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PCPC Welcomes Executive Pastor Bryan Wenger

As we prepare to welcome the Rev. Bryan Wenger as our executive pastor later this month, our cub reporter interviewed Pastor David and Pastor Bryan to bring you the inside story.

Cub Reporter: First, Pastor David, what is an executive pastor, and how does Bryan relate to you, the senior pastor?

Pastor David: An executive pastor is like an executive officer on a ship, second in command. The captain is the senior officer at the top and is responsible for the ship. The executive officer is the captain's right hand. The senior pastor is the chief pastor and head of staff. The executive pastor is my right hand. Of course, leadership in a church is not about power. Bryan and I will work side by side as colleagues, friends, and partners in ministry.

Cub Reporter: Why use the title executive pastor? Why not assistant pastor?

Pastor David: Because "executive pastor" is way cooler. No seriously, it's because Pastor Bryan and I will be sharing administrative responsibilities. Specifically, I will supervise the ministry team, and he will supervise the support staff. I will supervise our executive pastor, NextGen director, communications coordinator, Cornerstone's leadership

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team, and traditional music director. They will report directly to me. Pastor Bryan will supervise the receptionist, the bookkeeper, the facilities manager, and the audio-visual production lead. We will both be part of the session, the vision team, and the Finance Committee. Pastor Bryan was a CPA before he became a pastor, so that's a big plus for us. I will be on the Personnel & Administration, Worship, and Congregational Nominating Committees. Pastor Bryan will be on the Missions and Membership Committees.

Cub Reporter: Administration will be about 20% of the job for each of you. What else will Pastor Bryan be doing?

Pastor David: Discipleship, pastoral care, and outreach. Some teaching. Preaching when I am away. We're including his job description in this month's newsletter, so readers can find the details there.

Cub Reporter: You've known Pastor Bryan for a while?

Pastor David: Yeah, Pastor Bryan and I met when I came to PCPC back in the summer of 2017. He was a pastor at Indian River Presbyterian Church in Fort Pierce. We were in the presbytery together. Then, we were part of the same pastor covenant group for years, along with Pastor Dustin Sterrett from All Villages and the Rev. Tom Boone, who is now with the Outreach Foundation. In 2019, Pastor Bryan took a call at a church in California. He's been out there ever since. I've been trying to get him here for years. I think our relationship will be good for the church. We have a lot of mutual respect and trust. Pastor Bryan is someone I would want to be the pastor of my family—obviously, because now he is! We know each other. We will work well together. Hopefully, no big surprises—unless they are good surprises!



Cub Reporter: Pastor Bryan, tell us about yourself.

Pastor Bryan: First of all, I wanted to say how much I am looking forward to serving alongside Pastor David, the staff, and the leadership here at PCPC. I eagerly await the opportunity to get to know all of you, as we share life together as Christ transforms us by his Truth. My wife, Jean, and I became empty nesters and first-time grandparents in 2025, so it has been a season of great change for us. We look forward to this new season in 2026 with everyone at PCPC as well.

Cub Reporter: How did you know PCPC was the place for you?

Pastor Bryan: Well, as Pastor David had mentioned, we have been good friends and colleagues for several years, even across the miles. When he sent over the job description and recommended I submit my resume for the Executive Pastor position in July 2025, I decided to trust God for his plan and purpose. This past fall, I engaged in further conversations with Pastor David about the ministry God was doing in and through PCPC. I also met the staff and the session. Both Jean and I started feeling a peace about continuing to walk through each door if God should choose to open them. I am grateful for this call and excited for what God has already done here at PCPC. I look forward to joining all of you on the journey together, as we continue to seek God's purpose and vision for PCPC. As Ephesians 3:20-21 says, "For God can do far more abundantly than we can ever ask or imagine."

Cub Reporter: What else can you share with us as a brief introduction?

Pastor Bryan: After more than six years of living on the West Coast, Jean and I are grateful that God chose to call us to our new PCPC family, as well as to be back

near our immediate and extended family, including our precious grandbaby. Every day is truly a gift, and we are so grateful for his blessings. I also love to walk at least six days a week, read a good mystery novel, and escape to the mountains to take some deep breaths.

EXECUTIVE PASTOR

Job Description: EXECUTIVE PASTOR

The executive pastor (EP) is an assistant pastor, called by the session of the church. The EP reports to the senior pastor/head of staff. This is a full-time position.

JOB SUMMARY

The EP has a hybrid role in the church, combining a focus on ministry with some administrative responsibilities. The EP is part of a ministry team that includes the senior pastor and director of Next Generation Ministries. Each member of the team works to support the ministries of the others. This means the EP will be involved with all age groups within the church.

RESPONSIBILITIES

Personal Integrity

- Maintain a lifestyle that is consistent with scripture and the Essential Tenets of ECO: A Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians.
- Support the senior pastor.
- Work collegially with the senior pastor and the session in a relationship of mutual accountability.

Collaborative Vision Strategy

- Work with the senior pastor and vision team to achieve our 40/50 Vision.
- Work with the senior pastor and vision team to develop short- and long-term strategic planning for the church.
- Attend session meetings. [The senior pastor moderates the session and is responsible for elder training.]

Ministry

- Lead the church to develop discipleship opportunities and a discipleship pathway.
- Develop creative, new ways to connect and serve the community surrounding the church.
- Lead efforts to welcome visitors.
- Pastoral care responsibilities, including working with the deacons [The senior pastor also works with deacons and is responsible for deacon training.]
- Provide volunteer training and support.
- Weddings, baptisms, and memorial services when requested
- Preaching when the senior pastor is away (5-6 times per year).
- Teach the new member class.

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- Collaborate with the senior pastor and youth leaders in the confirmation class.

Administration

- Supervise the support staff: audio-visual production lead, bookkeeper, facilities director, and receptionist. [The senior pastor supervises the ministry team, as well as the communications coordinator and director of traditional music.]
- Keep the office running smoothly.
- Work with the bookkeeper to maintain policies and procedures.
- Onboard new employees.

Team Participation

- Represent the pastors on the Mission Committee.
- Represent the pastors on the Membership Committee.
- With the senior pastor, participate in the Finance Committee.

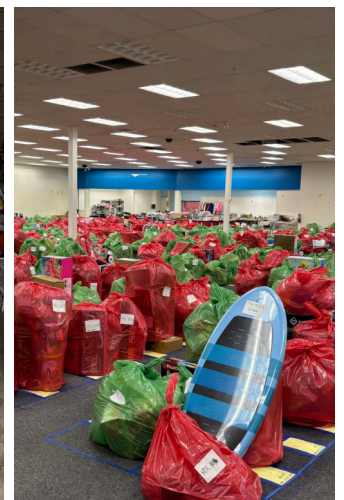

Human Trafficking Awareness Presentation: January 27 @ 6:30 p.m.

Drugs can only be sold once, but a victim of human trafficking can be sold over and over. This is why this crime has grown into an over \$150 billion illegal business worldwide. The United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime estimates that almost 50 million people are currently victims, with 12 million being children. The instances of child trafficking have increased by one-third in the past three years. Florida ranks number three in the country, behind California and Texas, for reported cases of human trafficking.

There is a strong likelihood that some of you have encountered a trafficking victim without realizing it. An estimated 60–70 percent of victims pass through an airport at some point during their captivity, often while being transported to and from large-scale events such as the Super Bowl or Formula One races.

The reality of human trafficking is difficult to comprehend for two main reasons. First, most of us lack direct exposure to the suffering endured by victims, making it hard to fully understand or empathize with their experiences. Second, the sheer scale of human trafficking can feel overwhelming, causing it to seem like a problem too large for any one person to address.

Our community is not exempt from this horrible crime. Palm Beach County, just south of us, is in the top 10 counties in Florida for reported cases of human trafficking. The Martin County Sheriff's Office has officers who are trained specifically to identify and aid victims. There are currently over 20 different groups in our area educating the public about human trafficking. Some, such as the Human Trafficking Coalition of the Treasure Coast and Okeechobee, also assist the victims

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in their road to recovery. One of our mission partners, The Refuge Ranch, says that some of the ladies in the addiction recovery program have been trafficked at some point. These organizations would not be spending time and resources on this problem if it were not a threat to our children and our community.



On January 27, PCPC will host an awareness presentation. This free event is open to the community and will feature two local speakers. The first will be Major Ruben Romero from the Martin County Sheriff's Office. He will explain what human trafficking is and provide statistics on how it is seen in Martin County. He will address the dangers to our children, especially on social media. Our second speaker will be Charles Bender, CEO of Place of Hope. He will explain how victims on their campuses receive the care and tools needed to recover from the trauma of being trafficked. Place of Hope has been running ads on local television stations, urging victims of human

trafficking and/or abuse to call them for help. Charles will talk about why they chose to invest resources in advertising and how it has benefited their fight against human trafficking and abuse in our community. Time will be allowed for audience questions.

Please consider joining us for this presentation to learn how to protect yourself and your family from situations that may seem innocent but are potentially harmful. You will also learn how rescued victims are receiving the care and support they need.

Start the Year With Intentional Stewardship

A new year brings a fresh opportunity to align our priorities with God's purposes. One of the most important decisions we can make each month—and especially at the start of the year—is to be intentional about our giving. Sometimes we might treat giving as something we'll do “if there's anything left” after paying bills and covering expenses. But biblical stewardship flips that thinking: we give first, trusting God to provide for our needs.

Proverbs 3:9–10 (NIV) says, “Honor the LORD with your wealth, with the firstfruits of all your crops; then your barns will be filled to overflowing.” The principle of firstfruits reminds us that giving is not about leftovers—it's about putting God first in our finances. When we give at the beginning, we declare our trust that He is our ultimate provider.

In Malachi 3:10, God even invites us to “Test me in this... and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of

heaven.” Giving first is both an act of faith and a step of obedience.

This January, take time to pray and decide in advance what you will give—not based on what remains at the end of the month, but on a deliberate commitment led by the Holy Spirit. Paul encourages in 2 Corinthians 9:7, “Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.”

Ask God to guide you in setting aside not just your finances, but also your time and talents for His work this year. When we give intentionally and joyfully from the start, we set the tone for a year of faith-filled generosity—and we position ourselves to be part of the life-changing work God is doing through our church.

Parker's favorite scripture:

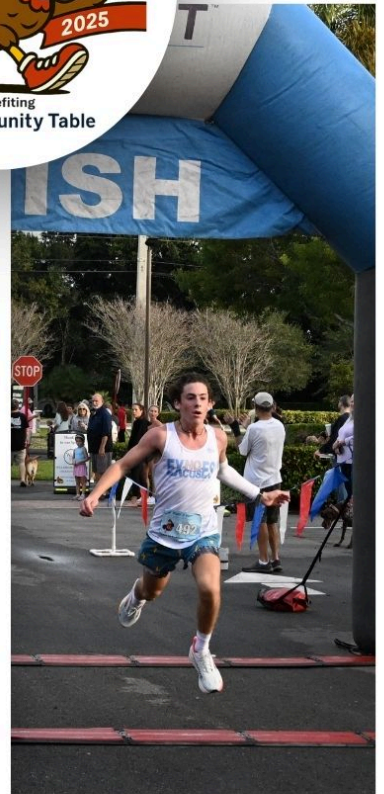

These verses reflect his heart for community and faith in action. He especially loved participating in Vacation

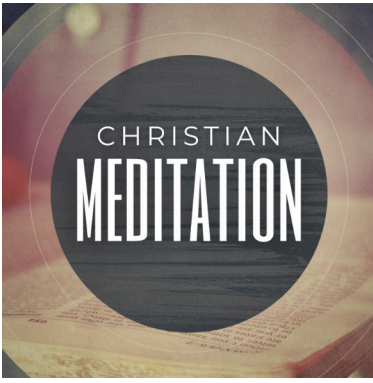
Bible School, where his faith continued to grow. Parker shares, "God has guided me through my most formative years, and I hope He will guide me through the rest of the life I get to live."

Extended Communion

What is Extended Communion?

Extended Communion is an act of taking the consecrated Communion elements to our members who cannot make it to church due to illness or mobility issues. In teams of two, our deacons and elders bring Communion to those members. With prearranged visits to a member, we share time and celebrate the Lord's Supper together. We usually do this immediately following the Sunday service. However, we can arrange a Monday or Tuesday visit following the Communion service if that works better for a member. This ministry has been in place since mid-2023 and serves members in communities like Sandhill Cove, Waters Edge, Grand Oaks, The Harrison, Alta, Addington Place, Hospice Home, Encompass, as well as individual homes.



How does it work?

The teams confirm a day or two before with the recipient by phone. The visits are no longer than 30 minutes and tailored to the members' needs. We spend some time in fellowship, share a summary of Sunday's service, celebrate Communion, and close with the Lord's Prayer. The teams also bring a bulletin and the current month's newsletter.

How can you help?
