Praying the Psalms

Welcome to a new year—2024! This year we are going to focus our study on "praying the Psalms." The book of Psalms, sometimes called the "Psalter," is included in the Old Testament of the Bible and contains 150 chapters or individual psalms. The word "psalm" means a song recited to the accompaniment of a stringed instrument. It is believed that psalms were used in corporate worship in the ancient church, as they are today. The Psalms have been called the "prayer book of the Bible." Thus, we are wise to study and apply them in our life of prayer.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer was a German Lutheran pastor and theologian, who was imprisoned and executed by the Nazis in April of 1945, just days before the end of World War II. He is the author of Psalms: the Prayer Book of the Bible, which will provide a framework for our study this year. Bonhoeffer prayed the Psalms and teaches us to do the same:

"The child learns to speak because his father speaks to him. He learns the speech of his father. So we must learn to speak to God because God has spoken to us and speaks to us. By means of the speech of the Father in heaven, his children learn to speak with him. Repeating God's own words after him, we begin to pray to him. We ought to speak to God and he wants to hear us, not in the false and confused speech of our heart, but in the clear and pure speech which God has spoken to us in Jesus Christ." From Bonhoeffer, D. (1970). Psalms: the Prayer Book of the Bible, Augsburg Publishing House, p. 11.

Jesus also prayed the Psalms, as have many believers down through the ages. Martin Luther, John Wesley, C.S. Lewis and others all knew and prayed the Psalms. Monastic orders regularly recite the Psalms, which become deeply etched into their minds and memories.

This year, I challenge you to incorporate the Psalms into your prayer life. One method is to read and pray one Psalm each day, beginning with Psalm 1 and working your way to Psalm 150. If you do this, you will pray through the entire Psalter twice this year! You will also learn new ways of talking to God, and you will broaden your prayers to include topics you may not otherwise have considered. In coming months in this column, we will examine various types of Psalms as categorized by Dietrich Bonhoeffer.

Evening and morning and at noon I will pray, and cry aloud, And He shall hear my voice.

We can't believe that we're already at the end of Fall Term at MSU-Mankato! We are beyond blessed to have Christ the King Lutheran Church and your volunteers as partners in our ministry to feed the Lord's sheep through our Lunch For-a-Buck program. We were pleased to welcome your volunteers on three separate Tuesdays during Fall Term when they fed a total of 179 people while collecting \$158.01 in donations. In all, five area ELCA congregations combined to serve Lunch For-a-Buck on 15 Tuesdays during the term, feeding a total of 828 people and collecting \$820.84 in donations. This is a substantial increase over 2022, when 448 individuals were served lunch during Fall Term and \$514.81 in donations was collected.

We return on January 7th after the first Service in the Fireside Room with a 6 Sunday series on "Race in America". This series is a continuation of Race studies we started with the Third Reich's view of the world in October. We now take a deeper dive into a topic that is relevant to America's climate today on which our Synod has taken a stand.



We will be led by Dr. Sarah Ruble who authored this series. On the 7th we begin with Race and Slavery in the Atlantic World and Colonial Virgina. On the following five Sundays topics include Christians Race and Nation in New Republic (The Awakening of 1840s), Slavery Debates and the Bible (Fight leading to Civil War), Reconstruction and American Redemption, Civil Rights – Myth and Reality and finally a perspective of where we are today. ADULT GOOD READ NEW BOOKS:

- "The Apple Orchard" by Susan Wiggs. "A powerful story of love, loss, hope and redemption. If you don't believe memories are worth more than money, perhaps you have not made the right kind of memories. Author takes the reader from present to Denmark during WWII to tell story of family ties both old and new." (CODE: F-WIG)
- "The Book of Lost Names" by Kristin Harmel. "Inspired by an astonishing true story from WWII, a young woman with a talent for forgery helps hundreds of Jewish children flee the Nazis in this historical novel. Question is, after 60-years, can children be identified for families?" (CODE: F HAR)
- "The Invisible Wall" by Harry Bernstein. "Memoir written by author at age 93. The 'invisible wall' down center of a narrow Street divided Jewish from Christian families. A story of working class life and religious boundaries that can be overcome by love." (Code: B BER)
- "<u>Sweetbriar Cottage</u>" by Denise Hunter. "Story is full of emotional tension, true to life characters, high stakes, and powerful chemistry blend to tell an emotional story of reconciliation." (CODE: F HUN)
- "The Refuge" by Ann H. Gabhart. "Young couple join Shaker village during a cholera epidemic to stay healthy. With tragic death, pregnant wife has no choice but to stay in this celibate community. Author explores power of love and the bond of family." (CODE: F GAB)
- "<u>The Hideaway</u>" by Lauren K. Denton. "When her grandmother Mags' will wrenches Sara back to her small hometown of Sweet Bay, Alabama, she must face family secrets and difficult choices. The Hideaway is a ramshackle B&B she has been charged to renovate with many surprising challenges." (Code: F DEN)
- "<u>Friendship in the Age of Loneliness</u>" by Adam Smiley Poswolsky. "After months of social distancing and lockdown during COVID, it is clearer than ever that our friendships and social bonds are vital to our health & happiness. Today's digital age reminds us the importance of nurturing old & new friendships." (Code: 248.8 POS)
