### PRAYER CORNER

#### Gospel acclamation prepares worshipers to hear the Good News

In this Prayer Corner, we are examining various parts of the Lutheran liturgy and how we can incorporate them into our personal prayer life. This month we will focus on the "Gospel Acclamation" that is sung just prior to the reading of the Gospel:

#### "Alleluia. Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. Alleluia." [ELW, Setting Four, p. 151.]

According to Merriam-Webster's, an "acclamation" is a loud eager expression of approval, praise or assent. We sing this Acclamation before the reading of the Gospel in order to focus attention on hearing the good news of God's Word. As with all liturgy, the Acclamation points us beyond ourselves to what God has done and is doing.

"Alleluia" is the Greek form of the Hebrew word "Hallelujah," which means "Praise the Lord," and is used to convey adoration, worship, and thanksgiving to God. "Hallelujah" appears primarily in the Psalms, and is prominently featured in the "Hallelujah Psalms" [Psalms 106, 111-113, 135 and 146-150], all of which begin or end with "Hallelujah!" or it's translation, "Praise the Lord!" [Biblehub.com.] In the New Testament, "Hallelujah" is found only in Chapter 19 of the book of Revelation, where it is used to describe heavenly worship.

The remainder of the Acclamation comes from John 6, where Jesus teaches his disciples that he is the "bread of life" and that they must eat his flesh and drink his blood if they want eternal life. This was a hard teaching and many fell away after hearing it.

Jesus asked his 12 disciples if they also wanted to go away. Peter answered him, "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come

to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God." [John 6:69.] Peter recognized that no matter how hard it can be to hear Jesus' words, they were true. No one else who would speak the truth to them and lead them to eternal life.

So it is with us. As Christ-followers, we have come to the same conclusion as Peter, that Christ alone has the words of eternal life. That is why we sing a resounding "Alleluia" before the reading (and hearing) of the Gospel. We praise God that his Word is true and that it is full of life. Remember this the next time you read God's Word on your own. Before you begin, raise a "Hallelujah" and praise God for the gift of Scripture, for the truths contained there, and for the privilege of being able to freely read and study it. Ask God to reveal those truths to you, then read expectantly!

### Pr. Brittany sees ministry excitement at CTK

Pastor Brittany Mailleue loves living in Minnesota because "it's easy to stay active" with her husband, Sam (Pastor at First Lutheran Church in LeSueur), and their two sons, Malcolm (11) and Ian (9). The boys are heavily involved in soccer. They enjoy hiking at the Ney Center in Henderson and Seven Mile Creek Park in St. Peter, as well as disc golf and pickleball. "How can you not love pickleball," she said.

An active church community was also important to Pastor Brittany as she discerned her calling after finishing her coursework at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary this spring. As she spoke with people from the Call Committee, Pastor Brittany saw many engaged and busy social ministries—"ministries aligned with how I think about ministry," she said. She admires the work of Christ the King with refugee families, RIC (Reconciled in Christ), and the free community supper, to name a few. The enthusiasm congregation-wide for social ministries was a draw to Pastor Brittany, "It's easy to serve when people are excited [about doing ministry]," she said.

Pastor Brittany was born in Fort Stewart, Georgia when her father was in the U.S. Army: "I'm an Army brat AND a PK (Pastor's Kid)," she said. She claims her roots in Lincolnton, North Carolina, just northwest of Charlotte. "It's the boring part [of North Carolina]. Not the mountains, not the coast." Her hometown makes Christmas especially attractive with lights and garland along the main downtown street leading to the Lincoln County Courthouse. "It's just beautiful," she said.

The path that brought Pastor Brittany and her family to Minnesota has been far from smooth. Even though both her father (United Church of Christ) and maternal grandfather (Southern Baptist) are both pastors (now retired), it wasn't a foregone conclusion that she would end up in ordained ministry. Her earliest memory of church came from time spent on Sundays with her maternal grandparents' congregation in Huntersville, North Carolina (due north of Charlotte. Grandma had Big Red gum, and her Grandfather Robert Redding was well known for his kid sermons that employed object lessons using a Where's Waldo lunchbox.

While childhood church memories are connected to her family time in the Southern Baptist tradition, Pastor Brittany's faith was forged with the help of German Lutherans on her Father's side of the family at Daniels Lutheran Church in Lincolnton (which celebrated its 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2024). She learned to be an acolyte and studied the Catechism. The influence of the Southern Baptist tradition still influenced her. A call to ministry wasn't considered an option. Pastor Brittany held a variety of jobs while Pastor Sam completed his theological education and began his ordained ministry. She worked at Aldi, managed an organic grocery store, and held various odd jobs, including photography (she earned a B.S. in photography from the Art Institute of Pittsburgh).

Originally, Pastor Brittany considered becoming a deacon. In sorting out her faith story and sense of call, becoming an ordained pastor was the right direction, even though she had to "make a sacrifice to follow the call." The Southern Baptist tradition does not ordain women. "It's not something we discuss (with her mother's side of the family)."

When discussing her theological education, Pastor Brittany loved her church history courses with Dr. McCarver. The history courses both shook and strengthened her faith in that she looked "at all the [awful things] humanity has done in the name of God, and God still loves us and wants us."

Pastor Brittany likes collaborative, team efforts. She is looking forward to working with the people of Christ the King on their ministry efforts and the excitement that brings. That collaborative effort is also growing in her family time. She discussed a new shared hobby with her husband and sons, Dungeons and Dragons. Malcolm and Ian would play every day if they had the opportunity, but it's usually once or

twice per week. Pastor Brittany is trying to teach her sons that part of the fun of the game is the camaraderie between players, "It's a group thing," she tells her sons. "We're on a team!"
