

The book features cherished recipes from church members long ago, including Brian McNeill's mother's Plain Muffins, Chuck Sim's grandmother's hearty Catfish Stew, and Mrs. W.S. Patterson's unforgettable Caramel Cake. You'll also find sweet favorites like Mrs. Billy Roberts' Coconut Ice Box Cookies, Mrs. Thad Childs' Apricot Ice Box Cake, and Mrs. M.E. 

"The Preacher Who Wrote a Bestselling Medical Manual"




Wesley's motivation wasn't simply to heal the body—it was rooted in his theology. He believed that spiritual and physical well-being were deeply intertwined. A sound body supported a sound soul. And with physicians often financially out of reach for the poor, Wesley saw this work as an extension of his ministry.

Some of his advice might raise eyebrows today: he recommended "holding a live puppy against your stomach" for abdominal pain and prescribed "toad powder" (yes, powdered toad) for asthma. Still, many remedies—such as the use of herbs, fresh air, and moderation in eating and drinking—were ahead of their time and foreshadowed modern holistic medicine.

When most people hear the name John Wesley, they picture the impassioned preacher on horseback, trailblazing across 18th-century England to spread the Methodist movement. But what if we told you he also moonlighted as a best-selling medical author?

In 1747, Wesley published Primitive Physic: An Easy and Natural Method of Curing Most Diseases, a humble handbook filled with remedies for everything from headaches to hysteria. Its mission? To make healthcare accessible, affordable, and understandable to the everyday person. The book struck a chord—Primitive Physic went through 32 editions and became one of the most widely circulated medical guides of its time.



Through Primitive Physic, John Wesley preached a gospel of wellness, bridging science, faith, and compassion. In doing so, he left behind not just a movement, but a medical manual that reflected the beating heart of his mission: healing the whole person. John Wesley's Primitive Physic stands in stark contrast to contemporary medical guides in both content and approach. While modern medical texts are grounded in rigorous scientific research, peer-reviewed studies, and standardized clinical practices, Wesley's manual was a blend of folk remedies, religious philosophy, and empirical observation. His goal was accessibility—offering affordable, natural treatments to the poor—whereas today's guides prioritize evidence-based protocols and often require professional interpretation. That said, Wesley was surprisingly ahead of his time in promoting preventive care, hygiene, and lifestyle changes—principles that remain central to modern medicine. However, many of his suggested cures, such as using electricity for melancholia or herbal concoctions with questionable efficacy, would not meet today's safety or efficacy standards.

In essence, Primitive Physic reflects an 18th-century attempt to democratize healthcare, while modern guides emphasize precision, specialization, and scientific validation. Both, in their own ways, aim to empower people to care for their health—but with very different tools.


