

A TALE OF TWO EMPIRES AND TWO PARADES

Most of us who have been in the church are familiar with the parade Jesus threw

as he entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. Throngs of pilgrims and denizens of Jerusalem lined the street as he entered into the city that day. Though the Gospels don't say definitively, Jesus probably entered Jerusalem on the east side of the city through the gates immediately adjacent to the Temple complex. That gate was important since the city of Jerusalem, a walled city, was rather small, so many of the pilgrims camped on the hillsides east of the city; that's also where the Mount of Olives is located. And the detail that we all remember is that Jesus came riding into the city riding on a donkey. What the Gospels don't tell you is that Jesus wasn't the only one riding in a parade that day.

Passover was always a tense time in Jerusalem in the first century—in fact it's still a tense time in the 21st century. And with present circumstances between Israel and Gaza, I can only imagine how tense things will be this year. The population of Jerusalem always explodes as pilgrims flood to the city for worship, and in Jesus' time diverse factions got hot under the collar so extra security was always needed. In the first century, Pontius Pilate, the Roman Governor of Judaea, lived in Caesarea, a relatively new construction city on the Mediterranean coast where he enjoyed sea breezes, fresh fish and cooler temperatures. Pilate only came to Jerusalem when he had to, and he never came alone. Coming from the west side of the city, Pilate would have ridden into the city with a garrison of Roman soldiers to keep the peace and defuse any threat of rebellion.

The contrast between the two parades must have been stark. Jesus rode in on a donkey; the Romans came in with a cavalcade of war horses. Jesus came with people cheering his arrival; Pilate arrive to muted jeers or silence from the horrified crowd. Jesus arrived with palm branches and clothing spread on the path before him; Pilate arrive with creaking leather, festooned banners, weapons, and intimidation. Pilate arrived with a show of force and power; Jesus came, meek and mild.

At first glance it seems like Jesus didn't know what he was doing. Riding in on a donkey that had never been ridden before, I can only imagine that the poor colt was a less than willing participant. When you dig into the details, it all seems a little ridiculous. But when we put this in context of Good Friday and Easter Sunday, it makes perfect sense.

The humiliation that Jesus endured on Good Friday is foreshadowed in the humility of Palm Sunday. The Romans believed that empires were built with force and intimidation. Many of the Jews of the First Century believed their kingdom had to be forged in the fires of a violent overthrow. Nations and governments have enforced their will with a big stick and a harsh hand. Jesus knew that if his Kingdom was induced through any of these means, it would one day fall prey to another overwhelming force. So rather than a kingdom that thrived on blood and death, he gave his blood that we might live.

The drama of holy week happens so fast; as a child I always wondered how things went south so quickly from the triumphal entry to Good Friday. I encourage you to be attentive through this next week as the reality of Christ's Kingdom is forged in the fires of crucifixion and resurrection. As we prepare for Holy Week and the drama that unfolds, let us keep our eyes and hearts open to witness Christ's humility, and what that means for how we use our power in our relationships.
