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Slowing Your Heart Rate Down



Here's a shout out to the biggest Diamondbacks fan at CVLC, and the biggest Diamondbacks fan I know: Suellen Kennedy.

As I'm writing this, it's the 3rd inning of game 4 and the Rangers are already beating the Diamondbacks 10-0 and Jonah just walked into out living room (after eating too much Halloween candy) and started pulling dirty laundry out of his hamper one by one and throw-

ing them into the middle of the room. Yep, that's my life.

But, I want to talk about sports leadership and it's connection to church leadership.

Don Yaeger, part of the Maxwell Leadership team highlights the Arizona Diamondbacks in short video on leadership. He says these young players consistently say in post-game interviews that a big part of their success is that they are able to slow down their heart rate. (see link for video at the end of this article)

Think about it. If your heart is racing and you are tense, you wont be able to react quickly on defense to get to the ball, nor will you be able to react offensively to a pitch. Slowing down your heart rate is key to success on the ball field.

This is also key to church leadership in several ways.

First, spiritually. You cannot prayerfully meditate when your heart is racing. You might be able to pray a quick prayer when your heart is racing. But, those prayers are usually cries for help. A deep relational prayer where you grow closer to God by feeling closer to the presence of the divine takes a different type of prayer ... a prayer that requires you to slow down your heart rate. This is most certainly a challenge today where there is so much to do, so much stress, kid throwing dirty laundry into your living room while you are simultaneously writing a Venture article and watching the world series ... it's hard to slow down and focus on the presence of the divine.

Like every Reformation Sunday, this past Sunday we read Psalm 46 where God orders us to "Be still and know that I Am God." Slowing down your heart rate is a key spiritual discipline if we are to know God deeply.

Second, pastorally. Pastor here means care-giver (as opposed to priest). Anyone can be a care giver. When someone comes to you in need, and they are all over the place, and their heart is going 200 beats per minute, you can't calm them down if you cannot calm yourself down. To give them the care they need, you need to be able to slow down your heart rate. If you get all wound up with them, you probably wont help them calm down, relax, and help them remember that God is still in control.


Third, administratively. Most ministry happens in community at Christus Victor. Whether it's a group working together on a quilt or people sitting in a meeting, it's not unusual for things to get heated. At some point someone will say something that will get a reaction out of others (sometimes this is good, but not always). Leaders often ask the question "are you a thermometer that follows the temperature in the room or a thermostat that can change the temperature of the room?" In order to make an unnecessarily hot situation cool down, you need to lower your heart rate. In seminary, they call this being a "non-anxious presence." When someone goes off the rails, don't go off the rails with them. Lower our heart rate and be a non-anxious presence. Easier said that done.

Earlier this year, in August, the Arizona Diamondbacks were on the skids. They lost 9 games in a row from August 1st to August 11th. How did they turn it around to make the World Series just 2 months later? I bet they were able to lower their heart rate.

It's now 10-1. Go Diamondbacks! (That one's for you, Suellen!)

- 135 large boxes of instant mashed potatoes STILL NEED ONE 13 OZ BOX
- 135 cans of cranberries.

We plan on putting the bags together with everything except the turkey's on Sunday November 19th after church. On Monday November 20th we can pick up the turkey's, add them to the totes and deliver them to Lowes Grove Middle School and to some church members.

We certainly can use volunteers for both days. This is our largest giving comfort opportunity so far.

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WHY DO WE USE THE WORD "THANKS"?

We say the word "thanks" a lot in a day. We thank our spouse or partner for filling our coffee cup, we end emails with the word "thanks", and we thank people for holding the door for us. As parents, we teach our children to say thank you when someone gives them a cookie, compliments their new outfit, or shares a toy with them. Giving thanks is actually a common occurrence in our daily lives.

So when we think about thanking God, the word "thanks" seems too much small. After all, He gives us everything. He gives us our bodies and everything we need for daily life. He keeps us safe. He gave His Only Son on the cross to die for our sins so we could have forgiveness and eternal life with Him. He gives us the Holy Spirit to work faith in our hearts through His Word and Sacraments. And He continues to provide for us in mind, body, and spirit the length of our lives on earth. It seems too little to just say, "Thank you, God!"

In this season of gratitude, it can be easy to see "giving thanks" as the world sees it — as merely recognizing the good things in your life, appreciating your family, and muttering a quick "Thanks, God" before enjoying a feast of Thanksgiving food. But Christian Thanksgiving is different, Believers throughout the Bible give us examples to follow as we learn about thanking God. Consider how these two well-known believers thanked the Lord and how you can do the same or something similar.

DAVID

King David had a lot to be thankful for: God made him king of Israel, God helped him win victories over Israel's enemies, and God forgave him his sins. We can learn a lot about giving thanks by reading David's psalms. The first lesson is that thanking God often takes the form of singing and playing instruments. In Psalm 7:17, David wrote, "I will give to the Lord the thanks due to His righteousness, and I will sing praise to the name of the Lord, the Most High." Another lesson from David is that we are called to thank God in front of others. He wrote in Psalm 57:9, "I will give thanks to You, O Lord, among the peoples; I will sing to You among the nations."

PAUL

Paul's letters are filled with verses of thanks to God. He constantly thanks God for Christ's victory over sin, death, and the devil. He thanks God for protecting him, and for giving him his brothers and sisters in Christ. As you read these verses, it's easy to forget that Paul wrote many of his letters while he was in prison, while he was being persecuted, or while he was on dangerous missionary journeys.

It's easier to thank God in peaceful moments, such as in a church service or when we are around a big table of food with our loved ones. But it's much harder to thank God in those everyday moments when we feel bored, overwhelmed, lonely, or hopeless. Yet Paul reminds us in 1 Thessalonians 5:18, "Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."

I encourage you to begin being aware of your thanking God on a daily basis starting today. That will mean that by Thanksgiving Day, you will be in the habit. You will personally benefit and God will be pleased.

ANOTHER WAY MARTIN LUTHER SHARED GOD'S MESSAGE

Much information about Martin Luther has been shared in the last weeks but here is something else to add to your treasury of knowledge:

Martin Luther was an enthusiastic singer, capable lute player, and prolific hymn writer who composed "sermons in sound." This church reformer and cultural influencer hosted choral parties at his house and filled every church service with song, even urging illiterate congregants to join in with the choir.

Singing had its subversive uses too. Since the fateful day the young monk posted his inflammatory Ninety-Five Theses on the Wittenberg church door and then refused to recant his radical disputations, the church outlawed him as a heretic and banned his writings. But where books could not go, songs readily could. Martin Luther combined familiar German tunes with catchy theological lyrics to broadcast the Reformation message of God's liberating grace. Regardless of listener's ability to read, their social standing, or even their physical location, the songs spread quickly. It is reported that literally everyone was "gladly singing" Luther's infectious songs — collapsing the old divides between secular and the sacred, the domestic and the public, the here and now and the eternal.

Think about what words quickly come to mind when you hear the first musical notes of one of the songs we sing in church. What message are you hearing?


Hi All!
