Reflections on ECO's 2024 National Gathering

Our church is part of ECO: A Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians. We cherish the doctrinal clarity this gives us. Our Essential Tenets plainly state the beliefs we are willing to live and die for. If you've been around, you know what a blessing this is. A long time ago, every church was clear about its basic beliefs and practices. Today, not so much. This clarity keeps us focused on Christ and united in our convictions.

If your experience of ECO is limited to our church, that may be the first or even only thing that comes to your mind when you think of ECO. But there is much more. Our doctrinal unity gives us the freedom to work together in exciting ways, including worship, missions, church planting, and training new leaders. All of these are on display at the National Gathering. The Gathering celebrates God's grace and expresses who we aspire to be as a movement of churches.

The world is changing fast, especially the religious landscape of our nation. Many churches find themselves on the ropes. ECO leaders tackle this head-on at the National Gathering. Inspiring worship aims to wash off the discouragement and weariness of ministry. Speakers and breakout sessions provide insight into how to navigate these changing times. The keynote speaker, Alan Hirsch, encouraged us to be open to new ideas. My favorite speaker, Rebecca McLaughlin, explained how to address non-Christian claims that are popular right now.

If you attend a National Gathering, you will marvel at how different ECO churches are. We're not like a restaurant franchise where every location is the same. United in doctrine, we are as different as the communities where we are located. You will also be reminded that we are part of a global church. The Egyptians and Brazilians always make the effort to come, and PARS Theological Centre (which trains pastors for Iran) always sends representatives. Plus, you can make numerous other connections around the world.

Each of ECO's 22 presbyteries meets during the gathering. We had as many Florida folks in Greenville, SC, as we usually do when we meet in Florida. At our meeting, PCPC's Jason Pridmore was elected to the presbytery's Permanent Judicial Commission. Lee England is the vice moderator, and I chair the Ministry Partnership Team, so PCPC has a strong involvement with the presbytery. This is important. No pastor is alone. No session is alone. No church is alone. We stand together, and the presbytery is how that happens.

If you ever get the chance to go to a National Gathering, do it! You do not have to be a pastor or elder to go. Anyone can register. Next year, the National Gathering will be in Dallas, January 28-30.

the topic for the entire gathering. The word is *metanoia*, a Greek word translated as repentance. In today's world, it is about a true change of mind and heart. The theme was carried throughout the conference meetings and at the different breakout sessions. The bottom line is we can no longer do things the way we have always done them. It's time for new ideas, to be able to rethink and relearn and try these new ideas and procedures.

The choices that we had for the different breakout sessions were tough to choose from; there were many interesting topics. Since I've been home, I've

I was a little apprehensive about going to the ECO National Gathering. Even the main theme, *Metanoia*, was intimidating. I had never heard of it and didn't know what it meant (repentance, but it's much more than that). Knowing I was going to be surrounded by clergy, theologians, and intellectuals gave me a little pause. Was I ever surprised! While all of the above were there, it was not intimidating at all. Everyone was welcoming. I was happy to feel that, while a lot was going on for those in the "executive branch" of ECO, there were plenty of sessions for all of us to be able to understand and absorb.

The days started with the entire group of 1400 (500 of us were first-timers to an ECO gathering) meeting in either the main sanctuary, seating 2000, or the Worship & Arts Center, a new addition to the church, seating about 700. Speakers each morning and afternoon were at one of these locations and livestreamed to the other. The sanctuary, with an orchestra and a choir of over 50, had breathtaking music as we sang hymns and

listened to soloists. We chose to go there for the first day and ended that day with worship and Communion. We went to the Worship & Arts Center the next day to experience the contemporary services, and I was very moved by the music and the feeling of camaraderie.

We all began the day together listening to several speakers, and then we separated to attend breakout sessions. The four I chose were "Discipleship Essentials," "Biblical Christ-Centered Conflict," "Dynamic New Covenant Partner Retreats," and "Practicing Partnership." They were very informative, some relating more to our church than others. In each one, I learned something I could use, which means it was successful and worth my while.

"Discipleship Essentials" was one in particular that I was very excited about. I hope to be able to implement it in my own life but, more importantly, into the lives of others. "Practicing Partnership" was about missions and Kingdom partnership—bringing meaningful connections that go far beyond sharing financial resources. As the Mission Committee chair, I pray that I will be able to share these feelings with the committee and our partners.

The last morning was commissioners attending the synod business meeting. Al and I were both commissioners. We felt honored to be able to participate and learn more about the process of our ECO denomination. We were also glad that we had spoken to Pastor David about the polity changes

that were being considered. We received a 79-page document going over the business, but he was able to explain in "easier" language what we would be discussing.

This gathering was an experience I will treasure and remember for the rest of my life. Being with others who share the same beliefs and are passionate about spreading the gospel was inspirational and motivating. I pray that my opportunity will not be wasted and that I will be able to share my experience with others to help them become true disciples of Jesus.

This year's theme, *Metanoia* — true repentance, a total reset, a paradigm shift, a complete relearning — challenged us all to consider (and maybe even reconsider) how we are "doing" church and how effective we are in our methods. The idea of rethinking what

and how we are doing things as a church is daunting and scary. But, in order to return to Christ and the mission of advancing the gospel, Dana Allin (Synod Executive) said, "We need to stop turning inward, and learn to take risks, let go of safety and our comfort, and repent." Repent, as though we have done something wrong? No. Repent, metanoia, as in *rethink* or unlearn what we know and are comfortable with, so that we might relearn what it means and looks like to be and to make disciples of Jesus Christ. We all ought to be in a constant state of metanoia, challenging ourselves to how we might better follow Jesus and lead others into a relationship with Him.

Metanoia. Metanoia! I pray we use this word over and over again until we all truly understand what God actually meant by metanoia. True repentance is not just a one-time experience. It is much deeper than that.

The 2024 ECO National Gathering was very different from the prior years. This year, we were challenged to change our mindset and our current way of thinking. Metanoia is a constant redirection of our thinking, it's a change in our mindset, it's a paradigm shift. It requires us to turn away from things that distract us from following Jesus, like comfort, tradition, or fear of change, and turn toward God. We must hit the reset button. We are often more concerned about our own boundaries than advancing the church. God does great and wonderful things when we take risks. We must be willing to unlearn and relearn if we want to truly metanoia/repent.

be reoriented and reformed in light of God's Word.

My prayer for myself and PCPC is that we can humble ourselves and be open to this life-changing way of thinking. May we metanoia and trust God to guide His church in 2024.

PCPC proudly supports several churches in the Philippines. While the funding may seem minimal, it actually amounts to 85 to 95% of each church's operating budget, and the pastors make every cent count! We asked for an update and received photos, outreach numbers, and heartfelt thanks.

The next three photos are from the ministry of Pastors Bene and Lean Cabase in Tagbilaran City and Bohol. The bottom photo depicts one of their outreach groups in Bohol. Bene reports that this outreach ministry reached approximately 350 for Christ last year.



The photo above is of a new outreach group in Villa Aurora, Basey, Samar, under Pastor Nelson and Pastor Lilibeth, with the help of volunteers. These groups are supported by PCPC funding and help spread the gospel to people in remote, unchurched areas. Pastor Nelson and Lilibeth now have nine outreach groups sent from their church. Although their vision is primarily church planting, their church members in Tacloban City also offer a feeding program, Sunday school, music team, Sunday kids ministry, youth night, and crusades. Combined, their programs reach an estimated 3,000 with the Word of God.



Thanks to PCPC funds, Pastors Sugar and Alfonso Agnila started a high school discipleship program for juniors and seniors in Tabontabon, pictured at left.

With this new ministry, they are happy to report that their church reached 820 for Christ in the past year.





The two photos above come from Pastor Edgar and Giegie Tacata in Tacloban and depict their junior and children's evangelism camp, which was funded by a gift from PCPC. In addition to the very successful camp, their ministry has provided feeding programs for children, vacation Bible school, teacher's training, evangelism and values classes, as well as a youth mission trip, impacting as many as 6,280 in 2023.

And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. - Philippians 2:1-8 (ESV)

We see this in the Bible when Paul was on the road to Damascus; Peter at Cornelius' house; the two men on the road to Emmaus; the women at the well; the sermon on the mount; Thomas encountering the risen Jesus; Peter, James, and John on the Mount of Transfiguration; and in the mystery of the Gospel! God is constantly moving us into a radical change in our homes, schools, and churches.

Grant Skeldon is a next-generation pastor teaching on how to navigate through the life of Gen Z. He shared how to become discipleship-makers and how God continues this cycle of pouring into one another. He warned us against staggering in our Christian lives. Grant's example highlighted the life cycle of a frog. Sometimes we get stuck in the tadpole stage, where Christians don't do anymore than we have to in our Christian lives. To get to the frog stage, we must be open to new things God wants us to experience. We are not to stay in the tadpole stage!

I also really enjoyed hearing from Vivian Mabuni. I relate to her in a lot of ways; we are both Asian

Americans with a Buddhist background who radically found God. In our community of Palm City, sometimes it's hard to relate culturally to others since our area doesn't have a large Asian American community. It was impactful for me to hear the voice of an Asian American talking about God's Kingdom. Vivian spoke about the openness we have with God to go into metanoia. She used three P's:

- Portion: To keep the most important thing, the most important thing!
- Posture: Our response is our posture. If God said "go" into the field, then GO!
- Purpose: Do everything for and with the Lord! You can be a teacher, a mailman, a barista, etc. It doesn't matter, as long as you spread his word in every aspect of your life.


