Let's Plant a Church!

PCPC is helping plant a new ECO church in Navarre, Florida! For several years, a handful of folks, including me, have prayed for a church plant in the Florida panhandle. We are thin there, just a couple of tiny churches. One was part of a planned development that was never completed after the housing bubble burst in 2008; the other worships in Korean. Then, late last year, God sent our presbytery a church planter.

His name is the Rev. Kobus Genis. Originally from South Africa, he was ordained in the Dutch Reformed Church of South Africa. Their theology and polity are nearly identical to ours. From 2003 to 2022, he served churches in the Presbyterian Church of Canada. Last year, he approached ECO about becoming a church planter.

ECO carefully screens and evaluates potential church planters. Luke Parker, ECO's Director of Church Planting, brought Kobus to my attention because I am the chair of the Ministry Partnership Team (MPT) for the Presbytery of Florida. The church planting assessment is long and costly, so Luke wanted to be sure Kobus was a good fit for ECO and the Presbytery of Florida before they proceeded. Our MPT reviewed Kobus's credentials, checked with his presbytery in Canada, and interviewed him. We realized he was a good fit.

Our presbytery council contributed half the cost for the church planting assessment, which takes several days of face-to-face interaction between the potential church planter and ECO church-planting leaders. Luke and his team concluded that Kobus has what it takes to plant a church. Not everyone does, of course. Church planting is a unique ministry that requires an entrepreneurial spirit as well as many spiritual gifts, particularly those that build relationships.

As part of his assessment, Kobus had to develop a specific plan to plant a new church. Luke and the ECO team helped Kobus revise this plan to make sure it was realistic. With that and a lot of faith, Kobus moved to Florida. He has been building relationships and beginning his efforts, and seeking funding from churches. This is where PCPC comes in.

Our church has a history of support for church plants. We have given generously to The Grove, a church plant in Port St. Lucie led by the Rev. David Hancock. He is known for his Skeptics-Only Bible studies. Over the past few years, we've been reducing our giving to The Grove as they have become more self-sufficient. Hopefully, The Grove will become an official church this year. We have also supported Foster Church, a unique church plant in Seattle that has a ministry to fostering families. It is led by the Rev. Dan and the Rev. Krista Carlson, a clergy couple who formerly served here in Florida. We also give a little to ECO's church plant in Argentina.

The Rev. Jose Luis Podesta is a member of our presbytery,

though we hope to launch ECO South America someday.

Last fall, when PCPC was budgeting for 2023, we knew Kobus would be starting his church plant. We were not yet sure we wanted to support him, though, so we budgeted \$10,000 for church planting that we left undesignated. The idea was if we decided to support him, the money would already be in place. Kobus attended our January session meeting online and presented his plan to our elders. They liked what they heard, but being cautious, they wanted to know him better. Kobus was planning to attend the National Gathering, so we arranged for our elder representative, Dr. La Barbara Chenault, to meet him there. They had a long and fruitful conversation, and when she reported back to the session, La Barbara enthusiastically recommended we support Kobus.

Here is when things got ... interesting. As we discussed the recommendation, one elder said, "If the motion is to give \$10,000 to support this church plant, I am against it." I asked, "Why?" He said, "It is not enough!" Then he added, "Are we planting a church, or are we playing around? We've got money. What

are we doing with it? If we are going to plant a church, we need to go all in and plant a church!" This raised the energy in the room. "How much are we talking about?" several people asked. For a while, we were talking about \$25,000. One elder expressed reluctance to give up control of that much money to someone else. I said, "But don't you see? He is us! [I know "He is we" is the correct way to say that, but it sounds awkward in an impassioned speech at a session meeting.] He is a member of our presbytery, planting an ECO church." Then followed an animated discussion, and in the end, we approved \$50,000 for the new

church plant—in 2023! The Holy Spirit always shows up for session meetings; sometimes, you can tell he is there!

Where will we get this money? We have \$10,000 in the budget already. The other \$40,000 will come from the PCPC Mission Fund. Won't that drain our Mission Fund? Not at all. It is less than the \$60,000 the session added to the Mission Fund last year. Thanks to the generosity of our congregation, we received more than we spent last year. Some of that money replenished what we spent from the Mission Fund.

However, we are not simply giving money. We see this as a partnership. Our session appointed Susan Hastings as our official liaison to the church plant. We want to send groups up to help Kobus at various times. We are looking forward to Kobus coming here so that you can meet him.

Kobus has an online ministry called *Bible GPS*. You can watch his videos if you search "Bible GPS" on YouTube or scan the code provided here. He also has an online discipleship course at https://biblegps.teachable.com/.

Other churches are also supporting Kobus. Indian River Presbyterian was the first to step up and offer support. New Creation Family Church, an ECO church in St. Petersburg, is also helping. Some churches are reluctant to support church plants. After all, the effort may fail. Church planting is difficult and uncertain work. I look at it differently—there is a chance that it will succeed. Even if it does not, it is worth the effort. Who knows what God might do?

Kobus has named the plant GPS Church. It stands for "God's People Serving." You will be hearing more about it. How can you get involved? To start, you can pray:

- For their first gathering in May, which is a buildup to their launch in September (the gathering will be in the meeting room of the Best Western in Navarre)
- For healthy and mature leadership
- For financial support to cover the cost of rental space, marketing, and the honorarium for the worship leader

I am excited about what God is doing here at PCPC and in our presbytery. Let's plant a church!

Last year, the Palm City Presbyterian Church Mission Committee generously

granted funding to House of Hope to purchase a commercial mixer for use in our Elisabeth Lahti Nutrition Center. The mixer has been in use for almost a year. It is very helpful in food preparation, especially in support of the new PIE Lab social enterprise program operating in collaboration with our partner, The Inner



Truth Project, Treasure Coast's leader in providing therapeutic services to survivors of sexual trauma. This program is a series of classes that provides culinary training in an atmosphere that supports and empowers participants' self-esteem and entrepreneurial spirit.

We are excited to announce

that the first group of students graduated in April! Four clients of The Inner Truth Project became Food Safe Certified and enhanced their culinary skills for future employment in the industry. The program also developed their business management, customer service, and marketing skills within a safe environment that provided socialization opportunities with emotional support for their continued recovery from past experiences. These first participants were excited to return for the next class, apply for a paid internship at House of Hope, or use their skills to find employment. They shared how they not only value the culinary training, but felt more confident at the end of this first session, growing to trust and feel safe with the male instructors, our own Dave Lee and Andrew Funcke. This speaks volumes about the benefits of the program beyond what can be measured in pies made or sold.

PIE Lab stands for Positive Integrated Experiences. Mindi Fetterman, the founder of The Inner Truth Project, says of the program, "Positive Integrated Experiences are baked into the lives of survivors' stories, and they are using the ingredient you so generously contributed: HOPE." The class is free to participants, and thanks to grantors and supporters like PCPC, future sessions hope to include a broader base of clients, from Inner Truth and House of Hope, with the opportunity for higher pie production that can generate revenue for the sustainability of the program.

Molly and Danny Mangold started their mission in 2014 with the prospect of building a home for orphans and

widows in Wiaga, Ghana (West Africa). This building will also serve as their mission base. They also seek to reach the lost and share the gospel with unreached people groups (18 groups in Ghana), have a cross-cultural training center, and disciple and assist in Bible translation.



Danny and Molly and their four children recently returned from Ghana, where they, with God's blessing, finalized the paperwork and title process for the land that was purchased on a previous trip to Ghana. While there, they also purchased a reliable used vehicle for the ministry, met with the local contractor and broke ground on the children's home building project. Not only did they break ground, but with our

congregation's support, they were able to erect pillars demarcating the land, finish the foundation and concrete work on phase one of the project (a modest guest house on the land), and drill a mechanized well on the property. In addition, the Mangolds reestablished relationships with previously reached tribes and villages and visited several new villages for the first time. With a strong desire to help have the Bible translated into one of the local languages, they also met a missionary couple who directed them to a Ghanaian branch of the Wycliffe Foundation that specializes in Bible translations.



What's next?

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- After a nearly three-month stay in Ghana, they
 have returned to the States to raise money for the
 next stage in the building process.
- They hope to return to Ghana in June of this year with a team willing to help assist in the construction of buildings.
- They are traveling around the USA in their converted Mission Skoolie (bus) to share the vision with anyone who will listen.

We received this update from Danny and Molly at our March mission meeting. They are dedicated, energetic, and eager to do God's work. They have viable plans for reaching their goals in Ghana. We are pleased to be a part of this project!

March was cold and blustery here,

but spring made its appearance anyway in Austria the past several weeks, as magnificent magnolia trees displayed their pearly pink blossoms, festive forsythia popped out overnight, and bright patches of narcissus and tulips appeared on dark patches of soil that were barren just days ago.

Rob organized a special service of remembrance at the International Chapel of Vienna to focus our thoughts on the suffering of Christ; suffering that He endured willingly on our behalf. The final week began as He set his face toward Jerusalem and never looked back. Isaiah 53, one of the most poignant passages in the Bible, describes the "man of sorrows, acquainted with grief," who was wounded for our sins.

In verse 2, Isaiah prophesied that the promised Savior would grow up "like a root out of dry ground." Several plants in our garden look dead, and no shoots have come up yet. It doesn't appear that anything will ever grow in that ground. How descriptive is this of the unfavorable conditions in which the Messiah would appear? The Jewish people looked for a powerful leader who would deliver them from oppression under Rome. Jesus came as a carpenter's son, traveled with a ragtag group of followers, ate and drank with people who were outcasts and talked about loving our enemies instead of conquering them.

John says, "He came to His own, and His own did not receive Him." He didn't meet their expectations. Does He meet ours? What are we hoping for? What are we looking for in a Savior? Someone who heals our diseases, answers every prayer, blesses us with wealth and happiness, guarantees our success and the success of our children, and ushers in a kingdom of peace and prosperity?

Jesus came like a root out of dry ground, struggling up from the arid desert soil. Yet in Him was life, and His life was the light of mankind. That tender shoot proved to be the giver of life and light. All who receive Him and believe in Him as Savior and Lord become the bearers of life and light. At the resurrection on the last day, our bodies will be raised incorruptible like his body; we will be whole and free from sin.

A day is coming when the Root of Jesse will stand as a banner for the peoples (Isaiah 11:12), and many nations will rally to Him. "He will reach out His hand a second time to reclaim the remnant of His people from the nations where they are scattered." The entire creation will be restored—the wolf, the lamb, and the leopard will lie down together.



MOPS Update by Kristen Puzzo



Spotlight on Deacons: Bob & Sallie Snyder



Bob and (Sallie) Snyder moved to Stuart 2 1/2 years ago Portland, from Oregon, where we were memof Lake Grove Presbyterian Church for the nine years we lived there.

Prior to that, we were in Gold Beach, Oregon; Ashland, Oregon; and Carmel, California. We returned to Florida to be close to family — daughter Robin, her husband Marc, granddaughter Jessica and two great-granddaughters in Jupiter, and Bob's twin brother, Bill, in Lake Placid, Florida.

We both retired from public education in the Miami-Dade School District, where we were teachers and administrators. Since retiring, we have volunteered wherever we have lived. Among other activities, in Ashland, Bob volunteered at Crater Lake. In Carmel, Bob volunteered for four years at the Monterey Bay Aquarium and was asked to head the Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History for two years to save it from being closed (which he successfully did). He also spent a summer living and working as a volunteer guide at Yosemite National Park. Then in Portland, he volunteered at Tryon Creek State Park and became the president of their volunteer organization, Friends of Tryon Creek. addition to making furniture, including beautiful benches for parks throughout Oregon.

In Ashland, I was a board member of the Tudor Guild, a group that supported the Oregon Shakespeare Festival through proceeds from their gift shop. Sermons in May






