Kyrie - Knowing God's "Hesed" (Loving-Kindness)

Presider: As we begin, we call to mind times we could not discern peace from complacence.

Jesus, Gift of God's Justice, when we fail to share our resources with those in need.

[R] God, forgive us. Empower us to live the Gospel.

Jesus, Gift of God's Compassion, when we allow discrimination against others and when we benefit from it.

[R] God, forgive us. Empower us to live the Gospel.

Jesus, Gift of God's Peace, when we accept divisiveness instead of building bridges.

[R] God, forgive us. Empower us to live the Gospel.

ALL: May God, who is Love, forgive our indifference to the Gospel and strengthen us to live with more generosity, compassion, and peace. Amen.

Opening Prayer

Presider: God of Justice, God of Peace, You call us to challenge the status quo **and** to build bridges. You call us to accountability **and** to reconciliation. You call us to tear down systems of oppressions and walls of indifference, even as You call us to build up the kin-dom of God. LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading Jer 38:1-10

A Reading from the Prophet Jeremiah

The ancient city of Jerusalem was under siege from the Babylonian Empire. The city was surrounded. The King himself took position at the city's gate, the front lines.

Jeremiah, the prophet, spoke to the people of Jerusalem saying: "This is what Your God says:

'Whoever stays in this city will die by sword, famine, or plague; but whoever goes over to the Babylonians will live. Their lives shall be spared them. They will be spoils of war, but they will live. For this city will be given into the hands of the army of the ruler of Babylon. The city will be captured and ravaged.'"

Four officials heard this statement. These officials said to the ruler, "This so-called prophet ought to be put to death! By speaking such words, he is weakening the resolve of the soldiers who are left in this city! And he is weakening the resolve of all the people! He's not seeking the good of our city, but our ruin."

Zedekiah, the King of Judah, said, "This prophet, Jeremiah, is in your hands; for I am in no position to do anything to oppose you."

So, they took Jeremiah and threw him into a cistern in the courtyard of the guard, letting Jeremiah down by ropes. There was no water in the cistern, only mud; and Jeremiah sank in the mud.

But Ebed-Melek, Ethiopian court official in the royal palace, heard that they had put the prophet Jeremiah in the cistern while the king sat powerless in the Benjamin Gate.

Ebed-Melek went up to the king and said, "I am your servant; you are still my ruler. These officials have done evil to Jeremiah, the prophet. They have thrown him into a cistern where he will starve to death. There is no longer any bread in the city."

The ruler then commanded Ebed-Melek, the Ethiopian, "Take three of my servants with you and lift Jeremiah, the prophet, out of the cistern before he dies."

Our response: You are our help and our deliverer.

All: You are our help and our deliverer.

Knowing that speaking truth to those around us is not always welcomed... we pray ...

All: You are our help and our deliverer.

That with the great cloud of witnesses we support and celebrate all the ministries of women in the church, from Mary Magdalene right up to the present moment ... we pray ...

All: You are our help and our deliverer.

Scripture commands us to treat foreigners the same as citizens, and to love them equally, remembering that we, too, were once foreigners. Let us work to make our country welcoming to migrants, immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees ... we pray ...

All: You are our help and our deliverer.

In thanksgiving for the warmth of summer, and for the enormity and diversity of the cosmos, God's original and continuing self-revelation ... we pray ...

All: You are our help and our deliverer.

The Earth contains the dust of countless generations of our ancestors, as well as the blood of Jesus and of our contemporaries killed in war. May this God-beloved Earth become for them and for us the garden of resurrection and new life ... we pray ...

All: You are our help and our deliverer.

For those who have worked to divide us – two against three, parents against children, friends against each other – and for the times we have faltered in our work of building bridges across those divides … we pray as Jesus said we should …

All: You are our help and our deliverer.

Now it is time to bring to God the personal prayers and intentions of our hearts, as the Spirit prompts us.

All who wish to share a prayer here in person, please come forward to the microphone. All who wish to share a prayer online, please raise your physical or digital hand and you will be called on in turn, or type your prayer in the chat and these will be read aloud.

We ask that your prayers be brief petitions, and in consideration of our diversity of perspectives, remember the universal needs of all people.

[After each petition:]

All: You are our help and our deliverer.

[After all petitions have been spoken:]

We lift up <u>all</u> those living with illness, injury, loss, and suffering, those who have gone home in Holy Mystery, and all the prayers here today that have remained unspoken, deep in the silence of our hearts...

(Short pause)

For these intentions and for all the prayers remaining in the chat and in our community prayer book \dots we pray \dots

All: You are our help and our deliverer.

Presider: Our Help and Deliverer, we thank you for all who have gone before us, who cheer us onward as we navigate difficulties in our world and in our lives, - our helpers as we run our race. Teach us to be helpers and deliverers, too, we pray... **Amen.**

Our Eucharist

Presentation & Preparation of Gifts

Blessed are You, God of all creation. Through Your goodness we have this bread to offer, which earth has given and human hands have made. It will become for us the bread of life.

[R] Blessed be God forever.

Blessed are You, God of all creation. Through Your goodness we have this wine to offer, fruit of the vine and work of human hands. It will become our spiritual drink.

[R] Blessed be God forever.

Pray, friends, that sharing this bread and wine will enlarge our hearts, our souls and our very selves to welcome God more fully.

[R] In us and among us, You are with us.

Prayer with Our Gifts

Presider: Holy One, At this meal we divide the bread. We pour out the wine. In this breaking and shedding, may we know our covenant with you, with others, with all creation; may we know in our bodies that we are one, we pray...**Amen.**

Eucharistic Prayer

God dwells in you. **[R]** *And also in you.* Lift up your hearts.

[R] We lift up our hearts to God and to one another.

Presider

God of Wonder, the cosmos proclaims Your glory; the heavens your handwork! Trees of the forest sing for joy and stones cry out. Together, we give You thanks for Your goodness.

Voice 1 (online)

Creating God, in creation we are coming to know ourselves and You. The universe is coming to know itself in us. You are our unity. You are our diversity. Together, we co-create.

Voice 2 (online)

Gracious and tender-loving God, in the midst of conflict and division, You turn our minds to thoughts of peace. When Your Spirit fills our hearts, enemies begin to listen and speak to one another, hands are extended in friendship across divisions, nations seek the way of justice and peace.

Voice 3: Your Spirit is at work when hatred is quenched by compassion and vengeance gives way to forgiveness. For this, we never cease to praise You, as we join countless angels and every creature of the cosmos in song:

Wholly, wholly, holy God. God of wonder, God of peace. Heaven and earth are full of Your glory! Hosanna in the highest. Blessed are all who come in the name of God. Hosanna, hosanna, hosanna in the highest! Hosanna, hosanna in the highest!

Presider

And so, God Who is Love, we praise You through Jesus - the Word that brings healing and wholeness - the hand You stretch out to us in our weakness - the way that leads to Your peace. We recognize Your Spirit alive and at work in this bread and wine, and in us. We open ourselves to Your Spirit who transforms these gifts to become in us the body and blood of Christ, as we now fulfill your command of love. We remember that...

All: ...on the night before he died, Jesus took bread and gave You thanks and praise. He broke the bread and gave it to those at table, saying, "Take this, all of you and eat. This is my body. Do this in memory of me."

[Pause]

At the end of the meal, he lifted the cup and praised You for Your goodness, saying, "Take this, all of you, and drink. This is the cup of my life-blood, the cup of Love. Do this in memory of me."

Presider: Let us proclaim the mystery of faith: [Sung] Tompkins

We remember you, we remember you. Jesus who lives, loves, and dies, rising in our hearts.

Voice 4: Deepen our capacity to love one another. Strengthen us to overcome all that separates us. Awaken us to our communion with You in all creation. May we build Your church throughout the world as a sign of unity and an instrument of Your peace.

Voice 5: We gather with You around this table, in friendship with Mary Magdalene, the Apostle, and all the prophets and saints, living and dead. Here, may we know strength. Here, may all who suffer know consolation. Here, may all who have gone before us be remembered and blessed. Embrace them in joy. May they, and we, come to know the fullness of Your splendor.

Presider: When suffering passes and death transforms into Cosmic Love, when the fullness of Your peace is revealed, we shall give You glory with Jesus, the Cosmic Christ, through whom Your goodness flows.
