Pray for Laborers for the Harvest

As noted earlier in this column, there are only a few times in the Bible where Jesus instructs his followers to pray for something specific. In July we examined Jesus' admonition to pray for our persecutors. This month we will focus on praying for laborers for God's kingdom.

Jesus said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." [Matthew 9:37-38 NRSV]. Other translations of the Bible say to "pray earnestly" [ESV] or to "plead" [NASB] with the Lord of the harvest for laborers. Why is this necessary? Because, just like any farmer, God needs help to bring in the harvest of souls. Jesus observed that the harvest is plentiful, and the "fields are ripe for harvesting." [John 4:35].

This is as true in our day as it was then. Not all of God's children have been "safely gathered in," in the words of the great hymn, "Come Ye Thankful People, Come." According to a 2018 StarTribune article[1]:

- ELCA baptisms have plunged 40% since 2000;
- 1 in 5 Americans report no church membership;
- 1 in 4 ELCA congregations can no longer afford a pastor;
- Since 2010, 3,661 ELCA pastors have retired, and only 2,241 were ordained.

Have you prayed earnestly for the Lord of the harvest to send more workers into the harvest field? If not, I encourage you to start today. We need more pastors, yes, but we also need more on-fire apostles, prophets, evangelists and teachers [Ephesians 4:11]. Isn't it possible that the reason we are short of pastors is that we have not been doing a very good job of making disciples? Every pastor either is raised in a church -or- is a new convert to the faith. The fewer people we have coming to faith in Christ, the fewer people we have to send to seminary.

God's harvest is ready. God's harvest is ripe for the picking. It is God's harvest, not ours, and God will provide the laborers, if only we will ask. Jesus commanded us to do this, so we should not neglect our responsibility. And while we are at it, let's not forget to thank God for the laborers he has already provided to us—our current pastors, teachers and other volunteers. They are carrying a heavy load right now while we wait for more laborers to come and join their ranks. Amen!




BOOKS IN CHILDREN'S 'READING NOOK' [Use Code: Letters to find books]



We have so much on our plate that I will highlight this month's and next month's presentations so you can mark them on your calendar. All of the Fall engagements are "etched in stone"!

- 09/10 Marlin Spangrud and Jim Armbruster will provide an update on the Constitution Amendments. I will make a very, very short offering on what is upcoming in Faith Continuum.
- 09/17 Kristin Odland is back and bringing International Students with her. They will be sharing on The "Friendship Family Program" at MSUM and our opportunity to connect with Students from abroad. - 09/24 Matt Norland and Paul Moosebrugger appear before us. Matt presents on our Endowment Fund and offering a legacy to CtK. Paul, an area attorney with the Farish Firm, shows us how to document the Endowment Fund in our wills and trusts.
- 10/01 Our Treasurer, David Krause leads a discussion on Stewardship of all variety. Too, he will help all in attendance read and understand the Treasurer's Report as we see it Monthly and Annually.
- 10/08 Ctk Member and Retired Pastor Richard Salge takes us on a journey with slides through Martin Luther's Germany. It offers a perspective of Luther's locations where our Lutheran tradition began.
- 10/15 Pastor Salge returns to introduce the "Confessing Church" that took on Nazism in Hitler's Germany.
- 10/22 Pastor Salge provides intriguing perspective on two Pastors of the Confessing Church. One was martyred in April of 1945 (Dietrich Bonhoeffer) and the other is Mary Salge's father (Dr. Walter G. Tillmanns 1913 1966).

Kitchen Cafamity on Campus!

Students have returned to campus! Crossroads Lutheran Campus Ministries is location just across the street from Minnesota State University, Mankato. The increased activity of students returning to campus has been exhilarating. Along with that has been an influx of students registering for use of the Campus Cupboard Food Pantry located at Crossroads and run by volunteers from area ELCA churches. The increased costs of tuition, books, rent, and utilities has resulted in increased food insecurity among university students. Campus Cupboard is available to students attending any campus in Mankato. Word has quickly spread about Campus Cupboard.

Campus Cupboard has recently relocated and expanded from the basement of Crossroads to the main level. Volunteers at Campus Cupboard are enjoying students' reactions to their new and improved shopping experience. We've enjoyed meeting and greeting students new to campus as well as our returning student shoppers. While doing so, we have made a discovery that we are sure you can impact.

The Justice and Peace Commission has learned from Campus Cupboard volunteer staff that international students don't arrive on campus with their families and a truckload of furnishing. Many times, they enter an empty apartment and slowly accumulate furnishings left behind when others move. It has come to our attention that while these students have Campus Cupboard to help defray the cost of groceries, they are without everyday essentials that are more difficult to acquire. Plates, cups, bowls, glasses, silverware, cutlery, kitchen utensils, and cookware are greatly needed. Do you or someone you know have a box containing dishes given by friends or relatives who no longer needed them? We would be happy to accept those donations and get them to students in need of them. We also have students who have asked if there might be kitchen tables and chairs available in the community to eat meals and to study.
