Ask

Our Lenten theme for 2023 is "Ask." The Bible is full of questions. Some questions are rhetorical in nature: "My help comes from the Lord, From where is my help to come?" (Psalm 121). Other questions are inquiries into Jesus' identity and ministry.

This Lent, Pastor Melanie will focus her weekend preaching on questions raised in Lenten scripture readings. On Wednesday, we will have faith reflections on questions from a variety of CTK members, including:

This Lenten series is designed to help us identify our own questions. It is also written to help us grow more comfortable with knowing that questions are a natural and even necessary part of our faith practices. The New Testament alone has approximately 980 questions, most of which are in the gospels. Questions were asked almost constantly throughout Jesus' life and ministry. We often find that our questions change as we encounter different life stages. Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel once declared, "We are closer to God when we are asking questions than when we think we have the answers." May we grow a little closer to God as we delve into our questions of faith.

From the Faith Continuum Coordinator

Lenten Greetings,

At this time of year we take time for self-reflection. "Roots of Our Faith" offers us the opportunity to meditate on the very foundations of our faith. This year Dr.s Darrell Jodock, Mark Tranvik and Leonard Hummell lead our conversations every Sunday of Lent in the Fireside Room right after the first Service.

You may recall Dr. Jodock from last Spring Lenten series. He was with us in January. Darrell is a Professor Emeritus of Gustavas.

We were privileged to spend 2 Sundays last Lenten season with Dr. Tranvik. Mark is currently a Professor at Luther Seminary.

New to us this Lent is Dr. Leonard Hummell. Dr. Hummel is a Chaplain for Allina Hospice at the New Ulm Medical Center. He is a Pastor in our Synod and Professor Emeritus of Pastoral Theology at United Lutheran Seminary of Gettysburg and Philadelphia. In addition to United Seminary Leonard has a teaching history that includes stints at Augustana University and the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago. He is an Editor and Author who has lectured extensively as far away as South Africa and now here with us. Dr. Hummel has an undergraduate degree from Haverford College that was followed up with a Masters from Yale Divinity School and a Ph. D. from Boston University in Religious and Theological Studies.

We started this series on Sunday February 26th with Dr. Jodock leading a 2 Sunday review of the Augsburg Confession. This document is the primary confession of faith of our Lutheran Tradition. Written in 1530 CE, it is one of the most important documents of the Reformation. The second Sunday of this study is upon us on March 5th.

On March 12th and 19th, Dr. Tranvik advances a study of Luther's teachings on the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper and how those teachings of Luther apply for to our life and faith today.

Finally, Dr. Hummell appears at Faith Continuum with the study of Luther's Theology of Consolation for the Suffering. On March 26th the review will be on the theory of Luther's Theology. On Palm Sunday, Dr. Hummell turns our attention to the practice of Luther's Theology.

Our Prayers Should be Definite

As [Jesus] approached Jericho, a blind man was sitting by the roadside begging. When he heard a crowd going by, he asked what was happening. They told him, "Jesus of Nazareth is passing by." Then he shouted, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Those who were in front sternly ordered him to be quiet; but he shouted even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" Jesus stood still and ordered the man to be brought to him; and when he came near, he asked him, "What do you want me to do for you?" He said, "Lord, let me see again." Jesus said to him, "Receive your sight; your faith has saved you." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him, glorifying God; and all the people, when they saw it, praised God. [Luke 18:35-43; see also Mark 10:46-52].

Even before the blind man approached him, Jesus knew that he was blind. And even before the blind man cried out for mercy, Jesus knew what he needed. Yet Jesus did not immediately heal the man and restore his sight. Rather, Jesus asked him, "What do you want me to do for you?" Only then did the blind man articulate exactly what he wanted—to see again. Jesus wanted to hear from his own lips, not just a general petition for mercy, but a specific prayer for healing. Why?

It is easy to believe in God's mercy. In crying out for Jesus to "have mercy on me," the blind man appealed to God's nature as loving and merciful. But did the blind man really believe that God's mercy extended to healing his vision? Jesus needed to know. When the blind man specifically asked Jesus to restore his eyesight, he publicly declared his faith in Jesus' power and ability to heal, and he was healed, causing all the people to praise and glorify God. Everyone could see that the blind man's prayer had been answered, because it was definite and measurable.

Like the blind man, we are oftentimes too timid in prayer. Instead of asking God for healing, we ask for peace and comfort to endure our illness. We throw up general prayers for world peace, but do not target specific strongholds of evil that are causing unrest. We ask God to provide for our needs, but neglect to mention the unforeseen medical bill we don't know how to pay. Doesn't God already know what we need? Won't God answer these prayers if it is his will to do so? Maybe, but it seems that God wants us to exercise our faith and be more definite when we pray—to go "out on a limb" so to speak. God needs to know that we believe he is able to do the impossible [Matthew 19:26]. If we don't, maybe we should first ask God for more faith so that we can believe.


FEATURED BOOKS IN CHILDREN'S 'READING NOOK'

Reconciling in Christ Task Force

Greeting Members of Christ the King,

Over a year ago, the Justice and Peace Commission asked the church council if we could begin the discussion about becoming a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation. We had one-on-one conversations with council members and church staff and discussed opportunities to be more welcoming and inclusive of more people. We hear often that Christ the King "is welcoming" and "it feels like home!" And yet, there are people who visit CTK on a Sunday or Wednesday or for another event, but they don't come back. We are a large church but we look very homogeneous. Is there something we could learn that might help this special place feel "like home" to more people?

Justice and Peace thinks that we can do this by beginning the process of becoming a Reconciling in Christ congregation. Reconciling in Christ (RIC) is the designation that Lutheran churches might seek to help communicate their desire to welcome and fully include the LGBTQ+ community in their Christian community. RIC is part of the organization called ReconcilingWorks, which is an independent Lutheran organization that works collaboratively with the ELCA. While many people in the LGBTQ+ community seek this designation when looking for a church home, we've learned that this designation can communicate a broader message to people of other marginalized groups: YOU ARE welcome here.

The RIC process includes congregational dialogue and learning, which Justice and Peace feels can only improve our church community and inform us of other ways we can continue to "know Christ and make Christ known."

We are now at the point where we feel we can begin looking for people to help lead the congregation through the RIC journey.
