Pope Leo XIV's first letter to the Church

Last month, Pope Leo XIV published *Dilexi te*, which means "I have loved you" and echoes the title of Pope Francis' last encyclical letter *Dilexit Nos* ("He loved us"), on the devotion to the Sacred Heart. The title is taken from the words of Jesus in Revelation 3:9 and the exhortation is addressed "to all Christians on love for the poor," a message to the Church.

Written by Pope Francis and edited and endorsed by Pope Leo, it sets out the Catholic response to wealth and poverty. In it, Pope Leo recalls that Pope Francis had chosen to be named after Francis of Assisi after a 'Cardinal friend of his embraced him, kissed him and told him: "Do not forget the poor!" Pope Leo also recalls that later Pope Francis had told reporters "How I would like a Church which is poor and for the poor!"

This exhortation is all about God's love for the most vulnerable and marginalised people in our society. This is affirmed with many examples from the

scriptures, the saints and religious orders, and in the development of Catholic social teaching in dialogue and engagement with the contemporary world.

The document speaks of Jesus' identification with the hungry and marginalised, with workers and the rejected in the gospels; about St Francis and St Clare; the shared life of monastic orders and the biblical promise of liberation from oppression. It also describes the multifaceted nature of poverty in the modern world.

Social exclusion, personal fragility, lack of voice and rights are forms of poverty as well as lacking material resources.

Pope Leo urges us, with his predecessor, to avoid old criteria to hide behind the idea that things are always getting better, and to ignore the new subtle forms of poverty, which may be more dangerous.

Pope Leo's first letter to the Church

We must reckon with increasing inequality, poor and devotes most attention to the Latin burden women. We are reminded that Christ himself central place of the poor in the Church. became poor, and that therefore we can see Christ in all those who are poor in our world today. We must therefore be particularly attentive to those who are most marginalised in our society and listen to the wisdom that only they can offer.

After Christianity was tolerated, the poor had a central place in monasteries and in later religious congregations. Their founders gathered friends to care for prisoners, prostitutes, refugees, orphans and uncared-for children, and people who were ill. Teaching and nursing institutions grew out of dedicated personal care for people who were poor.

Dilexi te also describes the development of Catholic Social Teaching as a story that grows from engagement with those poor impoverished in the Industrial Revolution to advocating their cause, and finally to listening to them as authorities.

Four things stand out about Dilexi te.

Firstly, selecting and telling stories always involves retelling them. In presenting Catholic Social Teaching, for example, Dilexi te, offers a summary of the Church teaching before the Second Vatican Council, emphasises the Council's attention to the

globalisation of indifference and the injustices that American conferences which emphasised the

Secondly, the positions and people with whom Dilexi te takes issue are Catholics who disregard or minimise the central part of the poor in their faith.

Allied to them are those infected by the wider culture whose social and political views emphasise the individual over the common good, see individual and national wealth as the measure of a good society and regard the poor as defective or as expendable.

Thirdly, *Dilexi te* reminds us that in Australia, inequality and the attitudes it feeds are common. It points to the enormity of the task of moving the centre of culture from individuals and their interests to their relationships within the community.

This change is needed to notice and reach out to the poor. Dilexi te demonstrates how countercultural is the genuinely Christian response. It also makes it attractive.

Finally, the most notable feature of Dilexi te is that Pope Francis has not only helped publish and put his name to such a radical document but has fully endorsed it.



The Lord has provided us with a large Reverse Osmosis plant that produces 700 litres of purified water daily. After school hours, we share this purified water with our neighbours since running water does not exist in homes.

Palm and olive burning for Ash Wednesday

We begin the Holy Season of Lent on Ash Wednesday practicing contrition and confession, spiritual practices for refreshing our relationship with God.

Lent is a time to seek ease from suffering and illusions. We practice release and acceptance of actions and ideas to grow in integrity and wellbeing.

Lent lasts 40 days without Sundays, concluding on Easter morning. Based on the lunar calendar, the dates of Lent vary year to year.

Traditionally, the dried palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday are burnt to make ash for Ash Wednesday service. Burning the "triumphant" palms and olive branches to make ash is a humbling reminder of the fickle nature of humanity.

Paul Anderson, Deb Somers and I recently took the dried palms and olive branches from last year's Palm Sunday, burnt them and once ashes, things became a bit messy. That's when the ashes are poured through a strainer and into a jar, where they remain before being used at the start of Lent 2026, on Wednesday 18 February 2026.




