

FROM YOUR PASTOR

Royce Ann and I have been in the mountains of northern New Mexico this week. We have enjoyed the beauty of the mountains and the time of rest and recreation.

Several years ago our church elected a Property Acquisition Committee and gave them the responsibility to seek out property near our church for additional parking. This committee, made up of LeRoy Duell, Feriba McNair and Keith Robbins, have served us faithfully. They have recommended the purchase of several pieces of property along Highland Street north of our buildings. Over the past several years we have purchased six pieces of property for a total price of \$567,800.00 The notes on all of these pieces of property have been retired.

These purchases have helped us to add to our available parking. We are still short on the parking we need to accommodate anticipated growth of our church.

A couple of weeks ago the red brick house, which is next to the last house on the east side of Highland before you get to Lafavette, came on the market. This week the blonde brick house, which is the last house on the east side of Highland before Lafayette, became available.

Sunday night, July 21, at our regular monthly business meeting, the Property Acquisition Committee will present a recommendation that we purchase both pieces of property. The price on the red brick house is \$111,000. The price on the blonde brick is \$90,000. I believe that this is a great opportunity for our church. I hope that you will be present at the business meeting to hear the details of this recommendation. There is owner financing on the blonde brick property.

Please pray for the wisdom, leadership and spirit of God as we make this decision.

MINISTER of MUSIC

REFLECTIONS: Years of dreams, months of planning, weeks of work, and days of in tense focus have come to an end. The concert Sunday evening involved the energy of lots of folks. For me personally, it was almost allconsuming toward the end. Large, special FROM THE projects typically are for all of us. It will take a few weeks for me to fully unwind and get a full picture of our efforts, but here are a few of my immediate impressions.

Gratitude — I thank the Father for life, Jesus for redemption, the Spirit for guidance. I am grateful for a call to salvation and service. I am appreciative of nurturing for ministry and a people and place to express it. This church and its musical resources represent the greatest potential of my ministry to this point in time. I do not take the moment lightly. I feel a great sense of responsibility and thankfulness for the challenge.

Joy - During my seminary days, Bill Green was minister of music at First Baptist Church in Richardson, Texas. During a visit to his church as a part of a field education class, he said to us with great passion, "If you don't wake up everyday with joy in your heart that you get to be a minister of music, feeling sorry for everyone else in the world they can't be, you ought to do something else." He expressed quite well exactly the feeling that I had then and have continued to have throughout my ministry. I do regret terribly that so few of us get to do what I do. (Of course, I realize that the beauty of God's plan is, everyone else feels the same way about what they are called to do.) Sunday evening's concert was a great experience. It gave me joy. But, Monday morning when it was over, it gave me joy to realize that I still wanted to come to work. As big an event as it was, it was just that; one event in a sequence. Camp Campanella began Tuesday, and it thrills me just as much to teach young people how to start as musicians as it did to direct the choir and instrumentalists Sunday evening. I feel joy in the event as a highlight, and joy in knowing that it was not the sum of the whole, just part of it.

Hope — Each time we share our faith, we give opportunity for the Kingdom to expand. Yet, sharing our faith is not something we do just for others. Sunday evening as I opened my heart and shared the things good has taught me through David's life, I realized all over again just how great God is and how much I love Him for being who and what He is. I came face to face once again with reality of His existence and my relationship to Him. I was renewed in my faith in Him, and of His call to use music to share His reality with others. I was reminded that as long as He tarries, His song must be heard - bold and strong, sweet and clear, with passion and heart.

This small space and your patience will not allow me to express all that I feel, but I wanted to share these thoughts with you. Thank you for your prayers for the effort. Thank you for your attendance and interest in inviting others. Thank you for indulging me as I shared my dream and involved you as a church in it. And a special thanks to those of you who contributed time, energy, and effort trusting that what I dreamed could glorify God, build His church, and speak to those who have yet to respond to His Song.




