

# Campus Cuphoard Thanks You!



In the spring of 2005, Jim Miller, a Native spiritual leader and Vietnam veteran, found himself in a dream riding on horseback across the great plains of South Dakota. Just before he awoke, he arrived at a riverbank in Minnesota and saw 38 of his Dakota ancestors hanged. At the time, Jim knew nothing of the largest mass execution in United States history, ordered by Abraham Lincoln on December 26, 1862. "When you have dreams, you know when they come from the creator... As any recovered alcoholic, I made believe that I didn't get it. I tried to put it out of my mind, yet it's one of those dreams that bothers you night and day."

Now, four years later, embracing the message of the dream, Jim and a group of riders retrace the 330-mile route of his dream on horseback from Lower Brule, South Dakota to Mankato, Minnesota to arrive at the hanging site on the anniversary of the execution. "We can't blame the wasichus anymore. We're doing it to ourselves. We're selling drugs. We're killing our own people. That's what this ride is about, is healing." This is the story of their journey- the blizzards they endure, the Native and Non-Native communities that house and feed them along the way, and the dark history they are beginning to wipe away.

#### **Pray the Word of God**

Jesus was passionate about God's Word. He knew the Scriptures well and quoted them often in sermons, conversations with his friends and debates with his antagonists. For example, when Satan tempted Jesus in the wilderness, Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Get out of here, Satan" . . . [f]or the Scriptures say, 'You must worship the Lord your God and serve only him.'" [Matthew 4:10, quoting Deuteronomy 6:13 (NLT)]. Satan skedaddled, because he was powerless against God's Word.

"If we wish to pray with confidence and gladness, then the words of Holy Scripture must be the solid basis of our prayer. For here we know that Jesus Christ, the Word of God, teaches us to pray. The words which come from God become, then, the steps on which we find our way to God." These words were written by Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a German Lutheran pastor and theologian who taught himself to pray the Psalms. Bonhoeffer became a powerful witness during his years of imprisonment in Nazi Germany, and after his execution in April of 1945, just days before World War II ended in Europe. Quote from: Bonhoeffer, D. (1970). Psalms: the Prayer Book of the Bible, Augsburg Publishing House.

Scripture itself encourages us to use God's Word as part of our spiritual armor, for protection. "Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God." [Ephesians 6:17]. This means that, when we pray, we can wield the sword of the Spirit, by incorporating words of Scripture into our prayers, and thus pray in agreement with what God has already said. We know that "[e]very word of the Lord proves true" [Proverbs 30:5], and that "in [Jesus] every one of God's promises is a "Yes" [2 Corinthians 1:20]. Thus, when we pray the Scriptures, we can pray, as Bonhoeffer did, with "confidence and gladness" that God will hear and answer us.

So, for example, if we are praying for healing, we might lean on **Psalm 103**: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and do not forget all his benefits—who forgives all your iniquity, who heals all your diseases" (vs 2-3); **Psalm 147**: "He heals the brokenhearted, and binds up their wounds" (vs 3); **Jeremiah 17**: "Heal me, O Lord, and I shall be healed; save me, and I shall be saved; for you are my praise" (vs 14); **Mark 6**: "And wherever [Jesus] went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the marketplaces, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed" (vs 56); or **John 10**: "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly" (vs 10). The overwhelming message of these verses is that God is the healer and God wants to heal. By referencing and claiming these verses, and others that come to mind, we can pray with confidence and even joy, knowing that God hears us and wants us to be healed. This same method can be used to pray the Word of God for any prayer topic.
















#### **BOOKS FOR CHILDREN** [Use Code: Letters to find books]


