live; I will sing praise to my God while I have being. Psalm 104:33

- "<u>Dear Jacob: A Mother's Journey of Hope</u>" by Wetterling & Baker. With stunning detail, Patty Wetterling shares the untold story of the 27-year search beginning in 1989 for her son Jacob and its astonishing conclusion. (Code: B Wet) [NEW]
- "When Winter Came: A Country Doctor's Journey to Fight Flu Pandemic of 1918" by Mary Beth Sartor Obermeyer. Maintain isolation, practice good hygiene, wear a mask, and be kind; prescription comes from Dr. Pierre Sartor, who battled worldwide influenza pandemic in his small town of Titonka, Iowa. (Code: B Sar)[NEW]
- "<u>The Confidante: Untold story of the Woman Who Helped Win WWII and Shape Modern America</u>" by Christopher Gorham. Though Anna Rosenberg emerged from modest immigrant beginnings, with only a high school education, she was the real power behind national policies critical to America winning the war. (Code: B RosGor) [NEW]
- "<u>The Women</u>" by Kristin Hannah. Story of one of many women, who joins the Army Nurse Corps, goes to Vietnam to serve. The real battle lies in coming home to a divided America, to angry protesters and country wanting to forget Vietnam. (Code: F Han) [NEW]
- "Everyday Awakening: Five Practices for Living Fully, Feeling Deeply, and Coming Into Your Heart and Soul" by Catherine Duncan (Code: 248.3 Dun) [NEW]
- "Just Once" by Karen Kingsbury. Irvel Myers, who was recently diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease, and her husband Hank decide to record their love story while they still can! Unknown to her family, she was also a spy in 1940. What a wonder legacy idea for loved ones. (Code: F Kin) [NEW]
- "<u>The Day After Yesterday: Resilience in the Face of Dementia</u>" by Joe Wallace. Portrait & interviews that illustrate the whole story of dementia, not only fear, loss & despair, but also the love, connection, dignity and powerful humanity that always remain. (Code: 616.Wal) [NEW]
- "<u>Could It Be Dementia?</u>" by Morse & Hitchings. This puts dementia into a Christian context, insisting that loss of memory or reason does not mean a person is worthless. (Code: 362.Mor)
- "<u>A Song at Twilight: Of Alzheimer's & Love</u>" by Nancy Paddock. Memoir by MN poet about her parents' descent into the netherworld of Alzheimer's and challenges and choices of care. (Code: 248.Pad)






