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SUNDAY'S GOSPEL REFLECTION

Those of us gathered for worship today are truly diverse: from different cultural backgrounds, countries of origins, races, etc. But what binds us together is our baptism in Jesus. Whatever our differences and whatever language we speak, we all say together, "We believe in Jesus Christ and so his way is our way." Our basic identity is that we are a community of Jesus' followers and we love him. Therefore, our love for him urges us to live like him.

But does not hearing the Sermon on the Mount these Sundays leave you weak in the knees? How can we ever live these teachings? How will we even know how to live them? Because of his miracles and teachings Jesus had attracted great crowds. In order to teach those closest to him, he took them up a mountain. Two Sundays ago, we heard the Beatitudes, the introduction to a collection of his teachings which we call the Sermon on the Mount. The Beatitudes called for the profound inner change necessary for anyone wanting to follow Jesus. That kind of change is spelled out in his subsequent teachings. This weekend we are using the short form of the gospel today. The longer offering just seems like a lot. I do not want to overwhelm the congregation with a long list of "do's and don'ts." But even in the shorter version we hear Jesus calling us, not to a superficial, exterior performance of commandments, but to a far more profound response – deeper, interior change that will enable us to do as he instructs.

How discouraged his followers must have been when Jesus taught in this way! After all, the Pharisees were considered the righteous and holy ones. Jesus' challenge though was not only to his followers, but to the Pharisees and scribes as well. Their religion was to go deeper than exterior works – the right motives had to support right behaviour. His demands are high indeed! They seem impossible to achieve.

From today's gospel selection, we hear that Jesus wants to cut short, at its inception, a path that might lead to murder. So, he says to his disciples they are to control their anger. In cases of adultery, families would seek retaliation on the couple because of the shame brought down on those families, especially on the husband. To prevent adultery and the subsequent blood feud that would erupt, Jesus tells his disciples not even to think such a thing – no lusting after another. In addition, good community relations, especially among believers, would be possible if people behaved honestly with one another; if they could trust each other's words. So, no lying. Jesus Today he is giving concrete examples of what we heard him say to his disciples last week. They are to be "salt of the earth," "light of the world" and a "city set on a mountain."

LENT 2026

The real aim of Lent is, above all else, to prepare us for the celebration of the death and Resurrection of Christ. With the bulletin attached is the Lenten Program 2026—our parish program for our individual and communal parish pilgrimage through Lent to Easter 2026. The 2026 Lenten Reflection booklets from the Archdiocese will be delivered to each family across our parish to make sure that each family has access to a prayerful resource that can be used in a group setting or at home this Lenten season.

ASH WEDNESDAY

Lent begins with Ash on Wednesday February 18th. A sombre occasion that marks the beginning of the 40-day period of Lent observed by Christians. On this day, Christians attend services and receive ashes upon their forehead, usually with the words "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." For Catholics, it is a particularly observant day, with fasting and abstinence for those between the ages of 14 and 59. Non-meat meals should be eaten all day. **Masses: Birdwood – 9.00 a.m., St Catherine's – 10.30 a.m. Liturgy R/Yr2, 11.30a.m. Mass Yr3/6 and at Bridgewater at 6.00p.m.**

THE NEW PROJECT AT BRIDGEWATER

Now we are faced with a lot of mould and damage to the furniture. The box room at the foyer had flooded too and the ceiling is wet and moulded. The same can be said about both the Ladies and Gents toilets. To change both roofs will not be ideal, besides we have been looking to make both toilets accessible from the church foyer adding a new handicap toilet. I think its time we make the necessary changes which will give the opportunity to enlarge the foyer, toilets accessible from the foyer, more natural light both in the sacristy and Kids room and a new complete façade to the church including a belfry and a statue of Mary. Hopefully soon we will have drawings from our architect Ben Clements. Once the plans are finalised they will be exhibited for comments. My hope is that works will start when plans are approved by the PPC and PFC of the parish and after all permissions are given both from the church and local council.

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

We have a wisdom to offer those who have reached maturity: not a philosophy of our age, it is true, still less of the masters of our age, which are coming to their end. A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to his disciples: 'Do not imagine that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets. I have come not to abolish them but to complete them. I tell you solemnly, till heaven and earth disappear, not one dot, one little stroke, shall disappear from the Law until its purpose is achieved. Therefore, the man who infringes even one of the least of these commandments and teaches others to do the same will be considered the least in the kingdom of heaven; but the man who keeps them and teaches them will be considered great in the kingdom of heaven. 'For I tell you, if your virtue goes no deeper than that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never get into the kingdom of heaven. 'You have learnt how it was said to our ancestors: You must not kill; and if anyone does kill he must answer for it before the court. But I say this to you: anyone who is angry with his brother will answer for it before the court; if a man calls his brother "Fool" he will answer for it before the Sanhedrin; and if a man calls him "Renegade" he will answer for it in hell fire. So then, if you are bringing your offering to the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your offering there before the altar, go and be reconciled with your brother first, and then come back and present your offering. Come to terms with your opponent in good time while you are still on the way to the court with him, or he may hand you over to the judge and the judge to the officer, and you will be thrown into prison. I tell you solemnly, you will not get out till you have paid the last penny. 'You have learnt how it was said: You must not commit adultery. But I say this to you: if a man looks at a woman lustfully, he has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye should cause you to sin, tear it out and throw it away; for it will do you less harm to lose one part of you than to have your whole body thrown into hell. And if your right hand should cause you to sin, cut it off and throw it away; for it will do you less harm to lose one part of you than to have your whole body go to hell. 'It has also been said: Anyone who divorces his wife must give her a writ of dismissal. But I say this to you: everyone who divorces his wife, except for the case of fornication, makes her an adulteress; and anyone who marries a divorced woman commits adultery. 'Again, you have learnt how it was said to our ancestors: You must not break your oath, but must fulfil your oaths to the Lord. But I say this to you: do not swear at all, either by heaven, since that is God's throne; or by the earth, since that is his footstool; or by Jerusalem, since that is the city of the great king. Do not swear by your own head either, since you cannot turn a single hair white or black. All you need say is "Yes" if you mean yes, "No" if you mean no; anything more than this comes from the evil one.'
