2 LIGHTS! CAMERA! ... SERMON! ST. ANDREW @ THE MOVIES

Summer is often a season of transitions, new rhythms, and shared stories. This year, we're diving into a sermon series that invites us to look at our faith, our relationships, and our world through a slightly different lens: the silver screen.

Beginning Sunday, July 12, we're launching **St. Andrew @ the Movies**.

Jesus rarely taught with abstract ideas. Instead, he told stories. He pointed to seeds, vineyards, fishing boats, and wayward sons, inviting people to see familiar things in a new light. Stories still have that kind of power. They help us wrestle with life's biggest questions and discover truth in unexpected places.

Our theme this summer is **Transformation Through Community**.

We often imagine transformation as something that happens on our own. But throughout Scripture, God forms people through relationships: sinners who learn humility, communities that share what they have, bodies made of many different members, neighbors who help carry one another's burdens, messengers sent with good news, friends who help rebuild what grief has broken, and weary people invited into rest. Again and again, God changes us by bringing us together.

That's the thread we'll follow through these films.

Along the way, we'll wrestle with questions like:

- Do these stories convince us of a *lie*, or do they resonate with something *profoundly true*?
- What does it mean to have millions of connections but still long for a friend?
- How do we discover who we are by giving ourselves away to others?

We'll explore those questions through *Wake Up, Dead Man* (July 12), *The Social Network* (July 19, with Matt Moore), *Project Hail Mary* (July 26), *CODA* (August 2), *Toy Story 5* (August 9, with Pastor Colette Soult), *We Bought a Zoo* (August 16), and *Barbie* (August 23).

Some of these movies will make us laugh. Others may surprise us or challenge us. That's okay. Faith has never been afraid of good questions. In fact, some of Jesus' best teaching began not with answers, but with stories that invited people to imagine a different way of living together.

If you'd like, watch each week's movie beforehand. We'll let you know where it's streaming, or you can check the local library. But there's no homework. Every sermon will stand on its own whether you've seen the film a hundred times or never heard of it.

My hope is that this series will be more than a fun way to spend the summer. I hope it reminds us that God rarely transforms us in isolation. It's through the messy, beautiful, and sometimes unexpected communities we find ourselves in that we're truly changed. Many of you have experienced that here at Saint Andrew. This community has shaped your faith, challenged your assumptions, carried your burdens, and celebrated your joys.

So grab some popcorn, invite a friend, open your heart, and join us as we discover how God is still using stories to transform lives and communities.

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BRINGING A LITTLE ST. ANDREW TO SOMEONE THIS SUMMER

Summer is here. The days are longer. The weather is warmer. Many of us are off on vacations, road trips, and outdoor adventures.

While our calendars fill up, many in our church family remain right where they are. For our homebound members and those living in retirement or health care communities, summer can actually feel like one of the loneliest seasons of the year. As the rest of the world speeds up and heads outside, their days often stay much the same.

Over the years, I have learned that a simple, friendly face can completely change someone's week. Those who are less able to travel deeply miss the fellowship of our congregation. They miss seeing familiar faces in worship, catching up over coffee, and feeling connected to the life of the church. This summer, we have a wonderful opportunity to bring a little bit of St. Andrew to them.

You do not need a lot of time or money to make a meaningful impact. Here are four simple ways you can share God's love and connection:

- Drop by for a visit. A short conversation can brighten a day. Share church news, bring flowers from your garden, or simply enjoy some time together.
- Extend a lunch invitation. If they are able to get out, take them to lunch. If not, bring a meal and enjoy it together where they live.
- Pick up the phone. A brief phone call can break up a quiet day and remind someone they have not been forgotten.
- Write a handwritten note. Send a postcard from your travels or a simple card letting someone know you are thinking about them and praying for them.

In Ephesians 4:16, Paul reminds us that the whole body is "joined and held together by every supporting ligament" and "builds itself up in love, as each part does its work." When we reach out to one another through a visit, a phone call, or a simple note, we are living into that calling.

Have you missed seeing someone in worship lately? At a Bible study, small group, Senior Moments gathering, choir rehearsal, or another church activity? This may be the perfect time to check in, find out how they are doing, and let them know they are missed.

One of the ways St. Andrew seeks to care for members during seasons of illness, limited mobility, or transition is through our Caring Friends Team. We are actively working to strengthen this ministry of visitation, encouragement, and connection. Whether you feel called to make an occasional visit, send cards, make phone calls, or simply learn more about the ministry, there is a place for you.

We also occasionally gather for communion and brief worship services in retirement and health care communities throughout the area. These visits offer residents an opportunity to worship, pray, sing, and share the Lord's Supper together. If you would like to join us for one of these community worship experiences, please let me know. And if you live in a retirement or care community that might welcome such a visit, I would be grateful to hear from you.

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4 PASS OUT LUNCHESES, PULL SOME WEEDS, & HELP CHANGE THE WORLD

Summer is a busy time at St. Andrew, and many of our mission ministries continue creating opportunities to serve, connect, and welcome our neighbors.

Our **Food Market** continues serving people on the fourth Wednesday of each month. We are always happy to welcome new volunteers, including those who may have more time to serve during the summer. We are continuously grateful for everyone who helps make the Food Market possible, whether you see them serving on market day or working behind the scenes to make sure everything runs smoothly.

Our **Summer Lunch Bunch Program** has now spent more than a month serving children at the Pheasant Ridge Neighborhood Center. The weather has not kept our volunteers away, as long as there is no lightning! **Kim Kipp**, our coordinator, has done an excellent job organizing the program, directing volunteers, and planning each day's menu. Each lunch provides more than food. It offers another opportunity to build relationships, welcome our neighbors, and remind children they are part of a community that cares about them.

Our next **Team Guatemala** leaves July 25 and is collecting supplies for the **Happy Tummies** program of **Impacto Ministry**. Requested school supplies include composition notebooks; red, blue, and black pens; pencils; handheld pencil sharpeners; pencil-top erasers; colored pencils; markers; crayons; and watercolor paints. The team is also collecting children's clothing and shoes in sizes 3T through 12/14, including closed-toe shoes such as Crocs, socks, T-shirts, and shorts, along with small jars of peanut butter. Donations may be placed in the marked donation bin beneath the Church in Action wall.

We are also collecting supplies for **Ready Set School**, a collaborative program serving K-12 students in Johnson and Washington counties. St. Andrew is collecting highlighters, glue sticks, and composition notebooks. Look for the marked collection bin throughout this month.

There are also opportunities to get outside and get your hands dirty at **Fields of Faith** in Oxford. Last month, our volunteers harvested more than 250 pounds of produce. We will be going out again on Aug. 15 and Oct. 10. Depending on the season, we may be planting, weeding, or harvesting. Workdays are typically held from 8-10:30 a.m.; watch for details as each date approaches.

Mark your calendars for **6 p.m. Sept. 1** for a special evening gathering together those who volunteer with or support St. Andrew's food ministries. These ministries involve many people serving in many different ways, and this will be an opportunity to celebrate what we have accomplished together and continue building connections across our mission community.

Sometimes the many good things happening at St. Andrew are easy to miss. Yet every meal served, school supply donated, weed pulled, shelf stocked, and relationship formed becomes part of a larger story. There are many ways to participate, and there is always room for another person to join us.

6 STUDENT MINISTRY: WHAT'S WITH ALL THE 'TABLE' IMAGERY?

It's been a bit since Student Ministry has highlighted **At the Table** and **Flipping Tables**. Sometimes it feels like St. Andrew has so much going on, it is easy to miss all the good things happening. With that in mind, I would like to extend an invitation to both At the Table and Flipping Tables.

Flipping Tables is St. Andrew's post-high school ministry, open to anyone who has graduated from high school, attends college or graduate school, is working, or is just starting a career. "Young" can do a bit of heavy lifting in church circles, as some people still consider me a young person!

Flipping Tables meets Thursday nights from 7-8:30 p.m. downstairs in the Hub for community, discipleship, Bible study, and conversation. Typically, we study the Bible or read a book together over a couple of months. Don't let that be a barrier to participation. You can show up without having read anything and you won't miss out. All discussions are focused on the passages and themes we read together.

Our group seeks to engage with people where they are, ask honest questions, listen to different experiences, and make sure all are welcome. There is no magic formula for connecting people to the church. It remains the hard work of building relationships, valuing people, creating community, and maintaining those connections.

At the Table is an alternative worship service that grew out of Flipping Tables. It can be confusing with all the "table" language, but hopefully it makes for good brand recognition.

At the Table meets on the first Thursday of each month from 7-8 p.m. in The Hub. All friends of the congregation are invited to participate as we celebrate stories and lives impacted by faith.

Each month, a member of the congregation or wider community is invited to be our storyteller and share ways God has been present or faithful in their life. This could be done through a long-form story, a series of shorter stories, or other creative ways relatable to others. The hope of At the Table is to highlight we all have stories from our lives where we have experienced God and to provide chances to share those stories with one another.

Looking ahead, **Michael Tilley** will share his story on Aug. 6, followed by **Emily Neddemeyer** on Sept. 3 and **Wendy Lindberg** on Nov. 5. We also invite different musicians to lead us in worship each month, so there are many ways to participate.

If you would like to be a storyteller, you don't need to be a professional speaker, have a dramatic story, or know exactly how you want to share it. We are always looking for people willing to tell their stories, offer music, or participate in other creative ways.

Whether this is your first or hundredth time hearing about Flipping Tables or At the Table, you are invited, you are welcome, and we hope to see you soon! These connections may not always be visible on Sunday mornings, but they are happening, and they make me excited about the future God has in store for St. Andrew.

Join us on the **first Friday of August, September, and October**. Our Aug. 7 dinner features the flavors of Afghanistan. A suggested donation of \$15-20 per person goes directly to the featured chef to cover food costs and support their culinary enterprise.

8 COLD WATER, WARM HEARTS, AND FAITH UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Sometimes showing God's love begins with something as simple as a cup of cold water.

That was the image we heard last month: "And if anyone gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones because he is my disciple, truly I tell you, he will never lose his reward" (Matthew 10:42).

It reminded me of a vacation I took with my dad more than 30 years ago. We went camping in South Dakota and spent our days biking the gravel trails around Mount Rushmore. One day, we saw a family on the side of the trail. The first time we passed them, I thought nothing of it. The second time, I noticed something was wrong.

My dad stopped and asked if they needed help. The family had been riding for a long time and had run out of water. They had paid for food and water to be dropped off along the trail, but it wasn't there. Without thinking twice, my dad and I went to the closest gas station and returned with snacks and water.

I'm sure you have examples from your own life of times when you helped someone in need. Sometimes teaching this lesson to our children can be tricky. Whenever my son had extra money for the concession stand, he always bought loads of candy for his friends, never returning with the change. Is this the same thing? Was he helping those in need? Maybe in his eyes.

But children also learn by watching the adults around them. They notice when we see a problem and decide to do something. They learn from the cups of cold water we offer, both literally and figuratively.

I saw plenty of that during "Faith Under Construction," St. Andrew's 2026 Vacation Bible School theme. While VBS has come to an end, unlike the seemingly endless road construction around town and on Highway 218, I remain thankful for the amazing volunteers who showed up every day, saw what needed to be done, and got to work.

Crew leaders **Paul Penn** and **Emily Neddermeyer** marched, flew, danced, and skipped to each activity. **Laurel Crusinberry** helped children explore nature through worms, mud, plants, and rocks. **Michelle DeGroot** and **Jamie Tanas** constructed science experiences; **Taylor Dengler** and **Paula McCue** connected art and construction; and **Mary Roffman** and **Nicole Berry** prepared yummy snacks.

Many of our mini construction crew were apprehensive on Monday, but by Wednesday they were leading the "Hippo" song and creating a mock city in art. We were happy to welcome children who were new to St. Andrew and watch them make connections with our church family. A huge shout-out to **Nichole Hoffman**, **Sara Penn**, and **Thomas Hartley** for making it all possible.

Teaching our children to give to those around them is important. We want them to know that when we give, we are showing God's love. Brainstorm with your children about ways they can do that: holding a door for someone, waving at someone in traffic, or saying "Good afternoon" to the cashier at the grocery store.

The gesture doesn't have to be grand. Sometimes it is noticing someone on the side of the trail. Sometimes it is showing up for a week of VBS. Sometimes it really is just a cup of cold water.

10 A SEASON OF LEARNING, MAKING MUSIC, & BRINGING IDEAS HOME

Summer is a time for planning, learning, and rejuvenation for the music ministry staff. Conferences that **Julia Van Den Top**, **Laura Kastens**, and I attend help recharge our batteries and give us inspirational ideas to use at St. Andrew. They also give us opportunities to learn from others, share what we have learned here, and return with new energy for the ministry we share.

- Three members of our **Resound!** handbell choir — **Laura**, **Dick Crusinberry**, and **Beth Hill** — recently attended the **Handbell Musicians of America Area 8 Festival** in La Vista, Nebraska. During the three-day festival, ringers from five states worked with two clinicians to rehearse and present a Saturday afternoon concert.

Beth was selected for the elite choir, which rehearsed before the festival and performed during Thursday evening's opening dinner. Class sessions covered handbell maintenance and history, techniques for bells and chimes, rehearsal strategies, and new music.

Dick and Laura both serve on the Area 8 Board, Dick as state chair and Laura as secretary. The next festival will be held a little closer to home, in Cedar Falls in 2028.

- From June 28 through July 3, I attended Week 2 of the **Music and Worship Conference** in western North Carolina, joining 650 adults, children, and youth. Sponsored by the Presbyterian Association of Musicians, this nationally renowned conference has inspired attendees to positively impact congregations across the United States for more than 50 years.

Pat Penn attended Week 1. Julia joined me during Week 2, made possible through a scholarship from the Presbyterian Association of Musicians and assistance from St. Andrew.

I also taught a class on creating alternative worship services, highlighting the Maundy Thursday services we've held in the Atrium, our annual child-led service, and At the Table. Twenty-five people attended and asked excellent questions.

It was gratifying to share ideas that have grown out of our worship life at St. Andrew. I also came home with ideas I plan to implement in worship during the weeks and months ahead. Stay tuned for information on how you can attend in 2027.

- **The Conference on Worship, Theology, and the Arts** is one I've attended several times, and it has always provided professional development, spiritual nourishment, renewal, and tested ideas that can be implemented at St. Andrew.

Lay people, church musicians, pastors, and other church leaders participate, creating a time for sharing and learning. I'll also sing in the conference choir under the direction of St. Olaf Choir conductor Anton Armstrong and ring in the conference handbell choir under the direction of Jill Mahr.

- At **Synod School**, I will join several St. Andrew members and hundreds of other participants for a week of worship, study, play, creativity, music, and life together. Sponsored by the Synod of Lakes and Prairies of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), it brings together lay people, clergy, individuals, and families from across the country.

These gatherings may take us away from St. Andrew for a little while, but the goal is always to bring something home: a new song, a new idea, a different approach, or renewed energy for the work ahead.

ACT JUSTLY TEAM: SUMMER READING FOR REFLECTION & GROWTH 11

In recent months, the Act Justly Team has highlighted individual books from St. Andrew's library that explore issues of justice, inclusion, and faith. This summer, we're taking a different approach by featuring collections of books around particular topics and inviting you to spend some time learning, reflecting, and growing.

June: Faith and LGBTQIA+ Inclusion

June is recognized as Pride Month, a time to celebrate LGBTQIA+ people and to acknowledge the ways they have often been marginalized, including within the church. As a congregation, St. Andrew has committed itself to becoming a more welcoming and inclusive community, and many members will again participate in the Iowa City Pride Parade this month.

One way to deepen our understanding is through reading. Our library includes several thoughtful books that represent a variety of perspectives and experiences:

- **Colby Martin, *UnClobber*:** A fresh look at the six biblical passages most often cited in discussions of homosexuality and how they have been interpreted.
- **Jeff Chu, *Does Jesus Really Love Me?*:** A moving spiritual journey through the complex landscape of faith and LGBTQIA+ identity in America.
- **Ken Wilson, *A Letter to My Congregation*:** Written by a pastor whose congregation wrestled with questions of inclusion and belonging.
- **Matthew Vines, *God and the Gay Christian*:** An exploration of how affirming same-sex relationships can be understood within a traditional Christian commitment to Scripture.

Whether you are revisiting a familiar topic or exploring it for the first time, these books offer opportunities for thoughtful engagement and faithful conversation.

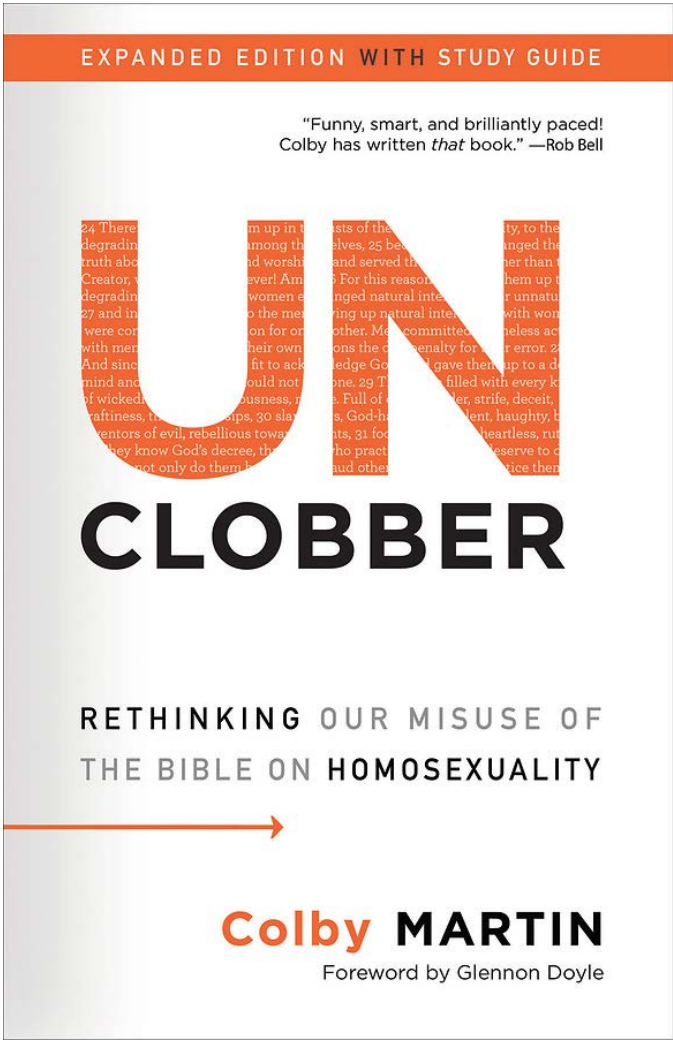
July: Disability and the Life of the Church

Learning from the experiences of people with disabilities can help us become a more welcoming and accessible community.

- **Amy Kenny, *My Body Is Not a Prayer Request*:** A powerful call to disability justice within the church.
- **Ronald C. Vredevel, *Expressing Faith in Jesus*:** Practical guidance for supporting people with intellectual disabilities as full participants in the life of faith.
- **Barbara J. Newman, *Helping Kids Include Kids with Disabilities*:** Helpful insights for parents, teachers, and church leaders.
- **James Evans, *Uncommon Gifts*:** A personal story of learning disabilities, faith, and discovering unexpected strengths.
- **Robert F. Molsberry, *Blinded by Grace*:** Reflections on ministry, and disability following a life-changing accident.

The St. Andrew Library offers more than books; it offers opportunities to listen, learn, and encounter perspectives that may be different from our own. As you make your summer reading plans, consider checking out one of these titles and joining the ongoing work of seeking justice, loving kindness, and walking humbly with God.
