

The Nicene Creed (You are invited to stand as you are able.) BCP p. 358 We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

CANON COMMENTS ON VERGERS



You may have noticed Julie's vestments being a little bit different than those of the choir. It's a vestment developed in cooperation with the Vergers' Guild of the Episcopal Church, a traditional sleeveless gown with velvet-trimmed front and full, pleated back to be worn over a cassock. It is what a verger wears. But what's a verger?

The verger has its roots in the earliest days of the Church and shares traditional duties much like those of a "porter." They are responsible for the order of the service as directed in the bulletin in much the same way a Master of Ceremonies, just quieter. Working with the priest, the verger prepares for the orderly execution of liturgy, the conduct of the laity participating, and back when churches had cemeteries, the verger oversaw grave-digging as well as the graveside services.

In the Middle Ages, the verger had a more practical role as they were considered the "Protector of the Procession." He, as they were all men in those days, would lead the procession from outside into the church, clearing the way for the procession and protecting it from "vagabonds and animals that may try to attack." Today you will see a verger ceremonially leading the procession in much the same way as then, always walking in front of the cross. As you have no doubt noticed, the verger wears a particular set of vestments and typically carries a stick called a virge. Where used, virge always points to the Altar of God (the High Altar) as the procession enters the Church and upward toward the throne of God during the exit.

Although there is no definitive historical account for the office of verger, in the Anglican Church they can be traced as far back as the 16th century. Julie has served as a verger from before we were married until now and has maintained her membership in The Vergers Guild for the Episcopal Church. She was one of two vergers serving at St. Peter's, Paris, KY when we met. Later I would ask her to verge at St. Raphael's, Lexington, the church I was serving as rector. I did so with the hopes of her training others to take on that ministry after we left and I have the same

hopes for here.

Nowadays, the verger is most often ceremonial in nature, a lay person, either male or female, who assists the clergy in the conduct of public worship, offering welcome and organization to the flow of liturgy. When at the last minute changes occur due to an emergency, the verger will find a replacement or step sometimes in to fulfill that liturgical role themselves. The cartoon chosen for this article lists all the possible duties a verger might have and only in cathedrals would you find an office for the verger. If you would be interested in serving as a verger, please speak with Canon Johnnie or Julie, and they will make sure room is made for you on the schedule
