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# If Change Is Inevitable, Let's Change for the Better

Exciting things are happening at our church. As we begin a busy fall season, I want to update you on a few items of interest. We want everyone to be well-informed because we are in this together.

We are growing. Most of the problems we have are growing pains. We are trying to structure our church for continued growth.

#### VISIONING PROCESS

What you may already know: PCPC exists to make disciples of Jesus Christ. This happens when people come to faith in Christ and when Christians grow in their faith. Specifically, we want to develop spiritually mature, resilient, fruitful disciples. Also, our context affects our strategy. Our community is predominantly retirees and young families. We have three elementary schools within a three-mile radius and a middle school across the street. That doesn't mean we ignore everyone else. We have a weekly young adult group. However, as we plan our programs and events, we focus on our context. We will not ignore either group. We seek a balanced approach.

What you may not know: Earlier this year, the session began a visioning process. The goal is to develop a plan with 3, 5, and 10-year goals, along with strategies to make these goals a reality. We have contracted with an ECO-trained facilitator who will lead us through the rest of the process. On his advice, we have formed a visioning team. Our visioning team is David Mauldin, Jason Pridmore, Sherrey Pridmore, Richie Kim, Andrea Wood, Russ Rykse, Susan Hastings, Tom Lytle, La Barbara Chenault, Kristine

Gunn, Beth Castle, and Amy Kitchell. We are a mix of staff, elders, and hardworking volunteers. We represent all three services. We will meet with the consultant for two days this fall, then twice more in the spring. Expect to hear updates as this unfolds.

#### STAFF CHANGES

What you may already know: We ordained Jason Pridmore in June, and he is growing in his role as assistant pastor. Richie Kim now leads our youth ministry (see last month's newsletter). We have a part-time administrative assistant, Charity Maehl (again, see last month's newsletter).

What you may not know: Our pastor nominating team remains active. Ideally, we will have a senior pastor and two assistant pastors. I call this our triangle strategy. (See the June newsletter.) The pastors will work closely as a team. We have not had any promising candidates for months. This surprised me because I have seen so many good pastors come into our presbytery in recent years. But those were solo or senior pastors. Assistant pastors are rarer. I believe the results so far have been providential. We need time to get Jason settled into his new role before we add the additional pastor. The pastor nominating team remains convinced that God will send the right person at the



#### RENOVATIONS

What you may have noticed: We have remodeled lower Langill, adding an impressive audio-visual array. This allows outside groups to use the screen without changing the computer settings, and it gives us the ability to livestream classes—plus a lot more. We are remodeling the offices with new flooring, fresh paint, etc. If you haven't seen the changes, you need to check them out. Warning: not all work is finished yet!

What you may not know: The cost to the church has been relatively low. The audio-visual system in lower Langill was given by an anonymous donor. The renovations in Lower Langill were also paid for by a different anonymous donor. We have purchased the materials for the office renovations, but most of the work has been done by our staff and volunteers. Our hard-working operations manager, Tom Mooney, has put in a lot of hours, especially on weekends. Dave Castle, a church member and professional contractor, has given generously of his time. It turns out Doug, our custodian, has a master's touch hanging drywall. Our facilities guys, Larry and Herb, also do outstanding work. This list is not exhaustive. Hailey Westall and Jade Pridmore painted and applied wallpaper. Naturally, Jason and Sherrey were involved. Honestly, I can't list everyone who has helped. Apologies to anyone not named. We want our facilities to be inviting, comfortable, and tasteful.

#### **CONCERT SERIES PLANNED**

Our director of traditional music, Reva Rogers, is planning a concert series—seven concerts between now and May. In addition to our usual concerts at Christmas and Easter, we hope to host a number of recitals featuring our singers and other musicians. We see this as a gift to our community, as well as a way to make connections with our neighbors. We want to provide these concerts free of charge to those who attend. #### THANK YOU, PARISH NURSES

For the past ten years, our parish nurses have visited


members in the hospital and followed up during recovery. Pastor Dick Anderson started the parish nursing program with Pat Stuart, who has been head parish nurse ever since. On more than one occasion, a member has been in the hospital getting every test imaginable, and doctors have been stumped. A parish nurse has suggested, "Have they looked for this condition?" The patient asked the doctor and that was the problem. The nurses have helped in countless other ways.

Our parish nursing program is coming to an end, however. Our nurses have been working hard for a long time. We have not been successful in recruiting enough new, trained nurses to keep the effort going successfully. And, importantly, the program is not needed the way it was. When the parish nurses began, our deacons functioned like a local missions committee. They gave grants to local mission partners. Now, our deacons provide pastoral care and leadership to the congregation. Deacons visit members in the hospital. Deacons follow up with meals, etc. With an active group of deacons meeting this need, the parish nurses felt they could relinquish this ministry to the deacons.

Our parish nurses deserve recognition and thanks. We currently have five parish nurses: Pat Stuart, Elsie Martineau, Judy McDonald, Lynn Church, and Gerri Strong. Thank you, nurses!

#### A Question

Is our church changing? I'd say we are growing, expanding, and improving. I hope, however, that we are not losing any essential part of our identity. People do not fear change. They fear loss. Change is inevitable. Perhaps some loss is as well. But we cling stubbornly to the core values that make us who we are. We are Christ-centered with a high view of the authority of scripture. We are Reformed in our theology and polity. This means we emphasize God's grace, and we are led by elders in a collaborative system of governance. We value solid preaching and teaching, good music, and relationships. We love missions. We love planting churches. We are proud to be ECO (A Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians). We love and care for one another, even if we drive one another a little crazy from time to time. And, we are not our own. We have been bought with a price (1 Corinthians 6:20). Therefore, everything we do is for the glory of God.

#### MAKING CHRIST KNOWN AND CHANGING LIVES



We went to Puerto Rico this past summer for our youth summer mission trip. Brian Yager was one of those participants. While there, he was asked to return two weeks later and serve as head chef for a summer youth camp. We supported him in his venture back down to Puerto Rico. I love that we have people in our church willing to put themselves out there as missionaries that we have raised up, equipped, and sent out from within our own congregation to serve in the mission field. These are Brian's reflections on that time.

## The Kitchen Became My Mission Field (by Brian Yager)

While on my first trip to Puerto Rico with the PCPC Youth Mission Group, our contacts from the VBS (Ramon and Lavinia Ibanez) asked if I would lead the kitchen for the Word of Life Ministries Summer Camp group coming in behind us. I agreed to come back and help them.



The camp had not been used since before COVID, so you can imagine how dirty it was. It took all day to clean and sanitize the kitchen before we could bring in food, and all day for a team of many to clean and sanitize the bathrooms and showers. The kitchen was limited in equipment (there was no working oven); there were only large cauldrons and large roasting

pans. On top of that, there was no hot water in the kitchen or anywhere on campus, so we had to boil water to wash and sanitize pots and pans (we also used lots of bleach), and we all took cold showers.





There were about 95 campers between the ages of 14 and 18. Each day was filled with laughter, fun and games, worship and prayer, free time, and, of course, three meals a day with lots of snacks in between. I was head of the kitchen and was responsible for feeding the 120 campers and staff. The people in charge of the group saved money by acquiring much of the food from a local San Jose food bank, so thankfully, there was a lot of chicken and pork loins. I had two volunteers (both deaf) to assist me in the kitchen for each meal, plus they also had some of the campers help, depending on their schedule of activities. The kitchen helpers made beans and rice for every meal, which the local campers loved. The volunteer youth group from the Tampa, Florida area even liked the beans and rice by the time we left.



Each day started with a two-hour worship service, which included a message. From there, the group went into activities or Bible study. Each day ended with entertainment, fun, and laughter – lights out at 11 p.m. On the final day, there was a "best of" ceremony where they recognized the best basketball player, soccer player, singer, entertainer, etc.; and, no, I did not win anything.



All during the week, campers placed ribbons on a cross; these ribbons meant they either came to know Jesus, accepted Jesus, or laid significant parts of their life at His feet as an act of repentance, prayer, and/or surrender. There were about 40 by Sunday's closing. This was a powerful image for us all.

These mission trips changed me. I grew closer to God and increased my understanding, acceptance, and worship of Jesus and the Holy Spirit. I grew internally, not necessarily from what the teaching and preaching were about (it did help tremendously), but more from my relationship with others and openness to God's voice. With everything I've gone through in the last year and a half, I am still reinventing myself. I was feeling a call to the mission field, but I wasn't

sure if I wanted to follow that path. I accepted the second trip to help me decide. Now, I truly believe mission work is in my future!

# The Salvation Army (by Wendy Voliva)

Who we are: The Salvation Army, an international movement, is an evangelical part of the Christian Church. Its message

is based on the Bible. Its ministry is motivated by the love of God. Its mission is to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and to meet human needs in His name without discrimination.

Our history: Soon after beginning his ministerial career in England in 1852, William Booth abandoned the concept of the traditional church pulpit in favor of taking the gospel of Jesus Christ directly to the people. Walking the streets of London, he preached to the poor, the homeless, the hungry, and the destitute. Fellow clergymen disagreed with Booth's unconventional approach, but he and his wife Catherine persevered. Within ten years, their organization, operating under the name The Christian Mission, had over 1,000 volunteers and evangelists. When Booth read a printer's proof of the 1878 Christian Mission annual report, he noticed the statement, "The Christian Mission is a volunteer army." Crossing out the words "volunteer army," he penned in "Salvation Army." From those words came the basis of the foundation deed of The Salvation Army.

Today: The Salvation Army is active in virtually every corner of the world and serves in 133 countries, offering the message of God's healing and hope to all those in need. The Salvation Army in Martin County helps our community in many ways, such as the Christmas assistance program (kids under 12), Adult Rehabilitation Centers (provide spiritual, social, and emotional assistance for men who have lost the ability to cope with their problems

and provide for themselves),

Continued from page 5 raising awareness of the injustices of human trafficking by partnering with local coalitions, and disaster relief efforts. As Tropical Storm Idalia began to form into a hurricane, The Salvation Army's Florida Emergency Disaster Services personnel and equipment were being readied to serve disaster survivors immediately following Idalia's landfall and impacts. Over 20,000 snacks and 30,000 meals were served, and emotional and spiritual care was provided to more than 2,000 persons. The most pressing need is for non-perishable food items and cash gifts. Food can be donated at the food distribution center at 821 SE Martin Luther King Blvd. in Stuart or dropped at the church office, and our volunteers will deliver it. 

ter Kate Kinnally in 2015 as a community center to teach local women and families useful skills that enable them to achieve a better life. House of Hope is honored to have inherited this Center from the Sisters in July and is committed to upholding the shared mission of serving Indiantown families.

The KinDoo Family Center for Enrichment will continue programs started by the Sisters. It will also offer programs proven to be successful for the community at House of Hope's Golden Gate or Jensen Beach Centers for Enrichment. Programs at Kindoo will include sewing, ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages), nutrition classes, a Let's Start Learning Kindergarten Readiness program, as well as access to a computer lab. There is also a new outdoor learning environment for youth participants.

**IRA Giving:** You may be able to give annually directly to the church from your IRA. IRA giving may also help you satisfy the minimum distribution requirements.



## Liturgists

Liturgists are integral to our traditional services as they assist the pastor in leading worship.

#### What does the liturgist do?

Liturgists guide the congregation's participation through the day's service order, starting with a warm welcome and an introduction to the first hymn. They lead congregational participation in the Call to Worship and the Affirmation of Faith. They call the ushers up, opening the offering time with an invitation, and close it with a prayer of thanksgiving. The


liturgist then reads the day's scripture leading into the pastor's sermon. At the 8:30 service, they also close the service with a benediction.

#### Who qualifies to be a liturgist?

The liturgist position is generally filled by someone comfortable reading and leading our congregation. It does not have to be an elder or deacon. It can be someone young or old. They should have a good, clear speaking voice. They should also be able to read at a measured pace so the congregation can understand and follow along easily.

#### How do I volunteer as a liturgist?
