A Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans

We who are mature in faith ought to understand and be patient with the stumbling of those with a fledgling faith. Each of us should bring joy to our neighbors for their good, to build them up. Jesus did not live for personal satisfaction but, as it is written: "The insults of those who insult you have fallen on me." For everything in the Scriptures is written for our instruction. With endurance, and Scriptural encouragement, we have hope.

May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to live with one another in harmony, in the spirit of Christ Jesus, that you might glorify God with one voice.

Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ Jesus has welcomed you. Do this for the glory of God. I confer on you, just as my God conferred on me, a kin-dom, so that you may eat and drink at my table in my kin-dom."


(Please extend your hand, palm up, toward the bread and wine.)
