Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother, To Philemon our dear friend and co-worker, to Apphia our sister, to Archippus our fellow soldier, and to the church in your house: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. When I remember you in my prayers, I always thank my God because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith toward the Lord Jesus. I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we may do for Christ. I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother. For this reason, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do your duty, yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love-- and I, Paul, do this as an old man, and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and to me. I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might be of service to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel; but I preferred to do nothing without your consent, in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back forever, no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a beloved brother-- especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord. So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as

you would welcome me. If he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say.

Canon Comments on being friends: The Reverend Canon Johnnie E. Ross

JN 15:15 "I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead, I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you."

Aristotle describes friendship as "a single soul dwelling in two bodies," and it certainly seemed that way when death took my best friend and college roommate. It's been many years ago now since death visited Mike unexpectedly and suddenly. It was a Christmas Eve I will never forget. The phone message light was flashing when I got home after celebrating midnight mass. With the light blinking fiercely as if the machine was overloaded, I pushed the play button. Almost immediately I heard Lisa's voice, the sister of my college roommate with a request to call her. The remaining messages were all from her and appeared more and more frantic as she desperately hoped I would answer the phone. Finally, there was the message that caused a scream to ripple through our home like the aftershock of an earthquake. My wife and children ran into the room to find me weeping inconsolably. I remember describing how I felt that night. It was as if my soul had been torn from my body like the skin from an onion. That night left me different as death's visit had stolen my friend.

Some of the oldest pieces of literature speak of the importance of friendships. In the Epic of Gilgamesh, the great hero is brought to tears by the death of his friend Enkidu and he laments: "When I die will I not be like Enkidu? Woe has entered my belly. Fearing death I roam over steppe." In the Jewish Testament, David weeps when his friend Jonathan dies, saying: "I am greatly distressed... for greatly beloved were you to me; your love to me was wonderful, passing the love of women." (II Samuel 1:26) In John's Gospel, Jesus weeps at the tomb of Lazarus his friend. Gilgamesh, David, and Jesus all seem to indicate what I have come to experience in the death of my friend Michael. True friendships are deeply and most dearly held within the human vessel.

Friendships these days though seem to be contingent on political, social, and/or theological agreement. But the gift of friendship seems to be much greater than any social, political, or theological construct. In friendship the soul gains the intimacy it needs to mature, evolve, and become all that God hopes for it until at last it takes its rest with God. For me to grow and develop I need you, not agreement. For it seems to me that what the soul longs for is a deep and abiding intimacy with friends and the God we seek, an intimacy that is willing to sacrifice agreement simply for the sake of friendship.

The truth of intimacy can be found in the creation story. God enjoyed creation and desired to be present in it. But one day, when the humans heard God walking in the garden, they hid themselves from God. This type of game play results in the destruction of intimacy. Giving and sharing was no longer a spontaneous expression of the other's joy but something programmed into a divine and human game of hide and seek.


What God tells us in the creation story is that in a divine relationship "I'm OK – You're OK," and when we begin to live into that reality, not only is God perceived as being ok, but so is everyone else – those who agree with us AND those who don't.

People are created in God's image not mine, not yours. I am created in the image of God, and I do not need to be recreated in the image of anyone or anything else. The Anglican clothing I wear is

comfortable, accepting, welcoming, and worn without judgment. For me, an intimate relationship with God requires an intimate relationship with God's people – one free of fear, games and contracts, full of fun, creativity, spontaneity and welcome.

Thomas Moore writes: "The soul can reach out and make its connections through and in spite of differences of politics, opinions, convictions, and beliefs. Friendship is the container of the soul, not the process of weaving compatible thought. It is precisely where there's no effort toward homogeneity, but simply a space shaped with sensitivity to intimacy, that we find the usefulness of friendship. The soul requires many varieties of vessels and many kinds of spaces in order to work day by day with the raw material life (gives it, but) friendship is one of the most effective and precious of those containers." Count friends as gifts from God-true gifts!

As Christians, members of the Episcopal Church, as friends with Christ and with each other, we are called to a friendship where we pay attention to each other's soul, and it is in this mutual care that friendship is sustained as God's gift to each of us and to the world. AMEN.
