Piano side: that we might receive your forgiveness,


**Pipes side:** that we might receive your mercy.

P: Lift up your hearts.



Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread.


Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.

#### Communion

Those worshiping in-person are invited to come forward as the ushers direct you. You may receive bread and dip it into the wine or grape juice; or you may pick up one of the sealed wafer/grape juice packets or a sealed gluten free wafer and hear the words of promise before returning to your seat to open it.

Those worshiping online are invited to use your own bread and wine or grape juice at this time, saying to each other, or to yourself, "The body of Christ given for you," and "The blood of Christ shed for you." For all of us, Christ promises to be present in, with, and under the bread and wine/juice.

Children who have not yet received their first communion may come forward (in person) for a blessing, or someone in the room (worshiping online) may pause to provide that blessing, saying "Remember, God loves you" or "You are a beloved child of God."

Our worship today includes prayers and hymns reflective of the Mennonite tradition. Joel Nofziger's preaching text will be excerpts from the Sermon on the Mount – a key scriptural passage for Mennonites.

Just 7 years ago, Lutherans worldwide celebrated the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Martin Luther posting his *95 Theses* in Wittenberg, Germany in 1517 that became the catalyst for a movement in the Church that we now call the Reformation. Calls for reform within the church had existed, almost from the beginning, but the monk who became Professor who became reformer set many things in motion, including other voices calling for reform – other Reformers would follow.

On January, 21, 1525, a group of Christian Reformers including George Blaurock and Conrad Grebel gathered for a secret service in Zurich, Switzerland. They were protesting the state church and infant baptism which seemed to be more of a secular moment than spiritual decision. At the service, they baptized one another. This was the beginning of the Anabaptist Movement from which Mennonite and Amish believers stem. 'Ana' means 'again' – these first Anabaptists were 'baptized again.' It was a rebellious action that led to consternation in the Church – Catholic, Lutheran and Reformed - and the persecution of many Anabaptists.

Of course, there is much more to these stories of reform and reformers. It took almost 500 years, but there have been acts of reconciliation between Lutherans and Mennonites. Internationally, the Lutherans publicly apologized to the Mennonites at the Lutheran World Assembly in Stuttgart in 2010. Locally, the Lutherans of the SE PA Synod publicly apologized to local Mennonites at their Synod Assembly in Franconia in 2011. Congregationally, Advent Lutheran and Salford Mennonite have forged a relationship that has led to sharing work in a community garden, combining for outreach projects and joining for a Thanksgiving Eve service annually.

Our local community has a Mennonite Resource Center that supports efforts of Mennonite World Relief and a Mennonite Heritage Center that stewards Mennonite history and tradition.
