

Sometimes attention is diverted to everything except the main thing, that is the actual contest on the field or in the arena. It seems the news reporters are interested more in traffic foul-ups, bad food, long lines, and more serious problems such as security and terrorist actions; everything but the games. However, if the athletes are successful in their competition, they must keep the main thing the main thing. They have trained with great discipline and spent extraordinary and unbelievable long hours

From the Minister of Music

EDITOR'S NOTE: Because my article this week is somewhat of a personal nature, I read it to my wife before publishing it. She asked if it was for our newsletter or **Home Life**, implying strongly that it was a bit long. However, with the pastor and Jim Thomas both out of the office leaving a sparsely filled paper, as editor it is my responsibility to fill the space. I can and did. I likely could every week! Do not despair. This is not a trend. We will return to our usual format when they return and claim their rightful spaces once again!

YOUTH CAMP (DISCOVERY WEEK!) Well, it's finally happened. I have grown old enough to pack a *teenager* (do we still call them that?) off to youth camp. It could have happened last year. Justin, our elder son was old enough to go, but his baseball team advanced to the state finals last summer. So, Pam and he went to Batesville while Tim and I stayed home and the youth group went to camp. This year's team lost early at the state tournament. So early Monday morning, I came down to the church with all the other parents to send my first born to camp.

I am very grateful to God for my family. I have a wonderful wife and two fantastic sons. Being sons, they *are* boys and they both most definitely engage in *gender appropriate* behavior. But they are still great guys. I have enjoyed every stage of their lives. I sense deeply God's grace and love for me through the joys He has provided through fatherhood. Don't get me wrong. Being a father has rendered me frustrated, confused, angry, and on a rare occasion or two even speechless (I know; some of you will find that last part hard to believe!). However, next to the fulfillment I experience as a husband, only the rewards of vocational ministry come close to matching the satisfaction I find in being the father of my boys.

Take for instance, this youth camp thing. Justin and Tim have both gone to camp before, but never as youth. There is something very exciting about Justin's going off on his own for the first time without me present as a counsellor or staff member. You see, I have a very special vantage point. I'm not just a parent, I'm a former youth minister. I have a very up-front, in-your-face picture of what Justin's about to experience. And, I know that he's going to get to experience it without my being there to be in the way.

Don't get me wrong. Neither of my guys have ever seemed to mind having their parents along on their outings. If they have, they've been polite enough to not let on too much. It is I who am glad that I won't be in the way.

Justin will be in good hands. God has blessed him with a youth minister who is deeply devoted to God and His purposes. Capable, loving lay people are driving and serving as sponsors. Our pastor, who has a genuine concern for all of his flock, including our youth, has taken a week of his valuable time to go on the trip with him. Beyond the normal dangers of day to day life, Justin will be well-cared for while he is away from his mother and me. I am so glad. He and his brother are my treasures. I don't trust just anyone with my treasures! But, an important part of my task as a father is to let go of the boys a little bit at a time until the day comes when they will be men out on their own. Through the process, it's nice to have reliable adults watching over them as I practice letting go.

Discovery Week is a vehicle God can use to mold Justin and his friends. I know. I experienced it first hand and have observed it in the lives of the youth I've led. Camp gives him opportunity to grow spiritually outside my realm of influence. He needs that. His mother and I have been and still are his primary nurturers. But we need help! A part of growing up is realizing that other people besides Mom and Dad care about spiritual matters. God may be able to get Justin's attention through some folks there in a way that we no longer can. Not because we are bad parents (while there is certainly room for improvement, we've worked pretty hard at the task). But because we are his parents.

He's growing up. In some instances Justin is paying more attention to other adults than he once did us. He's trying out some of the things we've taught him, looking around to see how they fit and other significant adults are his mirror. Naturally it makes me a little sad. I certainly enjoyed those days when he thought I knew everything. I felt important! But he's found me out. I really don't have all the answers. And praise God, now that he's realized it, I am so grateful for the help my Christian friends and church family are providing as he looks beyond me for some answers.

Justin and Tim will always be my treasures. But if they are to become the treasures God intends them to be, I have to let go of them... little by little... bit by bit. Diamonds shine their brightest outside the *father/mother lode*. Cut, faceted, and polished, often by several different hands, eventually set in solitaires, they reveal their greatest fire and truest color gracing the fingers of hands far removed from those which mined them. It's their destiny. What a privilege to have had a hand at all in the process.


