## DIAKONIA MUSINGS

As the Arch Deacon, I have been meeting with deacons from the dioceses of NWP, NIAGARA, Canada, and WNY. We began zooming once a week in June and get together every Monday. I had hoped to help everyone feel connected during isolation, but we have moved beyond that and have formed a community that supports, challenges, and defines who and what we do as deacons. Each week we open with prayer and share what is happening in our parishes or dioceses. Then we move into reflecting about who we are and what we are based on biblical, traditional, cultural, and personal perspectives. I had questions or a piece of scripture prepared in the beginning and now that we know each other better, anyone with a thought is comfortable starting the discussion. It goes where it needs to.

Our roles are changing as the church is being redefined and transformed. As we continue our discussions, we have become very excited about the future of the church and the role it plays in the world. It is wonderful to talk theologically with like minded people and is grounding my calling.

It makes me aware of the fact that we all need that kind of community and support; a small group of people that have similar skills, and that can grow together over time.

So my challenge for you is to think about the people you can call your "people," your "tribe," and make an effort to connect and communicate with them as part of your spiritual routine or discipline. If cooking brings you together, that community of like minded people can begin to open up to growing spiritually together, through a time of biblical or theological reflection. Maybe you can find a book to read together, or talk about ways recipes in your families reflect the spiritual values your grandma had. It doesn't matter where you start, just try doing it as a spiritual discipline with the goal of supporting each other and looking to each other for insights. The same can work with music, sewing, carpentry, sports, age, social issues, eating breakfast out..... whatever brings a small group together is great. The purpose is to grow spiritually through sharing, listening, and learning together on a regular basis. If you need ideas to start, talk to me. I guarantee it will be as much a blessing for you as it has been for me, and it is like a breath of fresh air during this crazy time we are living in.

## ECW Update

The ECW Board met in early September in the parish hall. The following is a synopsis of the meeting as well as other ECW news from the last few months.

- The ECW contributed \$1,500 towards the cleaning of the church buildings in preparation for reopening.
- A wireless doorbell has been purchased with ECW funds that will be installed outside the east entrance. This will provide a way for visitors to enter as well as additional security for staff and parishioners while in the buildings.
- The Thrift Store has reopened, resuming regular hours of Thursdays, 9:00 AM – 2:00 PM. Volunteers should sign-up at: <https://www.signupgenius.com/go/60b0a4ea9ae2aa3fe3-thrift> Donations of gently used, clean clothes and household goods are being accepted. Please no electronics and furniture at this time. Many thanks to all who have supported this effort.
- Due to the pandemic, the annual “Thanksgiving in May” event was cancelled. Frozen turkeys that were previously purchased for this event are being donated to local charitable organizations.
- The 2021 ECW budget as well as a revised Constitution and By-Laws will be voted on at the November meeting for approval by the vestry in November or December.
- Discussion regarding Fish Frys for 2021 has begun. With the uncertainty involving the pandemic, some preliminary conversation involved offering only take-outs and a limited menu. Leadership is needed for the Fish Fry efforts to continue.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday, November 10<sup>th</sup> at 5:30 in the parish hall with social distancing measures in place. All women of the church are always welcomed!

## **Vestry Highlights Meeting of October 20, 2020**

- The Very Rev. Colleen O'Connor, Dean of the Genesee Deanery was an invited guest to explain the history of the Genesee Initiative and how St. James could interface with it.
- Rick Iannello was approved as co-treasurer. He has worked in accounting and finance for many years. Rick's appointment as a co-treasurer is until the Annual Meeting in January.
- The Property Committee is working on improving the air quality in the nave.
- Our Fall Stewardship drive continues. If you haven't already, please submit you cards! Thank you to all who have submitted their 2021 pledges.

### **Property Committee Report**

Preserve-A-Stone Masonry Restoration and Waterproofing has completed work on this year's masonry repair priorities for the church:

- 1) Repair and re-pointing of the north (main) chimney, including repair of the concrete cap
- 2) Filling the exterior vertical joints and repairing spalled cast stone around the perimeter of stained glass window located at the south end of the nave
- 3) Repair and re-pointing of the west chimney, including repair of the concrete cap
- 4) Renovation of the southeast entrance interior, including exterior masonry repair
- 5) Repair of the southeast buttress, located to the right of the south entrance to the nave

The Vestry approved additional work, due to the very favorable pricing received on the initial quotes:

- 1) Repair of the deteriorated interior wall sections, at ceiling level, both left and right of the stained glass window at the south end of the nave
- 2) Repair of the bowed plaster on the interior west wall, between the front entrance and the glass partition

We commend owner, James Kohl, for his enthusiasm, attention to detail and quality craftsmanship.

The repaired areas are now ready for painting.

Many thanks, also, to everyone who's contributions to Bricks and Mortar make this work possible, since none of the funding for these projects is derived from parishioner stewardship pledging.

**Prison Ministry**  
**By Diane S Cox, Parish Nurse**

Matthew 5

Salt and Light<sup>13</sup> "You are the salt of the earth, but if salt has lost its taste, how shall its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trampled under people's feet.<sup>14</sup> "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. <sup>15</sup> Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. <sup>16</sup> In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that<sup>[b]</sup> they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.

The inmates at the local county jail have been affected by COVID-19 in many ways, ways that are very similar or different to ours. We at the jail are still on lockdown: no one in, no one out, no visitation, this includes families, children, no lawyers, no pastoral care and sadly nothing for the inmates.

I reached out to authority (Superintendent and Sheriff) to bring spirituality to the inmates. I researched and researched prison ministry and with my Kairos experience formed groups called "Reflections" where we discussed God's seven gifts, and the Sunday gospel. I started early March and we continued until approximately July. I obtained bibles and The Daily Bread; both versions are in Spanish and English, New Testament pocket version and other resources for the inmates. I have reached out to churches to write notes of support. I have received over 150 notes of support and prayers to distribute, and approximately 75 crocheted prayer squares (thank you St James).

My ministry of the present and future is what can we as St James, friends of St James and friends of friends provide to the inmates. Incarceration of human beings will forever be ongoing. These personal need items are items that the inmates need; they are not luxury items, but items unavailable to county inmates in their commissary. These personal need items do not need to be full size containers and maybe purchased at the Dollar Tree or other discount stores. Full size containers are acceptable; please note the contents will be distributed in medicine cups per individual. If unable to shop, please contact me if you would like to make a monetary donation.

Inmates at the jail still do not have visitation by their families nor other services; so I am continuing to minister in the presence daily to their requests of spiritual needs and support as they arise individually. These items can be dropped off at the church in a box in the back or contact me and I will pick up 585-748-6334. Thank you

Walgreens is offering no-cost contactless COVID-19 testing at select locations in partnership with the PWN health provider network. [https://www.walgreens.com/findcare/covid19/testing?ban=covid\\_testing\\_modal#!](https://www.walgreens.com/findcare/covid19/testing?ban=covid_testing_modal#!) Testing is available at no cost to eligible individuals who meet the criteria established by the CDC and state and federal guidelines. At the testing locations,

Walgreens pharmacy team oversees the patients; self-administration of the COVID-19 test.

1. A quick screening survey is on the website to see if you are eligible for testing.
2. If you are eligible you will choose a location and time for your COVID-19 test appointment. At the testing site.
3. You will remain in your vehicle with the window rolled up.
4. A Walgreens pharmacy team member will help you perform the test yourself using a nasal swab. For minors a parent or legal guardian will need to be present during the self-administration of the COVID-19 test.
5. Your test results and contact information will be sent to PWN health.
6. Get results from PWN health.

Types of testing: The RT-PCR Diagnostic Panel is used to detect genetic material (mRNA) of the coronavirus and will be sent to a laboratory to determine results within 3 days. The Rapid Point of Care (POC) test also detects genetic material of the virus with results available within 24 hours

Timing for results will vary by location and depend on the type of test taken. Patients will be notified of their results online, by mail or phone call.

**RT-PCR Diagnostic Panel Test:** Patients can expect to receive results in three days.

**Rapid Point-of-Care Test:** Patients can expect to receive results within 24 hours.

Also, please be aware that there are problems occurring with the handling of the testing kits. I personally know of several cases. If you do not receive results with the time described; you must call and investigate the situation.

The holidays are fast approaching. The news is suggesting not have large family gatherings. Micro clusters of COVID-19 are developing due to the change in the virus and individuals are not showing signs or symptoms of the virus. The media is suggesting to avoid large family gatherings.

Remember to DO the 5.....Hands, wash often, Elbow, cough into it, Face, don't touch it, Feet, social distance 6 feet apart or more, and Sick, don't socialize.

Face mask always on properly (over nose and mouth) out in public when others are around.

- Blood pressures will be returning; hopefully soon.
- Flu shots all the pharmacies are offering them.
