What a Prisoner Taught Me About Christmas

Dietrich Bonhoeffer led me to a deeper appreciation of Christmas. Bonhoeffer was a pastor in Germany in the 1930s and 40s. He spent Christmas 1943 in prison. Why? For helping Jews escape Nazi Germany. He was also involved with the group that conspired to assassinate Hitler. He used his church contacts across Europe to communicate with the Allies. The attempt to kill Hitler didn't occur until the following July, so at this point, the conspiracy and Bonhoeffer's part in it were still unknown.

That Christmas in 1943, he wanted to be at home with his family and his fiancée, Maria von Wedemeyer. Dietrich had known many joyful Christmases in his childhood. His large, happy family would do any grocery store commercial proud. But this Christmas, he would spend behind bars. On December 13, 1943, he wrote to his fiancée:

Be brave for my sake, dearest Maria, even if this letter is your only token of my love this Christmas-tide. We shall both experience a few dark hours—why should we disguise that from each other? We shall ponder the incomprehensibility of our lot and be assailed by the question of why, over and above the darkness already enshrouding humanity, we should be subjected to the bitter anguish of a separation whose purpose we fail to understand ... And then, just when everything is bearing down on us to such an extent that we can scarcely withstand it, the Christmas message

comes to tell us that all our ideas are wrong, and that what we take to be evil and dark is really good and light because it comes from God. Our eyes are at fault;

that is all. God is in the manger, wealth in poverty, light in darkness, succor in abandonment. No evil can befall us; whatever men may do to us, they cannot but serve the God who is secretly revealed as love and rules the world and our lives.



Is he right? Are our eyes, and not our circumstances, at fault? The good news of Christmas is that God has sent a Savior. Jesus, the eternal Son of God, took flesh and became one of us. It seems to me that such news is especially good for a person who is in prison or alone or grieving or disappointed by circumstances. I am not saying you should cheer up and have a merry Christmas. I doubt Bonhoeffer had a merry Christmas that year. I simply want you to look beyond your circumstances (whatever they might be) to the God who loves you. There is comfort and hope in the Christmas message.

If you can have the "ideal" Christmas, do so if you want. If you like big trees, put one up. If you like to open presents early, open them early. In short, find what happiness you can during the holiday season. But, whether you find little happiness or much (or none), know that that isn't Christmas. Christmas is God in a manger.

If you can, be sure to participate in one of our candlelight Christmas Eve worship services. The contemporary service is at 5:00 p.m., the traditional at 7:00. The best way to celebrate Christmas is to sing praises to God, hear the good news, and draw near to Jesus in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.






- why the holiday season is difficult without our loved one(s).









Men's Bible Study Thursdays @ 7:00 a.m. in Langill Hall

This group is exploring the life and ministry of Christ through the Gospel of Luke. Coffee and breakfast are served every week.




Women's Bible Study Wednesdays @ 10:00 a.m. with childcare in Langill Hall


Women's Bible Study Thursdays @ 9:30 a.m. in Langill Hall

The author of this study comments, "It takes great intentionality to make space for Christ during the Christmas season." We agree! Join us and gain a fresh vision of our Lord and Savior.




Women's Bible Study Wednesdays, @ 10:00 a.m. in the library




Youth Pickleball League

Dunklin Memorial Church Tour

Eleven PCPC members (pictured above) toured Dunklin Memorial Church in Okeechobee on Friday,

November 7. Dunklin Director Nick Reynolds gave an educational bus tour of the program's grounds and industries.

Dunklin Memorial was established in 1962 to help men trapped in addiction. Their life-changing program is currently serving more than 65 men through this rehabilitation ministry. Each client stays for an average of one year. About 65% of their funding comes from their clients' work in their industries. They produce wood pallets for local businesses, raise cattle, and grow

Clusia plants. Approximately 250 people—clients, staff, and their families—live on campus. Every Sunday, Dunklin holds a church service open to the community. PCPC has supported Dunklin as a local ministry partner for over 20 years, and there is an open invitation to any PCPC members to attend and worship with them.

Next Generation Ministry

At the end of October, your Next

Generation leadership team attended the ETCH (Equipping the Church & Home) NextGen Ministry Conference. This opportunity provides worship and breakout sessions on various aspects of ministering to children, teens, and their families. This year's ETCH theme, Velocity, challenged us to evaluate where we're behind, where we need to accelerate, and how we can faithfully carry the unchanging truth of Jesus into an ever-changing world.





Like escaping the current of a riptide, Chuck Peters, director of NextGen ministry at Lifeway, told leaders the answer is not to go with the flow of culture but to turn and go the way of Jesus. "We are rescuers of a generation that is caught in the current of the culture," Peters said. Culture is moving at an ever-increasing pace; our own velocity needs to accelerate to match the speed of culture, but in the direction of the cross.

Author and teacher Preston Perry opened the conference, encouraging attendees to walk in boldness in the face of persecution. Teaching from Acts 4:1-13, Perry challenged ministry leaders to remain bold when persecution comes from all sides.

We are currently raising and supporting Generation Alpha (children born between 2010 and 2024). Shelly Melia, professor and counselor, equipped us to navigate the changing landscape. To effectively reach this new generation, we must focus on relationships, prioritize parents, and saturate them in Scripture. While being welcoming is important, Melia encouraged us, as NextGen leaders, to focus on creating belonging. This generation needs the church to know and love them.

Recognizing that many parents of this generation are not equipped to disciple their children, Melia urged us to intentionally disciple young adults in our church before they have children and to prioritize parents' roles in discipleship. Finally, Melia explained that Bible-saturation allows the church to normalize suffering and offer hope for this young generation. "A faith that lasts understands suffering is a normal part of the experience of being human," Melia said. "Generation Alpha needs help connecting hope to their suffering."

We have returned energized and ready to approach our ministry with intentionality—supporting parents, deepening connections, and shaping environments where kids and teens experience true belonging. With new tools and fresh encouragement, we look forward to faithfully investing in Generation Alpha and the families we serve.

What We're Learning

Preschool - "Maisy Has a Message"

Preschoolers will discover the Christmas story with Maisy the Mailbox. Each time Maisy lights up, a new Christmas card arrives, inviting kids to step into the story in creative ways. As the cards unfold, they'll hear the greatest message of all: a Savior has been born—Christ the Lord.

Elementary - "Get Reel"

Our elementary theme, "Get Reel," takes kids through the story of Jesus' birth with movement and creativity. They'll learn motions and dance moves that help tell each Bible story, then combine them into a short video "reel." As they move and groove, they'll discover the real story of Christmas and God's gift of Jesus.

Next Level Preteens – "Christmas Carols"

Our preteens will explore worship through Mary's Song, Zechariah's Song, and the Angels' Song. They'll learn that followers of Jesus respond with gratitude, rely on Him for salvation, and recognize God at work around them.


late fall, possibly at the Martin County Airfield (Whitman Field). Watch for details later in the year.

Do You Love Me?

The third time Jesus appeared to the disciples after His death, "Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?' He [Peter] said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you'" (John 21:15 ESV). Jesus didn't stop there. He asked Simon Peter two more times if he loved him. Peter was frustrated, especially the third time when Jesus asked him the same question. Each time Peter said he indeed loved the Christ. Peter talked the talk! The question was actually conditional. Each time Peter declared that he loved Jesus, Jesus replied with instructions: "Feed my lambs." "Tend my sheep." "Feed my sheep." This love was not simply a sentiment; it was to be put into action. What is the message to us? We don't have lambs or sheep out in our backyards. Or do we?


Lambs are sheep that are less than one year old. They are the "babies" or new sheep. Sheep is the general term for the animal, including those over one year. Let's also clarify that sheep are not "dumb." We have heard that they can get lost easily and are not very intelligent. A better description of sheep is that they are dependent. They are smart enough to know their shepherd's voice. They follow their master's voice. That accounts for their survival. They are simply to follow their master! Aren't we to do the same? If we are genuinely seeking survival, we must follow our *Master*.

So, back to Peter and Jesus. What did Jesus mean when He told Peter to feed His *lambs*? Jesus meant for Peter (and us) to teach and nurture those who are young in faith. Jesus also instructed Peter to nurture the more mature believers (His *sheep*), implying a relationship well beyond infancy. Christian relationships are to be initiated, nurtured, and sustained. And when we say we love our neighbor (which is everyone), we work at developing that closeness and intimacy through good times and bad.

Peter also said that he would never desert Jesus. "Though they all fall away because of you, I will never fall away." And, "Even if I must die with you, I will not deny you!" (Matthew 26:33-34 ESV). Yet, as we know, that very night, Peter denied knowing Jesus three times. What is the lesson here? We can say all the right words and believe in our hearts that we love someone, but when put to the test—when the pressure is on or when it is inconvenient—do we actually walk the walk (put the talk into action)?

When we love someone, really love them, we enter into an unbreakable bond. We feed them, tend to them, and care for them. Jesus is our ultimate model. What did Jesus do for us? He laid down His life for His friends (us). Would we be willing to do the same? For example, you may hear of someone offering a kidney to a stranger. I say, "Wow! That is very commendable!" Would I do the same? I think I would do anything for a spouse, a child, a sibling, or even a close friend. But would I offer a kidney to a stranger? That is a bit of an extreme, or is it? Would I go to the cross for a stranger, like Jesus did for me? A more doable example is whether I would offer a ride to someone who needs one. How about when someone needs a meal delivered? When my neighbor (everyone) is in need, do I respond in kindness and caring?

This time of year, many are in financial need. How do I respond? Do I feed and tend to Jesus' sheep? That was His love command. Jesus told us to love. Love is an action word. Do we love Him? If we do, we show it!
