HOW TO GET INVOLVED

Your Patience Appreciated

In September, we return to normal venues for worship. The new audio-visual and lighting systems in the Huizenga Family Life Center (HFLC) will have been installed. You should notice many improvements. Visually, you won't be able to miss the LED video wall behind our worship band, Cornerstone. The lighting will be different, too. We will have two separate lighting systems in HFLC: one when it is used as a gym, the other for worship. The gym lighting is the old system, now updated with LED lights. The worship lighting system is entirely new.

Our goal is to make people forget they are in a gym. We want you not to notice the environment and instead focus on worship. That will be difficult at first. Your mind will constantly register the changes. Be patient. After a few weeks, you will become accustomed to your surroundings. The new will become familiar. You will put the changes out of your mind and, hopefully, enjoy worship even more.

With the new system, we can change the lighting during the service. Our old system allowed us to have the overhead fluorescent lights at 25%, 50%, 75%, or 100%. The new system is much more flexible, allowing us to make adjustments that will set the right mood for the moment. That's not manipulation. It provides the best atmosphere. For example, in our contemporary service, the song before the scripture reading always has a quieter, more meditative feel. That mood prepares our hearts to receive God's Word. Now, we can do something similar with lighting.

You should notice improvements in the overall sound. An electronic drum set and in-ear monitors for the band mean less sound "pollution" coming from the stage. You'll hear a cleaner sound from the speakers. We added more acoustic panels to the walls to reduce echo. Hopefully, if you worship at our contemporary service, the room will simply sound better.

If you watch our contemporary livestream, you will see significant improvements. We now have improved, properly placed stage lighting and high-quality cameras.



Thank you to all our donors who made these improvements possible. They were needed. We had equipment that was old, and some of it was failing. We also desperately needed to improve our livestream and in-person experience. Technology has become a critical part of ministry. In the past 10 years, the importance of technology in churches has increased tremendously. A church that does not use technology effectively does not reach people effectively. That's the world we live in. We want to reach people effectively.

Two warnings!

One: Our new systems are designed to be as user-friendly as possible. However, there is a level of complexity to systems this powerful. It will take us a while to work out the bugs. It will take us longer to utilize them to their full potential. Please, be patient.

We want the integration of the new technology to be as smooth as possible. You should be thinking about the pastor's message, not the pastor's microphone! If something goes wrong, we will adapt and improvise and do the best we can and move on. In the end, we are here to worship. We should not let glitches get in the way.

Two: What if you don't like something that changed? Most of the changes should be such obvious improvements that you will welcome them. However, there may be something you notice that you don't like. For example, we've painted the HFLC gym grey. Before, it was a kind of mustard yellow. Several people have said they love the new color. A few find it too dark. If you find yourself unhappy with something, please give it a little time. Maybe we will get it right. Suppose on our first Sunday back in the HFLC, you find the music too loud. Do not assume it will always be too loud. We are learning. The next week, it may be better. If the lights are too bright or too dim, give us time. We've literally never used this system before! Please don't expect perfection right away!

Or, you may get used to the change. After a few weeks, you may forget about the thing that bothered you, and you will simply enjoy worship.

I am thankful that we are committed to fulfilling that mission and constantly improving. We want people to walk in and find it easy to worship, whether they are in our sanctuary or the HFLC. When people connect online, we want nothing to get in the way of the music and the message.

Our Audio-Visual-Lighting Improvement Project has been a long journey. It won't be complete until we can fully utilize the marvelous equipment we have. Thank you for your support and your patience.

The Basics of Christian Stewardship

Using our days wisely means prioritizing God's kingdom—spending time in prayer, worship, Bible study, and service. Every moment can be an offering when we live with eternal purposes in mind.

Talents: God has equipped each of us with unique gifts to serve the body of Christ (1 Peter 4:10 "...use whatever gifts you have received..."). Whether teaching, encouraging, building, cooking, leading, or simply offering a listening ear, our talents become powerful tools when surrendered to Him. Stewardship means identifying these gifts and using them to build up others and advance God's mission.

True stewardship flows from gratitude for what God has done for us in Christ. As we manage our resources, we participate in His work, glorify His name, and store up treasures in heaven (Matthew 6:19-21).

We invite you to prayerfully consider your own stewardship—your finances, time, and talents—and ask God how He would have you use them for His glory and the good of His church.


Sherry Sloat

CSA Traveling Team

Pastor Yinho lives out Matthew 28:19–20a (NIV): "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." He began his ministry by recognizing that soccer ("fútbol") could be a powerful way to disciple young people, teaching them how to evangelize and share the Word of the Lord. His team, JETSET V, stands for

"Jesus Es Tu Salvador, Entrégale Tu Vida" (Jesus is Your Savior, Give Him Your Life). Their jerseys display this message in languages, many and they wherever travel, people stop to find it in their own tongue— creating an opportunity to conversation begin

about Jesus, our Savior. Team members carry pamphlets and Bibles to hand out as they walk among spectators, athletes, and coaches. They've been to several Olympics and World Cups. They aren't always there to play, although some of these young men go on to become professional soccer players. Their goal is to "go and make disciples of all nations" and spread the word about Jesus.

Pastor Yinho recalls that, early in his ministry, event organizers often told him he couldn't speak about

Christianity. Yet in conversations—usually through his interpreter, Mateo, one of his players—his warm smile and compelling stories opened unexpected doors. Invitations soon followed, giving him opportunities to enter the right places and share the message of Jesus. Bold and passionate about the Word, Pastor Yinho inspires his team, who eagerly carry his enthusiasm wherever they go.

What an exciting and interesting time we had hosting this team of young men! From the time they arrived on August 10th until they left on the

20th, there was never a dull moment. Their tournament was nearby, giving the team time to rest before facing several days of play in extreme heat. Afternoon storms often interrupted matches, with games paused for lightning delays. Coming from the Christian Soccer Asso-

ciation (CSA) of Colombia, the players were unaccustomed to the heavy humidity and torrential rain—conditions far different from Bogotá. Despite the challenges, they advanced to the finals on Saturday evening and finished as runners-up.

The team enjoyed wonderful accommodations in Langill Hall, made possible by your generous donations of mattresses and bedding. Thanks to your gifts of food and financial support, we were also able to provide several breakfasts and a few dinners. The hall was quiet, cool, and the perfect place for them to rest and reflect. In total, 17 people stayed there, including coaches, players, and the team "mom."









It was a Godsend that we had hosts for the two ladies, which allowed us to keep the upstairs of Langill Hall "guys only" for easier access to showers. A heartfelt thank-you to Madonna and Gary Hunt for welcoming them into their home for the week. With Madonna fluent in Spanish, they enjoyed meaningful conversations together. Later, Kim and Rob Johnson hosted the ladies for the last three

nights, making great use of Google Translate as they got to know one another.

On their first night, the mission committee hosted a welcome dinner with our youth group, planned by Jessica Waltersdorff and youth ministry specialist David Amerson. It was a joy to see both groups sharing a meal and beginning to connect in faith. As the days passed, everyone grew more comfortable, greeting one another with smiles, hugs, and handshakes. Before every meal, they waited for Pastor Yinho's blessing—and then ate heartily! Tom, our operations manager and chief cook, was there by 6:30 a.m. each day, preparing meals while practicing a few words of Spanish.

I learned at the beginning of their stay that this trip was two-fold. In addition to being a mission trip, Pastor Yinho was mentoring Ricardo, one of the coaches, to branch out and start his own team within CSA. This takes us right back to Matthew 28 and the message of the Great Commission. A few of these team members didn't know a lot about Jesus, and each morning they had devotionals after breakfast. Curtis Burnam, our missionary partner from Missionary Gospel Fellowship and a friend of Pastor Yinho, came a few times to teach them about discipleship. His ministry is working with youth and groups in Latin America. On the last day of his teaching, five of them boldly confirmed their faith in Jesus. It was worth the whole trip!

On the final night of their visit, Rob and Kim Johnson welcomed the team to their home for swimming and a cookout. While chatting with Pastor Yinho—his animated gestures brought to life through Mateo's translations—he shared something very moving: "Even though they can't understand you, they have seen your love every day. Many don't have a stable family life, but from what your church has done for them, they now know what love is."



A famous landmark in Maine is the Portland Head Light. This lighthouse is Maine's oldest lighthouse, dating back to 1791.
