



I remember well overhearing one visitor questioning another at this event the first year I came, "This is free? They don't charge anything?" I can't help but believe that when we provide something wholesome, free of charge, simply as an altruistic act, the world takes notice. I'm so grateful to be a part of a church that has this kind of heart. To God be the glory!

WITH THIS IN MIND, I want you to encourage family and friends to attend both the Fall Harvest Festival and the concert by *The Melody Boys Quartet* which follows from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. This concert should appeal to a wide range of ages and musical tastes. In keeping with the concept of our Fall Harvest Festival being a gift to the community, we *will not* be receiving a love offering during the concert. The concert is fully funded by the ministry of music. It is indeed a concert; a time of wholeness, Christian fun and fellowship. For many of us there will be times of worship, but it is not a worship service *per se*. So, invite everyone you can to come. Pray that seeds will be planted.

MENTORING is a very popular word these days, especially in some television advertisements for children. Neither the word nor the idea are new to me. I have had many *mentors* throughout my life who have *mentored* me at many different stages. However, this newest emphasis is a little paradoxical to me. Let me explain.

An actor who appears in one of these ads plays in an award-winning television program. Having viewed the program, I must admit that this actor and his co-workers are skilled in their craft. However, my primary reason for watching the program at the outset was so that I could know for myself whether the criticism of its content is warranted. It is. While well-done, is unfit for children (and I believe adults) to watch. When the scripture, "whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report..." is applied, though well-crafted, the program remains substandard in content.

This brings me to the paradox. Isn't it odd that an actor involved in programming that does nothing to aid the plight of children has been chosen to promote mentoring them? It is a dramatic picture of our society as a whole, a society which says:

To enjoy personal freedom we must not be bound by the teachings of God regarding love. We will ignore the love which He demonstrates and challenges us to give, a love which manifests itself in commitment to marriage, sexual purity, respect and courtesy toward our fellowman, and personal sacrifice for the good of others. And having discarded these principles as detrimental to our personal freedoms, then we will appear on national television, using our award-winning talents (only mentioning occasionally. at an award show, of course, that they are God-given), to poignantly beg other adults to follow our lead and give two hours of time on Saturday to play basketball with a child whose life has been wrecked by the consequences of our self-indulgent society, in the hope that those fleeting moments we give as mentors will compensate in some small way for all we've taken from our children in the pursuit of our personal freedoms.

Next week I want to share with you the names of some of my mentors, since for now, as usual, I'm out of space.



Hey, did you go to Midnight Madness last week? The basketball season is quickly sneaking up on us! Why do they call it Midnight Madness, anyway? The "Midnight" part is obvious enough - they can't start practicing until after 12:00 a.m. on October 16. What about the "Madness" part? Maybe because it's a chance to get out there and go crazy for those Hogs, acting like a bunch of fools to break up the monotony. Maybe it's because Hog fans are just "Mad" about their team. Or, maybe you have to be nuts to be out watching basketball practice at midnight! But, out of love for the Hogs, many fans aren't afraid to risk being called crazy.

You know, many first century Christians faced such a risk. To the philosophical Greeks (the dominant culture of the day), the notion that Christ had risen from the dead was lunacy (Acts 17:32; I Cor. 2:14). In spite of this, many believers held firmly to their faith in Jesus, even if it meant facing scorn as a fool (I Cor. 1:18-27). Does this mean that all of our Christian beliefs should be irrational? Of course not. The apostle Paul's weren't. But when faith in God and in His word led to rejection by the world, these early Christians were ready to face it for their Lord.

Are you willing to do the same? Will you stand up for your beliefs in the risen Savior, even if it could result in inviting the scorn of those who don't know Him? Even if it means facing rejection? Let's be willing to be fools for Christ, if necessary in order to stand up for Him. Many (maybe you) are willing to do it for the Hogs - will you do it for your Lord?
