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A Glorious Regiment of Women: Learning from the Example of Faithful Disciples

I am inspired by heroic Christians from the past. History is full of men and women who served God faithfully. Their lives show us the power of God's grace. For this reason, most years I preach a series highlighting a figure from church history. The sermons are based on scripture, but I illustrate the meaning of each passage using the life and teachings of heroes of the faith. For example, in my series on Augustine, I preached a sermon called "The Power of a Praying Mother." Augustine came to faith in Christ as an adult after his mother had faithfully prayed for him for years.

I always talk about the good and the bad. My purpose is to show the grace and power of God in that person's life. Also, no one can be a role model for us who is not a real person with both strengths and flaws. The Bible is honest about the failings of Moses, David, and Peter. We should be no less honest.

In 2019, I preached a series called *Lent with Bonhoeffer*. Dietrich Bonhoeffer was a German pastor in the 1930s and early 40s who opposed Hitler and the Nazis. For his trouble, he was executed in a concentration camp. In 2020, the series was *August with Augustine*. We spent that month with a reluctant convert who became an influential theologian and church leader in the late 4th and early 5th centuries. (I like to give the series alliterate or catchy titles reminiscent of the *Magic Tree House* chil-

dren's books. If you are familiar with those, the main characters, Jack and Annie, are two children who travel in time and meet interesting historical figures. (I am trying to communicate my goal that we get to know these Christians from the past.)

I didn't preach a historical series in 2021. I got back on track in 2022 with *Lent with Luther* about Martin Luther, the monk who started the Protestant Reformation. His failure to be good enough, despite being a hyper-religious monk, and his reading of the Bible opened his eyes to the truth that we are saved by grace through faith.

We had no historical series in 2023. I was back in action, however, early in 2024 with *Cooling with Calvin*. John Calvin was a Reformer whose application of scripture to the church in Geneva formed the seeds of the Presbyterian Church. Not only was he a brilliant teacher of scripture, but we also heard how

he struggled when he lost his job and when his infant son and then his wife died. He taught us to handle adversity through radical trust in God.

In planning sermons for 2025, I realized I hadn't

featured a woman in a historical series. Men tend to dominate the headlines of church history, but in the day-to-day life of the church, women have been just as faithful. We need their example and witness! As I tried to choose a woman to feature, I found many exemplary ones. I decided not to feature one woman for a series but to highlight several.

As you know, I am currently preaching through 1 John in a series called *Love & Light*. We will return to 1 John after this series. When I preach a long series through a single book of the Bible, I believe that breaking it up is helpful. People have short attention spans. Setting 1 John aside and coming back to it later will help us absorb and remember it better.

I am calling my series on faithful women *A Glorious Regiment of Women*. That's a parody of a title written by John Knox. Knox, of course, led the Protestant Reformation in Scotland. He is one of our direct spiritual ancestors. In 1558, he was frustrated because Scotland was ruled by the Roman Catholic Mary Queen of Scots while England was ruled by the Roman Catholic Mary Tudor. She was nicknamed "Bloody Mary" because she persecuted Protestants aggressively. Knox wrote a book against them, but rather than attack their theology, he attacked them on the grounds that they were women. He argued

that rule by women is unnatural. He titled it *The First Blast of the Trumpet Against the Monstrous Regiment of Women*. John Calvin, by the way, disagreed with him and tried to persuade him not to publish it. Knox did anyway. It proved to be a mistake. Before the year was over, Mary Tudor died and was succeeded by the Protestant Queen Elizabeth. She would have been a supporter and ally of Knox, but she was deeply offended by his little book and never forgave him. I am playfully turning Knox's title on its head.

In this series, you will meet five servants of Christ whose powerful witness inspires us today. They lived in different times and places. Certainly, their lives were different from ours. And yet, their examples teach us how to better follow Jesus. Here is the schedule and the women you will meet:



August 3: John 12:24-25 "Perpetua" (c. 181 – 203)

She was a young married woman with an infant boy who lived in Roman North Africa. She came to faith in Christ during a time of persecution. When she refused to renounce Christ, she was cruelly executed along with four others. She kept a journal of her suffering that was finished by a friend after her death. She teaches us to give all for Christ.

August 10: Romans 8:18-25 "Julian of Norwich"

(c. 1343 – after 1416) She was a Christian hermit and mystic. Her message was radical hope: "All will be well, and all manner of things will be exceedingly well."

August 17: Ephesians 2:4-10 "What's So Amazing About Grace?" I will be away. Pastor Al will be preaching about God's amazing grace.

August 24: Romans 3:10-24 "Katherine Parr"

(1512 - 1548) She was the last wife of Henry VIII and author of a book on Reformed Theology: *The Lamentation of a Sinner*. She teaches us about our need for God's grace.

August 31: Galatians 3:27-29 "Sojourner Truth"

(c. 1797 - 1883) A former slave and abolitionist, she championed women's rights. She reminds us of the equality of all people before God.

September 7: Matthew 18:21-35 "Corrie Ten Boom"

(1892 – 1983) She was a devout Dutch Christian who hid Jews from the Nazis. Her work for the resistance led to her arrest and terrible suffering in concentration camps. After the war, she ministered to those like herself who bore scars from the war, including Jews and Germans. She teaches us the necessity and power of forgiving.


Linda Hughes




Carol Elswick

Place of Hope

Place of Hope is a faith-based, state-licensed organization working to break the cycles of abuse, neglect, poverty, homelessness, and human trafficking. With campuses in Stuart, Boca Raton, Palm Beach Gardens, and West Palm Beach, it recently celebrated 25 years of serving children and families in need.





In fall 2024, Place of Hope opened the Rinker Neighborhood Foster Care Family Cottage in Stuart, prioritizing sibling groups and hard-to-place children. Many siblings in foster care are forced to live apart, but Place of Hope is committed to reunifying and maintaining crucial family relationships. Cottage parents Marcus and Danielle live there with their two children and six foster kids, each with a private bedroom and bath. The home provides consistent, family-based care in a safe and nurturing environment.

Our congregation supports the Shade Tree Family Outreach Center, located in the Boswell Education and Enrichment building. This program provides essential supplies and services to families navigating the child welfare system.

Three new buildings are under construction and expected to be completed by year's end, bringing the campus to nine buildings and expanding local services and housing.

On July 12, PCPC youth and Mission Committee members visited Place of Hope to help with cleaning and organizing projects. Despite the heat, the group worked cheerfully and later reflected on their experience. For many, especially high school seniors nearing age 18, it was eye-opening to learn that foster youth must transition out of the system at that age. The day left a lasting impact—both on those served and those serving.

faith. Hidden Oaks Middle School (HOMS), across from PCPC, is a prime spot we hope to launch a huddle this fall.





What If?

What if you received a diagnosis of cancer? What if you required heart surgery? What if, all of a sudden, your life changed and you no longer had the same energy level or were required to have limited mobility? You wonder if you are going to die sooner than you anticipated.

You have a choice to make. You can be full of fear and anxiety, or you can test your faith. This would be an opportunity to "walk the talk." In Philippians 4:6-7 (ESV), Paul tells us, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." That is good reading, but can we really not feel anxious? That is easier said than done. Yet, we read about Moses and his trek in the desert. Was he afraid? We know that the Israelites frequently questioned Moses. They, too, were frightened. How were they comforted? We read in Deuteronomy 31:8, "It is the Lord who goes before you. He will be with you; He will not leave you or forsake you. Do not fear or be dismayed." The Lord gave His assurance in what we read in both the Old Testament and the New Testament. Scripture can help calm those nerves. We just need to be still first. Psalm 46:10 says, "Be still, and know that I am God."

After you calm down, you examine what your priorities have been and what they are now in your new physical state. You ask, "What is my purpose? Am I going to meet my Maker soon? Have I led the life He planned for me? Now that I've had this scare, what changes should I be making? What changes can I make? I have been given talents and gifts. Have I been using my gifts to their full potential? What can I do with my life with whatever time I have left?" Our purpose is to serve the Father. In John 12:26, Jesus says, "If anyone serves me, he must follow me; and where I am, there will my servant be also. If anyone serves me, the Father will honor him." That is our goal—serve Him, and we will be honored.

I am reminded of the parable of the talents in Matthew 25. A man entrusted to his servants five talents, two talents, and one talent, respectively. The first two invested what they were given and returned to the master more than they had originally. The third servant hid his talent in the ground. He did not invest what he was given, and the master was angry. When the talents were invested and grew in value, the master responded to the first two slaves, "Well done, good and faithful servant." But to the servant who did nothing with what he had been given, the master said to him, "You wicked and slothful servant!"



How will I respond when I meet the Master? What will the Master say to me? Have I buried what I have been given? I want the Master to say to me, "Well done, good and faithful servant." Will I hear that, or will the Master tell me that I have been wicked and slothful? As long as I have breath, I am to serve Him.

When faced with a health scare or a life change, you are given an opportunity to make changes in your day-to-day living. Ask yourself, "Am I living for my Creator, or am I living for myself? What gifts (talents) have I been given? Am I truly using the gifts the Lord has given me? What time do I have left?" None of us knows. I pray I will hear those words of praise, "Well done," when I bow before my Creator.

We must not wait for the *what if.* We are to live each day as a gift, not bury any talents. One day, we will face our Master. We will serve to the end and live it to our fullest potential. What will He say to you?


