DIGGING DEEPER:

1. King David is credited with writing most of the Psalms. Discuss the question, "Who is King David?". If you have a resource you can read to the kids to spur conversation, then use it. If not, you can try this link for some help: <https://christiananswers.net/dictionary/david.html>
2. Pastor Jim said the Lord displays His glory through children. Why did he say that? What do you think? How does that affect the way you live your life?
3. Psalm 8 speaks of the glory and greatness of God. Spend some time going around and sharing ways that you have seen the glory and greatness of God.

Lord, our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth! Psalm 8 begins and ends with the same reminder... God is AWESOME! It is such a wonderful truth to hear God give a special place of importance to the children. This reminder is given in Matthew 21: 16, "From the lips of children and infants you, Lord, have called forth your praise." I remember growing up and hearing lyrics to a song that stuck with me to this day. The title of the song was, *Even the Praise Comes From You*.

When we understand how everything good and holy comes from God (even the praise), then we begin to have a right perspective about God and our place in His creation. Help your kids think through 1) what they are thankful for and 2) what God has put "under their feet" (Psalm 8:6).

ACTIVITY:

Start by reading Psalm 8 as a family:

As you go through the Psalm, have a signal for the kids to make (like a time-out signal → *a T with your hands*) every time they hear a truth about who God is, or what God is like, or what God has done. Each time you take a time-out, briefly talk about that characteristic of God.

After you go through the Psalm focus on these questions/thoughts:

- (1) What has God done?
- (2) Who does God want to praise Him?
- (3) Why should we praise God? Have one of the kids read Revelation 4:11 as a reminder of why God deserves all of our praise.
