



## Pastor's Letter

Rev. Jeremiah Johnson

### *Six Chief Parts*

You're probably noticed two new pieces of artwork up in the narthex. Art has two interrelated functions: to be beautiful and to mean stuff. Since beauty can be a little harder to articulate, I'm unapologetically going to take the easier road and provide a short explanation to what these pieces mean.

The print on the right side as you enter the narthex is called *Six Chief Parts* by Edward Riojas. As you probably guessed, it represents the six chief parts of the Catechism arranged on the cross. I will comment on each symbol, starting in the center, from top to bottom, then the shell on the right and the cup and host on the left.

**Censer:** From ancient times, incense has been used in conjunction with worship to represent prayer. As the smoke from the incense wafted towards heaven, so the prayers of the saints are lifted towards our heavenly Father. This particular censer represents the Lord's Prayer.

**Triangle woven with a circle:** The triangle represents the Trinity, and the circle represents the unity of God. So the two together here stand as the symbol of the Apostles' Creed, which confesses our God, three in one.

**Tablets:** These represent the stone tablets on which the ten commandments were written. They are marked with the first ten letters of the Hebrew alphabet, which double as their numbers. The first table, 1-3 are on the right, and the second table, 4-10 are on the left.

**Keys:** These represent the Office of the Keys, the authority which Christ gave to His church to bind and loose sins. Note that the notch of the key is in the shape of the cross. The Church has no authority to bind or forgive sins apart from the cross.

**Shell:** This is the ancient symbol for baptism. the three drops of water represent the triune name given at baptism: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

**Cup and bread:** These represent the Lord's Supper. The chi-rho symbol (looks like a P with an x on it), the symbol for Christ, is on the bread as a confession that the bread and wine *are* the body and blood of Christ.



The symbols representing the six chief parts are organized on the cross because they are not somehow disconnected bits of doctrine, but the cross is their life life and locus. Without the cross, there would be no prayer, no sacraments, no Creed, and the commandments could only and ever be an accusing voice against us. But through the cross and the resurrection, the chief parts bear much fruit in our lives, as depicted in the verdant leaves and the rich, ripe grapes springing from them. For Christ is the true vine, and we are the branches; in him we bear much fruit.

That took a little longer than I anticipated, so the explanation of the triptych on the opposite wall will have to wait until next month. Until then, take a look for yourself. Good art only gets better with deeper use and contemplation.

---

### **The Epiphany of Our Lord**

**January 6, 2019**

**Matthew 2:1-12**

“Epiphany” means a sudden or great revelation, but it doesn't seem like the Magi or anyone else in the story has a clue. The Magi come to the wrong town, asking for directions. Herod is caught totally unawares of this new rival to his throne. And even though the religious leaders know where to find Jesus, they don't seem one bit excited by the Messiah's arrival. The festival of Epiphany seems more like an occasion for human confusion.

But the strangeness of it all only underscores the point; today is a *divine* epiphany. The way that God works in the world does not conform to our expectations. It should not be surprising that Herod, the religious leaders, and even the magi were confused. For God's work must be *revealed* to us. Our ways and expectations must be unlearned and conformed to His. And today is just the beginning.

### **The Baptism of Our Lord**

**January 13, 2019**

**Luke 3:15-22**

**“Pondering the One Who Pleases!”**

*“Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heavens were opened, and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily form, like a dove; and a voice came from heaven, “You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased.”* When Jesus entered the water, He brought the whole trinity into the water with Him. The Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit are present because it's never One apart from the Other. Now, Holy Baptism is the place where man meets God and God meets man, because Jesus is in the water. This is where Holy Baptism gets its power to do what it promises to do. Baptism would never have the power to actually purify sinners by the forgiveness of sins unless the One who ‘takes away the sin of the world’ is in the water. But now that Jesus has entered Baptism. You are IN the one who pleases the Father, so He is well pleased with you!

## 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday after the Epiphany

January 20, 2019

John 2:1-11

### “The Divine Glory Is Manifested in the Signs of Christ!”

When Jesus turned water into wine at the wedding in Cana, it was “*the first of his signs,*” by which He “*manifested his glory*” (John 2:11). It pointed to His coming “*hour,*” when He was lifted up on the cross for the forgiveness of sins and the life of the world (John 2:4; 12:23–32). The glory of the cross is incomprehensible apart from the Word and Spirit of God, but disciples of Jesus recognize that glory in the signs of His Gospel, and so they believe in Him. Jesus does not wait for His disciples to discover Him on their own, but He seeks out the forsaken and the desolate and unites them to Himself. He adorns them with His own beautiful righteousness and delights in them “*as the bridegroom rejoices over the bride*” (Is. 62:4–5). Purified by the washing of water with His Word in Holy Baptism, His disciples confess that “*Jesus is Lord,*” and they return thanks to Him “*in the Holy Spirit*” (1 Cor. 12:3) as they drink the good wine that He pours out for them, which is the new testament in His blood.

## 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday after the Epiphany

January 27, 2019

Luke 4:16-30

It's quite an unflattering scene: He's nearly killed by the people he grew up with.

Still early in his three-year ministry, Jesus comes to his own hometown synagogue to preach. He reads a portion from Isaiah that describes a divine servant is appointed to set Israel free and restore them to their own land. After Jesus was finished reading, he said, “It's me.”

But the people couldn't believe it. They knew his family. They watched him grow up. It couldn't be Jesus. But when Jesus called them out for their obstinacy, they were ready to kill him. “A prophet is not without honor except in his own hometown.”

### Summary of Results:

- General offerings are \$(15.2)k unfavorable to budget for the month and are \$(18.7)k unfavorable YTD 2018.
- Other Income is \$11.5k favorable YTD driven by memorial donations of \$6.5k in May and \$3.5k in April.
- Silent Auction Receipts (MissionFest) are \$1.2k favorable YTD as additional pledges were received in the current month.
- Education YTD expenses are unfavorable to budget due to VBS expenses and slightly higher day school tuition.
- G&A expenses are unfavorable in the current month and YTD due to additional expenditures for supplies.
- Mission expenses are higher than budgeted due to additional travel costs for Mexico Mission trip.
- Occupancy expense is favorable YTD due to the budget including mortgage interest expense and depreciation expense on the new building. Building depreciation and mortgage interest expense commenced in the month of October.
- Pastoral expenses are trending favorable due to favorable health reimbursements and timing of incurred health claims.
- Non-cash depreciation expense is included in the "Occupancy" expense line item above. Total YTD Depreciation expense was \$59.4k. See cash basis net income presented above, as well as overall cash position in the statement of cash flows.
