A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Week of the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels September 28, 2025 through October 4, 2025

Notes on the Weekday Readings—Monday: The true God is the God who gives eternal life and saves His people from the bondage of sin. The commandments identify our sin to drive us to the only Savior. The Law always accuses and condemns. This is its chief work in this life; to break our stubborn hearts and move us to cry out to our only hope. The terrifying scene at Sinai shows our need for a Mediator to go before God for us. Tuesday: All the commandments are summed up in the First. The underlying accusation of every commandment is that we do not fear, love, and trust in God above all things. The judgment of the Law is that we are rightfully condemned and deserve His wrath. Moses did not trust in the Law, but appealed to God's grace and asked Him to remember His promise, and to forgive and spare His people. Faith drives us to the God who promises salvation to poor sinners. Wednesday: Moses offered himself as an atonement for the sins of the people, yet he could not pay the price for sin and cover it. There is only One who can take our place and bear the wrath on our behalf. That is our Lord Jesus Christ, who has gone before us into death and the grave, yet could not be held by them, and in Him they cannot hold us. Thursday: The Pharisees come with the condemnation of the Law and destruction. Jesus brings the good news of God's gracious forgiveness for repentant sinners, rescuing us from the darkness of death and calling us to stand before God in His mercy. Friday: The Son of the Father takes our place under the condemnation of the Law to cover our sins as the perfect atonement. This is the joyous exchange, that the sins of the world are charged to Jesus that His righteousness might be given to the world. Though the Law rightly condemns us with abundant evidence, Jesus is convicted with no evidence. Here is the vicarious or substitutionary atonement that Christ suffered the condemnation of the Law and died in the place of all sinners.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray out loud as much as you are able, and as your family size and ages dictate. Theme of the Week: The Ministry of Michael and All the Angels of God

Invocation

Ten Commandments

You shall have no other gods.

Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy.

Honor your father and your mother.

You shall not murder.

You shall not commit adultery.

You shall not steal.

You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God. You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

You shall not covet your neighbor's house.

You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his manservant or maidservant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

What does God say about all these commandments?

He says: "I, the Lord your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments."

Apostles' Creed

I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth. And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended into hell. The third day He rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God, the Father Almighty. From thence He will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Christian church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life * everlasting. Amen.
