If you'd like to know more about how you can help the planet, and everything and everyone who lives on it, you'll find calls to action and information within the Presbyterian Hunger Program, which also has extensive programs to address the root causes of hunger. Opportunities abound there for both congregations and individuals.

You can also volunteer with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, which sends teams of people into distressed communities following disasters.
