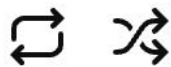

## 4 AT ST. ANDREW, SUMMER IS AN ACTIVE, MISSION-FILLED SEASON

As the school year winds down and summer begins to peek around the corner, St. Andrew is heading into one of its busiest and most service-filled seasons of the year. From mission partnerships and community events to gardens, camps, concerts, and lunches, there are many ways to connect, serve, and care for one another in the months ahead.

Our **Mission, Outreach, and Service** partners have several special events coming up.

**NAMIWalks Iowa** took place earlier this month, with St. Andrew members walking and supporting mental health awareness and advocacy. (See the photo on this page.) The **Minds Matter** team was also present to help share information about St. Andrew's growing mental health ministries and our upcoming Mental Health Resource Fair planned for November. If you have a passion for mental health advocacy, support, or education, we would love to help you get connected.

**Camp Bear Creek** continues to grow as both a mission partner and a place of restoration and hospitality. This spring, volunteers helped prepare the grounds for another season of retreats, outdoor ministry, and environmental learning. If you have not visited recently, take time this summer to walk the trails, explore the orchard and gardens, or cross the new connecting bridge on the property. It is a peaceful place to pray, breathe, and reconnect with God through creation.

Closer to home, St. Andrew's summer ministries are already beginning to take shape. The **Summer Lunch Bunch** and the **Free Lunch Program** will once again provide meals, activities, and relationships for local children throughout the summer months. You will also hear more in the coming weeks about opportunities to volunteer at the St. Andrew Food Market, serve with **Vacation Bible School**, or support our **Matthew 25** ministries in practical ways.

Our partnership with **Fields of Faith** continues to provide fresh produce both for the St. Andrew Food Market and for food pantries across the region. St. Andrew members will help with harvest days on June 27, August 15, and October 10. These are usually morning events and are a wonderful opportunity for families, youth groups, and anyone who enjoys getting their hands dirty for a good cause. Fields of Faith is also looking for "Weed Warriors" throughout the growing season. If you enjoy gardening or know students looking for Silver Cord service hours, information can be found at the Information Kiosk.

Speaking of the kiosk: many people are familiar with the information table that appears on Sunday mornings, but don't forget about the community bulletin board downstairs in the lower level of the church. It is regularly updated with flyers, volunteer opportunities, concerts, community events, mission information, and happenings from partner organizations and neighboring congregations. It is worth checking from time to time, especially as summer activities ramp up.

Finally, I recently received information from CIEE, a nonprofit organization seeking local host families for three international students during the 2026–2027 school year. If you are interested in learning more about hosting opportunities, please reach out to me and I will gladly share the information.

# THREE 'FIELDS OF FAITH' HARVEST DAYS SCHEDULED FOR 2026 5

This year, St. Andrew will once again partner with Fields of Faith Farm near Oxford by helping staff three harvest days during the growing season:

- Saturday, June 27
- Saturday, August 15
- Saturday, October 10

Please put these dates on your calendar now. We'll share exact harvest times as the days get closer, but expect a few morning hours of outdoor work, fellowship, and muddy shoes together.

Fields of Faith is a local nonprofit farm dedicated to growing and donating fresh produce to area churches, food banks, and community organizations throughout Eastern Iowa. The farm donates tens of thousands of pounds of produce annually to help local food ministries, including St. Andrew's Food Market.

All friends and members of St. Andrew are invited to join us at Fields of Faith Farm (2554 Cemetery Rd. NW, Oxford) for harvesting, planting, weeding, and whatever else the season requires. No experience is necessary — just bring gloves, clothes you don't mind getting dirty, and a willingness to pitch in alongside others from the congregation.

These mornings have become more than simple volunteer projects. They are a chance to work side by side, enjoy the beauty of an Iowa summer morning, and participate in something tangible and hopeful together. Every bucket filled and every row weeded helps provide fresh vegetables for neighbors across our wider community.

## 6 TRANSITIONS ARE HARD: EVEN WHEN THEY'RE PLANNED

Perhaps the most hilarious moment of my teaching career came not because of something a student had done, but because of an adult! In my classroom, I use a doorbell (a receiver plugged into an outlet and the button in my hand). From day one, my students learn that it's a transition signal, one where they are to "stop, look, and listen" for the teacher's direction so we can move into the next activity.

Well, one day a teacher was modeling a lesson in my room, and my crew was being particularly rowdy. So, in the middle of the lesson, I rang the doorbell ... and comedy ensued. I watched as nineteen sets of eyes turned toward me, while the guest teacher's eyes turned toward the door! There's nothing quite like trying to reprimand your students through stifled laughter.

It was a moment where my students were ready for the transition, but the adult in the room was not, and that got me thinking: How many of us feel unprepared for transitions?

Transitions come in many forms. The transition of seasons can be planned for, but often agonized over. Turning the calendar from April to May can mean staring at an onslaught of activities and wondering how we're going to fit in all the weeknight sports, lessons, and rehearsals, only to find the weekends filled with competitions, performances, tournaments, and more. When will it ever stop?

Then there's the transition from the school year to summer vacation, bringing a whole new set of challenges. How can I fill my family's calendar so that fun is had and family members are cared for? Can I afford childcare and summer camps? Where will our meals come from now that we cannot count on school breakfast and lunch each day?

Transitions are hard, even when they're planned. And sometimes we don't get the chance to plan at all.

Children's and Family Ministry at St. Andrew is diving headfirst into a season of transition this summer. *On July 1, I will step away from the role of Director of Children's and Family Ministry.* While this may be a planned transition, I fully recognize the uncertainty people can feel in moments like these.

In my own life, I'll also be transitioning into fatherhood this summer, as Lauren and I await the arrival of our baby girl in August. It can feel like a lot, and it takes daily remembrance of Christ's words from Matthew 6:34: "Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own."

So instead of worrying about transitions, I want to propose a new plan for St. Andrew CFM: celebrate!

Let's begin with **VBS 2026: Faith Under Construction** for students entering Kindergarten through 5th grade in Fall 2026. Join us for storytelling, games, snacks, science experiments, nature exploration, arts and crafts, and much more! The registration fee is \$10 if paid by May 31 and \$25 after May 31. Families do not need to be members of St. Andrew to attend — all are welcome! To learn more, visit <https://tinyurl.com/sapc-vbs-2026>.

And if you're beyond the VBS age range, come volunteer with us. We would love your help as we build up the faith of our kiddos together.

Or maybe you'll celebrate our Matthew 25 mission by serving at Lunch Bunch, the Free Lunch Program, or the St. Andrew Food Market, helping ease the summer transition for some of the most vulnerable in our community.

Whatever you decide to do this summer, I hope you'll choose celebration over stress when it comes to transitions. And maybe, from now on, every time you hear a doorbell, you'll laugh a little too.

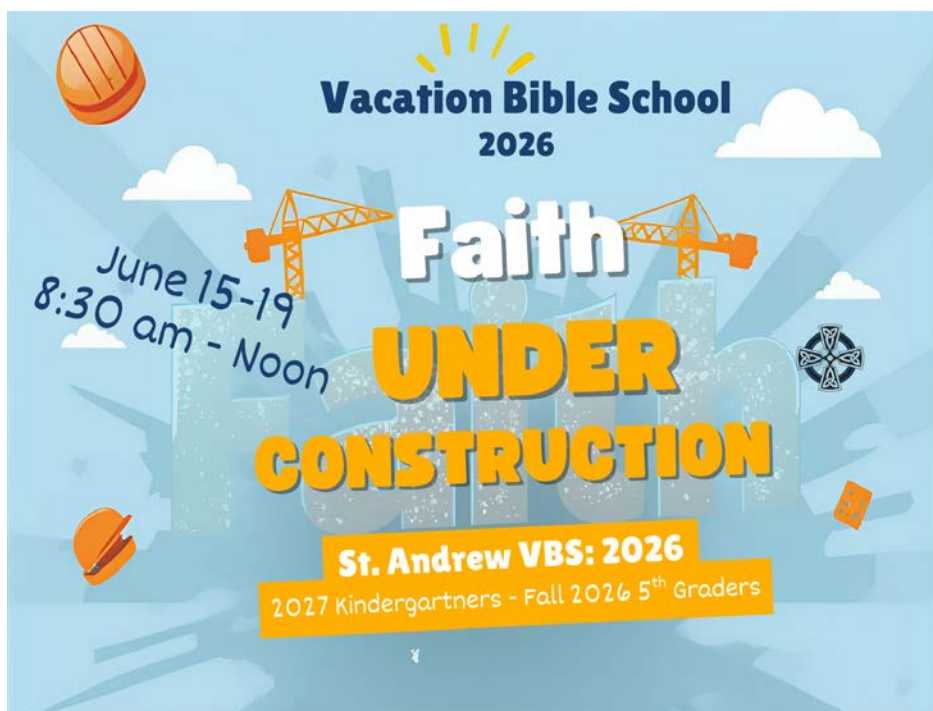

## 8 SINGING TRUTH TO POWER: RESISTING CHRISTIAN NATIONALISM

On May 5, a few members of St. Andrew and I tuned into an excellent webinar on hymns that resist Christian Nationalism. The webinar explored how the music we sing in worship helps form faith and highlighted hymns that push back against Christian Nationalism. It was sponsored by the Clergy Emergency League, which seeks to reclaim Scripture from right-wing fundamentalism, counter disinformation and cult mentality, and dismantle racism. The presenters were **Carolyn Winfrey Gillette** and **Stephen Fearing**, both pastors and hymn writers whose texts we have sung several times at St. Andrew.

The presenters asked important questions, including: "What kind of disciples are our hymns training us to be? People who fear strangers, or people who love their neighbors?" They highlighted Philippians 2:4–11 as a contrast to Christian Nationalism. Through that lens, hymns that resist Christian Nationalism tend to:

- Demonstrate humility and self-emptying love
- Avoid seizing power over others
- Encourage us to look to the interests of others
- Emphasize Christ giving himself away in love

By contrast, Christian Nationalism often blends grievance, dominance, and national power, emphasizing self-assertion and coming out on top.

During the second half of the webinar, the presenters shared examples of hymns that counter Christian Nationalism. Some were unfamiliar to me, while others are already part of our worship life at St. Andrew, including This Is My Song and Lift Every Voice and Sing. A few of the others mentioned will likely find their way into worship in the coming months.

### Inspiring Worship & Music Conference

From June 27-July 4, I will be attending the Music and Worship Conference in western North Carolina, sponsored by the Presbyterian Association of Musicians. If you can imagine a blend of retreat, camp, and continuing education set in a beautiful mountain setting, that begins to describe the experience. For more than 50 years, this nationally known conference has inspired church musicians, pastors, and worship leaders from across the country.

The conference takes place at Montreat Conference Center, about 30 minutes from Asheville. Nearly 1,500 adults, children, and youth attend one of two week-long sessions to worship, learn, make music, reconnect with friends, and build new relationships. Pat Penn will attend Week 1, and Julia Van Den Top will attend Week 2 with support from a scholarship provided by PAM.

Each year, I come home with practical ideas that positively shape worship at St. Andrew. We are excited for this year's conference and look forward to sharing what we learn.

Stay tuned for information about how members of St. Andrew might participate in 2027.

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There was a strange convergence of ideas for me recently. **Flipping Tables**, St. Andrew's post-high school ministry, had just finished reading Esther, and many of the book's themes felt uncomfortably relevant to our current political climate. Around the same time, our recent transitional pastor, Carl Anderson, reminded us that it is always the right time to do the right thing — even when doing so carries cost, risk, or fallout.

Esther finds herself in a similar situation. She has an opportunity to save her people from suffering, persecution, and death. But to do this requires her to risk her own life, reveal her identity to her husband, the king, and take a stand to protect the Jewish people. While things ultimately work out, she still has to take an extraordinary risk and trust that God will be faithful and protect both her and her people.

Esther is the only book in the Bible that never explicitly mentions God, which is something I have been pondering. The thought I keep returning to is that God is so central to the story that there is no need to mention the Divine. God is so obviously concerned with the plight of the people and the ways our lives intersect that it does not need to be spoken aloud.

The Bible and the Gospel are deeply concerned with the way we live together in community. Politics sits at the intersection of community and seeks to answer questions about how we will live together in society. Scripture has a great deal to say about that. It is not silent.

Where we sometimes get confused is in defining politics too narrowly, as only our country's political systems, parties, or specific policies. Scripture encourages us to think about how all these things intersect, but always within a larger picture. If we are all created in the image of the Divine, how then are we called to live and care for one another?

In this way, the Bible is political, but not partisan. It does not take sides so much as it takes a stance: that all people are worthy of being treated like neighbors, not enemies. This is the place Esther steps into, willing to say, "I will risk my life for something bigger than myself. I will live for others first."

As we enter another season of transition, I invite you to consider with me all the ways we can be like Esther. All the ways we can make a difference, take a risk, and put others before ourselves — especially when it is scary.

God calls us to live in a new way: to rise above conflict while remaining deeply focused on what it means to be human. To care deeply enough for one another that it changes who we are, how we love, and how we live.

For the next few weeks, St. Andrew's Tuesday Morning Men's Bible Study will be exploring two books on the Holy Spirit:

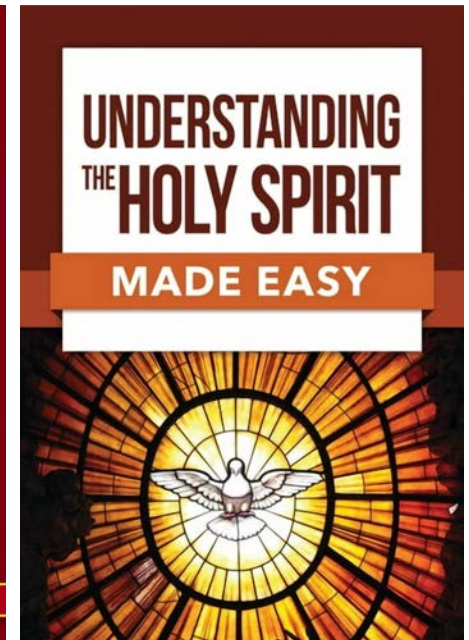
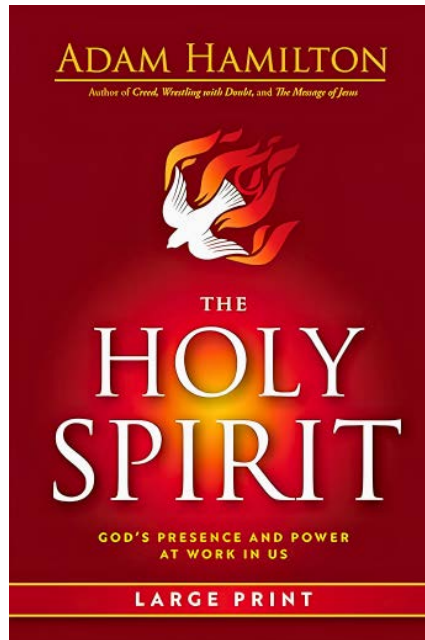
- Adam Hamilton's *The Holy Spirit: God's Presence and Power at Work in Us*, and

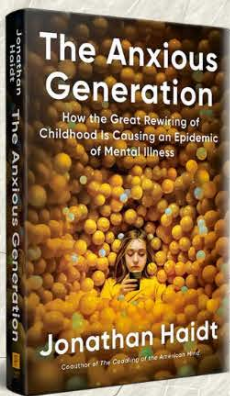
The group meets weekly on Tuesdays from 7:30-8:45 a.m. for breakfast, Bible study, conversation, and plenty of honest questions along the way.

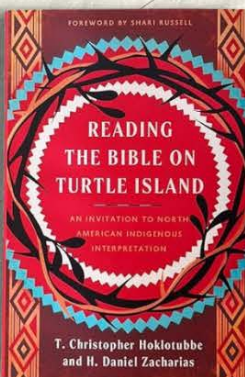
# Summer 2026 Reading List
