Dear Parish Family,

It's hard to believe, but I have wrapped up my first month as your new Rector! This month flew by, and I must say that every day here at St. Matthias' has been a joy and a blessing. I've learned so much already, and I look forward to continuing to serve and get to know you all. I don't think I have the words to say how grateful I am to have your love and support as I learn the ropes here.

This has been a time of transition and settling in, as you all know. A big part of that process has entailed my getting used to the daily and weekly rhythm of life at our parish and adjusting my own routines to life here, which has included figuring out when to take a little time off each week.

As many (perhaps most) of you know, I have an eleven-year-old daughter, Annie. Though I did not want it to happen, Annie's mother and I divorced in 2019. The marriage was annulled in 2020 by Bishop Reed, who found that it was not a sacramentally valid marriage (so if you ever see me out on the town with a woman, you will know Bishop Reed gave his blessing!). Because of this situation, I get to have Annie stay with me every other weekend. Here is where this relates to my time off: I plan to take alternating days off each week, between Fridays and Saturdays. On weekends when I do not have Annie with me, I will usually take Fridays off. On weekends when I do have Annie with me, I will take Saturdays off - that way, I can have a full day with her during the weekend.

Of course, it should go without saying, but I will say it anyway - if you have a pastoral emergency, please do not hesitate to contact me even "after office hours" or on my day off. I accepted this call as your Father in God knowing that I must be available 24/7. Unless I am physically unable to do so (because of distance during times when I am traveling or, God forbid, because of physical illness or injury on my part), I will do all that I can to be at your side when I am needed. This is a sacred duty which I embrace and take seriously. If it is physically impossible for me to attend to your need, I will arrange for another priest to care for you.

Finally, I'd like to offer a note of encouragement to you all. There has been so much darkness manifesting itself in the world lately that it can be easy to become distracted, discouraged, or even fearful-like St. Peter taking his eyes off the Lord as he was walking on water in the midst of a storm. We are living in a time when nothing less than the fullness of the Catholic Christian faith will do if we are to face these troubles and overcome them.

As we move into the month of October, I cannot help but remember that on October 3rd, we will celebrate the Feast of St. Therese of Lisieux. Part of the spiritual genius of St. Therese, and why she is rightly honored as a Doctor of the Church, is her childlike trust in our Heavenly Father. In her great humility, St. Therese saw herself as too small and too weak to accomplish the tasks that were set before her in her vocation. Instead of seeing this and doing nothing or trying in her own strength to overcome the obstacles in her way, she chose to radically abandon herself to our Father's love. She saw herself as a child reaching up to her Father, asking Him to pick her up and elevate her to where she needed to be, carrying her over the obstacles in her path. And pick her up and elevate her, God the Father truly did.

As we move into this new month, I encourage you all to join me in asking ourselves how we can more deeply commit our lives to God. What is it that God is calling us to do or to turn over to Him? How can we imitate St. Therese in her beautiful childlike trust in our loving Father, regardless of what troubles we may be experiencing?

May our Lady Mary, our Patron Matthias, St. Therese of Lisieux, and all the saints pray for us.





For nearly a thousand years, Christians have made pilgrimage to this holy place, desiring to encounter the Lord who was born of Blessed Mary. Known as "England's Nazareth," the modern Anglican Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham has a fascinating history and continues to be the site of many healings, miracles, conversions, and renewal.
