The Congregation at Prayer

A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer For the Week of the Second Last Sunday of the Church Year November 16, 2025 through November 22, 2025

Notes on the Weekday Readings—Monday: It was not to be Abraham's son, Isaac, who would be the sacrifice, but the Lamb of God. This substitutionary or vicarious atonement is the satisfaction that Christ made for the sins of the world by suffering the condemnation of the Law and dying in the place of sinful man. Here we see that true faith always centers on the death and resurrection of Jesus. Tuesday: Abraham did not want his son to marry one of the daughters of the Canaanite idolaters. He did not want his son to be seduced into false belief or receive any inheritance in the land apart from what God gave him. Terah's family was called out of Ur, so Nahor and his descendants had a knowledge of the true God and were connected to the promise through that call. God chose Rebekah beside a spring of water, so also today, God sets His bride, the church, apart for Himself through water in Holy Baptism. Wednesday: The servant detailed God's faithful activity in leading him to Rebekah that we might confess with Laban that this was indeed from the Lord. Rebekah willingly left her home in faith, trusting in the word of the servant that she was chosen by God who had been faithful and kind to Abraham. Isaac, mourning his mother, was comforted by his wife who was given him by God to continue to keep His promise to Abraham. **Thursday:** Rebekah had married the son of the promise, and yet at first she was barren. Isaac called upon God to keep His promise. Even with the gift of life, Rebekah needed to hear the Word of God from the mouth of His servant, because it is the Word alone that strengthens and keeps us firm in the faith. We ought not imitate Esau who sought and desired only what gave physical satisfaction, but treasure the promise of God that is given us. Friday: Though he had heard God's promise to curse those who curse him and multiply his descendants, Isaac feared for his life just as his father Abraham had before him. Once more it is God who will defend the woman He has chosen to be the mother of the bearer of the promise. Like Sarah, Rebekah would obey her husband because she trusted the Word of God's promise. Abimelech remembered the previous visit of Abraham better than Isaac and feared for his household. God used this Gentile to protect the lives of Isaac and Rebekah.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray out loud as much as you are able, and as your family size and ages dictate.

Theme of the Week: The Final Judgment of All Men

Invocation

Ten Commandments

You shall have no other gods.

Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy.

Honor your father and your mother.

You shall not murder.

You shall not commit adultery.

You shall not steal.

You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God. You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

You shall not covet your neighbor's house.

You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his manservant or maidservant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to your

neighbor.

What does God say about all these commandments?

He says: "I, the Lord your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments."

Apostles' Creed

I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth. And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended into hell. The third day He rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God, the Father Almighty. From thence He will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Christian church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life * everlasting. Amen.
