I love being a Southern Baptist!

Thank you for sending me to Greensboro, NC, for the Southern Baptist Convention. It is inspirational, informative, and important. During the annual meeting, thousands of messengers from churches all across the nation gather to worship together as we hear challenging messages and heart-stirring music, to hear about the work of Southern Baptist ministries as they serve the Lord all around the world, and to conduct the business of the

denomination through a two-day business meeting punctuated with a variety of motions and resolutions on a wide assortment of topics.

Baptists do not always see everything the same way. This is not shocking news considering there are approximately 16 million Baptist on the membership rolls of thousands of autonomous churches! What is remarkable is how much we agree and how we are focused as a people on one common purpose.

Two important topics dominated the convention. One was how narrowly or broadly do we expect our Southern Baptist agencies to interpret the Bible as they commission new missionaries and as they coordinate with other Christian organizations. This is a vital discussion with dangers if we veer to extremes in either direction: if too narrowly we begin to focus on non-essentials; if too broadly we lose sight of the essentials. These types of discussions will continue as we strive as an imperfect people to follow the leadership of a holy God to reach the world with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

The second major topic of the convention centered around the Cooperative Program (CP). The CP is the channel of funding through which churches support the ongoing work of our Baptist ministries, including state, national, and international work. Southern Baptist churches have traditionally given 10% of their general budget tithes and offerings through the CP (First Baptist Church gives 15%). In recent years, some churches – particularly large churches – have reduced CP giving in order to give directly to ministries (called "societal" giving). With a societal method of giving, money is focused in one area of ministry while other important ministries function with fewer resources.

While the SBC rejected defining 10% CP giving as the benchmark for good cooperative support, it did elect a new president from a church with a strong CP track record. In all of the discussions about CP giving and how to support our Southern Baptist agencies, the overwhelming consent was that the Cooperative Program is the most effective channel for supporting missionaries and ministries for taking the gospel to the ends of the earth.

As Southern Baptists, we can be grateful that our focus continues to be on reaching all nations, tribes and tongues with the good news that Jesus Christ is the only hope of salvation and that He invites everyone to come to Him.




