

More 2025 Deacon Highlights

In my December article, I outlined the ministries for which our deacons are responsible. I saved the most important one for my article this month.

Many Presbyterian churches assign pastoral care responsibilities to the deacons. This takes different forms, often depending on local traditions.

When I arrived here at CPC in late 2017, every member of the church was assigned to a Care Community which was under the care of a deacon. The goal was for each deacon to make regular contact with each member of his or her Care Community to assess needs and to contact the pastors if necessary.

The Care Community model served us well until shortly after we began to emerge from the COVID-19 lockdown. Changes in the size of the deacon board and church membership made it necessary for us to reevaluate how best to respond to the spiritual needs of the church. Our solution was to develop a team of deacons who are passionate about spiritual care to assist the pastors with visits and other forms of contact.

This is a work in progress, but we hope to have it fully functional in the next few months. Once complete, we will share the names of the team members and their contact information in the newsletter, bulletin, and e-blast.

We ask for your prayers and your patience as we work to improve this aspect of the deacon's ministry.

As we begin a new year together, we are filled with gratitude for the faithfulness and generosity of the CPC family. Our recent Stewardship season was a great start as we look toward the future God is calling us to build together.

We are excited to share that nearly two-thirds of participating households increased their gift intentions for the coming year. Prayer Corner

PRAYER IS "BEING A FRIEND IN THE MIDDLE"

The words, spoken with a heavy southern drawl, still ring in my mind. My good friend Dr. Wilson Benton proclaimed. "We are to be friends in the middle in the middle of the night!" That was the interpretation of prayer, based on Luke 11:5-13.

In that passage Jesus tells us that prayer is like friend in the middle. A person opens his home at midnight to a hungry friend who has been on a long journey. Out of courtesy the friend must feed this traveler, but there is no bread in his home. So he goes to the house of a wealthy friend who surely has bread, knocks hard on the door, and wakes him from a deep sleep, shouting that he needs bread. The wealthy friend is irritated and tries to send the noisy neighbor away, but the man continues shouting. Finally, the wealthy friend has no choice but to get up and give some bread to the man and send him on his way. This is a parable about prayer, for it tells of our position in relation to the needs of the world, our inability to meet those needs, and our link to the One who can meet them.

The needs. The friend in the middleman, was compelled to act. He could not ignore his friend's need for food. Not only did he have to be hospitable, but apparently, he was moved by his friend's need. He felt so deeply about it that he did not want to leave it till morning. It was something he had to act on right away,

People who pray have developed not only a relationship with the Father but also a deep sense of the needs in their Father's world. They see these needs with broken and compassionate hearts.

Harold Lindsell observed at Billy Graham's 25th anniversary of crusade Ministry that the measure of spiritual maturity is not in the heights of ecstasy Christians achieve in worship but rather in the pain of a broken heart over the agony and needs of the world.

Lindsell urged the audience to join the company of the brokenhearted and to stand with Jesus as He wept over Jerusalem. A person who is in a living prayer relationship with God is also in a living, painful relationship with the world! It is impossible to be in good standing with God without seeing around us the heartaches that God sees.

Our inability to meet the needs. Why do we so often look away from the needs around us? Because we are unable to meet those needs. In Acts 3:1-10 Peter and John looked a lame beggar straight in the eye; they could look at his need because they knew what to do about it. They knew that in themselves they couldn't meet the man's need. That they knew they could take it to God and that the power of Jesus' name could heal him.

How often do you look away from the family quarreling down the street or the problems of your inner city because you have little confidence in your relationship with the Source of all blessings? We are crippled not only in our inability to meet needs but also by our lack of faith that God will meet those needs. And much of the time we don't bring those needs to Him in prayer.

Prayer Corner


The joy and excitement of being a follower of Christ is found right here: in being able to look at the needs of the world and to know you have something significant to give toward every single need!

Knowing Who can meet the needs. The middleman gave what he had - namely, his relationship to his wealthy friend. He went to the wealthy friend in urgency knowing that the need had to be met, confident that this person had bread and would share it.

Near my home is an inner-city apartment complex of a hundred units. They are filled mainly with fatherless families and illegal immigrants. Crime was so high that the police responded to fifteen calls there every day.

But seven senior women in a neighboring church decided to become "friends in the middle" by praying for that housing complex. They began intensive prayer, and as a result, two years later, the police reported less than fifteen calls for an entire summer! Much happened, of course, to bring about this amazing answer to prayer, but it was the "friends in the middle" in the form of seven elderly women who started the flow of blessings. They could never minister on-site in such a situation, but they could pray.

MEDITATE: Prayer is a dependent relationship in which we are empowered and enfolded into God and in which we link the needs to God's infinite resources.


