2025: A Year of Transition and Beyond for St. Andrew

Christmas Eve has a way of slowing us down. We come with full lives, mixed emotions, and maybe a little weariness—and we gather around a story that reminds us that God often shows up quietly, over time, and in the middle of ordinary life.

That was true at **St. Andrew** in 2025. It was a year of transition, but also a year of steady, hopeful movement. With **the Rev. Dr. Carl Anderson** completing his first full year as our transitional pastor, we spent much of the year listening—listening to God, to one another, and to what might be next. That listening turned into real steps toward calling our next installed pastor, work that continues with care and prayer into the coming year.

It was also a year shaped by generosity. After many years of carrying building debt, St. Andrew moved strikingly close to the finish line, thanks to faithful pledges and a





remarkable legacy gift. What once felt heavy began to feel lighter, opening space to imagine new ways of serving beyond ourselves.

At the same time, life beyond these walls kept calling. Each month, hundreds of families came through our **Food Market**. Children were fed during the summer. Neighbors gathered here for meals, music, learning, mental-health support, and simple human connection. This building was busy—in the best possible way.

Worship continued to hold us together through children's pageants, Advent carols, farewells, and new beginnings. By year's end, our church motto returned to **Connecting Hearts | Renewing Lives**—a good description of what we've been experiencing.

St. Andrew's Statement of Inclusion

"Therefore welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God." - Romans 15:7

St. Andrew Presbyterian Church affirms the worth and dignity of all people. We are all created by God in God's image, and God found all of creation to be good. Just as Jesus welcomed everyone into fellowship, especially those marginalized by society, we welcome all people to our congregation regardless of race, ethnicity, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, physical or mental ability, socioeconomic status, marital status, family structure, country of origin, or immigration status. All are welcome to participate fully in the life of St. Andrew: worship, service, baptism, communion, membership, ministry, and leadership. We recognize that the Christian church has historically condemned and excluded LGBTQ+ persons from the community of faith, and we assert that such actions are incompatible with the gospel of Jesus. We also acknowledge, and deeply regret, that St. Andrew Presbyterian's actions have at times caused harm to our relationships with members of the LGBTQ+ community, including members of our own congregation. As we continue to grow as a congregation and discern our path forward in God's love and grace, we seek to rectify these past wrongs and pursue justice for those who have been and continue to be oppressed. We commit to continue to learn and work toward ensuring that St. Andrew is a safe place where all people are welcomed and loved.



HOW GOD SHOWS UP

This year, I come to this story with deep reverence for the complexity and beauty of childbirth. At the time of creating this art, I am about 6 weeks away from giving birth to my first child—who will be born in the same hospital where my mom died from cancer 20 years ago. My daughter will take her first breath in the same place where I heard my mother's last exhale. Much of my pregnancy has been a journey of healing—of inviting joy into the house where my grief lives, of preparing to become a mother as a motherless child. The more I learn of others' experiences around birth, I realize how closely joy and grief can coexist in each of our stories.³

And so, as I return to Jesus' birth story, my imagination leads me to wonder about how Mary experienced both grief and joy. Apart from Elizabeth, did she have support throughout her pregnancy? Was her own mother involved? Did she have generational trauma she needed to grieve? Did the stress of their travels to Bethlehem cause her labor to happen sooner than expected? As she labored, did a midwife come? Was she afraid?

In this image, as if looking past a curtain, we peer into this threshold moment when excruciating pain gives way to ecstatic joy as Mary draws her baby to her chest and he takes his first breath. As Mary holds her baby, additional hands reach in to support them both. Maybe these are the hands of strangers, of Joseph, or of a midwife who was summoned. Perhaps they are simply the hands of angels.

Each year, we tell this story because it is raw with joy, pain, and the complexities of being human. No matter how your story is unfolding, may you find that this sacred story holds space for you. For this is how God shows up—in a child who cries, in hands that hold, in human flesh, in life and in death.
