ASSOCIATIONS: This past Sunday evening I tried to share an idea – briefly. Those of you who know me at all are aware that brevity is not my strong point. Therefore, in a short time frame, the inevitable generally happens. Some element needed to make sense out what I'm trying to share is sure to be omitted. So, allow me to try to fill in the holes I left Sunday evening in my vain effort to be succinct!

I began by NOT remembering the name of Anton Armstrong! He is a nationally acclaimed choral clinician/lecturer, especially regarding the performance practice of black spirituals. He is on faculty at St. Olaf College in Minnesota and the choirs he conducts are world class. Dr. Armstrong is an African American. However, because he was reared in the Lutheran church, his expertise in black spirituals comes from scholarly study of the subject rather experience or heritage. I recently heard him speak at a church music conference.

Although I could not recall his name at the time, I mentioned Sunday evening his explanation of why black church choirs "sway." He told us that "lifting the feet" from the floor represents "worldliness." Simply put, "you don't dance in church — if you lift your feet, you're dancing." So, for black church choirs to avoid an association with the world, when they move, they sway — keeping their feet on the floor.

I followed this by asking Sunday evening's crowd to lift their hands if they were members of SBC churches or knew of SBC churches "hurt" by the charismatic movement during the '60's. Few did. This surprised me. My home church and a number of Texas congregations experienced disruption in their fellowship at that time over this controversial issue. In more direct words, churches split over the issue of speaking in tongues. The pain this brought about in our lives has caused some of us to struggle with anything associated with the charismatic movement, especially musical style and worship practice – choruses, hand clapping, and overt emotional display.

Immediately following this "sermon/lecture," as my family calls them, we sang a medley of very traditional hymns – well known to folks my age and older, less familiar to new Christians, children, and youth. How did these "old favorites" relate to my discussion on "swaying" and "speaking in tongues?" It's simple.

For those of us near my age and beyond, those traditional hymns have a positive association. They remind us of meaningful worship experiences in the past and our roots in Baptist life. However, because our world has expanded and we have musical flavors available to us beyond vanilla, chocolate, and strawberry, these hymns may not have as positive an association for our younger worshippers.

"Well, Mike, you make a good point! We need to sing these more often to give them an association," you might suggest. My response? I agree. That's why we sang them Sunday evening. However, their world has moved far beyond these hymns. I want to pass along the best of our heritage from the past, ALL OF US need to expand our means of worship through music. To do this, we must consider what we sing NOT ON THE BASIS OF ITS ASSOCIATION, but rather on the basis of its Biblical/doctrinal content.

Music missionaries in Africa have had to expand their understanding of music in worship. In that culture singing and dancing are simultaneous expressions. When they sing, they clap their hands AND lift their feet. It doesn't mean they "love the world." The hand clapping and movement are not preludes to "speaking in tongues."

We cannot nor should we completely divest ourselves of our associations. They are there for a purpose. However, we all should look beyond our accepted associations. If we fail to do so, we just might rob ourselves of a fuller revelation of the awesome God we worship.




