2 LOOKING BEYOND, FINDING JOY, & KNOWING OUR DIVINE PURPOSE

"To infinity! And beyond!"

This programmed mindset shaped *Toy Story*'s Buzz Lightyear. The problem is that he arrived ready for a space odyssey, not for being a companion to a young boy.

Spoiler alert (if you haven't seen the movie, it's over 30 years old, I don't feel too bad spoiling...): Buzz Lightyear learns to reimagine his place in the universe and finds true joy and purpose in being Andy's toy.

It doesn't feel like too much of a leap to suggest that many of us find ourselves identifying with Buzz. We have oriented much of our lives around a particular set of values, beliefs, expectations, norms, rules, and the list goes on. Simply put, there is just a way things are supposed to be. Any disruption to this way, and begin to feel like our world is falling apart. We want to know how to belong, but something feels amiss.

Jeff Charis-Carlson often gets a little nervous whenever I ask him "How have we done this in the past?" He kindly reminds me that the way something was done in the past doesn't mean that's the way it has to be ... before telling me the St. Andrew way. And even then, "the St. Andrew way" usually includes a variety of different options. The Spirit continues to animate our congregation in fresh and emerging ways.

Sisters Vivian, Lydia, and Vera Tanas—daughters of Munir and Jamie Tanas—were baptized on August 3, 2025. The sacrament reminds us how, even in seasons of transition, God calls us to look beyond the present toward lives shaped by grace, promise, and new beginnings.

So, much like Buzz, we listen to the friends around us, opening our eyes to a reality much more expansive than the one we were handed. We allow our hearts to be moved by the Divine's stirring in those around us. There comes for us a moment when the mantras we were given take on new meaning; we don't (necessarily) need to abandon where we have been for us to go where we are being led.

Then, just like Buzz, may we find ourselves having reimagined our place in the universe, finding true joy, and knowing our Divine purpose.

A few tidbits:

- During All Saints Sunday, Nov. 2, we will be trying something a little different. You won't need to bring items to worship this year; we are reframing how we honor and recognize those who have passed. More details will be shared as we get closer.
- A note of gratitude as we move from one stewardship ask into another. St. Andrew faithfully gives and your generosity will be an incredible gift to your next pastor. Please be in prayer for Session, Staff, and Teams as they discern the Spirit's prompting for next year. I know it feels like we ask a lot, and your generosity makes so much possible!
- This year for Advent we are exploring a congregation-wide art project to help decorate the sanctuary. We've identified an exciting way to utilize stars as a part of our seasonal decorations and need some folks to help lead the charge. THROUGH TRANSITION AND BEYOND: NEW THEMES FOR ST. ANDREW $_{ m 3}$

I've been feeling a bit of monotony when it comes to selecting themes for St. Andrew's monthly Messengers. Regardless of the season—Fall, Advent, Lent, Summer—the overwhelming theme for at least a decade has been ... transition.

It has felt like we are always in-between: moving into a new building, navigating a pandemic, searching for a new pastor, and then searching again when illness altered our plans. We make it through the wilderness to a new land, but never feel we've fully arrived. Always sensing we are yet again "on the way" to somewhere else.

So I've been searching for a broader theme. Not just transition, but what lies *beyond* it.

And that's the word that keeps coming back to me: beyond.

Matt Moore used the word in describing the Sunday morning class he's co-leading with Pastor Carl Anderson, "Faith Beyond Youth Group." It's about moving past the uncomplicated answers of childhood into a faith resilient enough for life's complexities.

Pastor Carl pressed further in his recent Learning Academy class, "Non-Dualistic Thinking," asking what happens when we move beyond the binaries that so often trap us: Apple or Android; Old Testament or New; Right or Left. Too often we're told we must choose one side or the other. But real life is not that simple.

Non-dualistic thinking invites us to live beyond the limited vision of two sides, to see not just opposites but the richness in-between. That's where God often shows up—not in the rigid categories we defend, but in the space that surprises us, unsettles us, even liberates us.

After all, as I've seen attributed to several writers lately, "It wouldn't be God unless you were totally mind blown."

So that's the theme of this Messenger: *Through Transition and Beyond!* Beyond anxiety, beyond simplistic answers, beyond the limits of our imagination, and beyond the divisions that threaten us.

That's what our Children's and Family Ministry Team has been teaching our children: how to look beyond fear and embrace the safety, fun, and surprise God has in store.

That's what our Music Ministry reminds us of as we prepare to say good-bye to Abby Chen and her family—remembering how once we never dared dream we would find an organist so perfectly suited to our congregation as Abby has been.

That's what our Stewardship Team has been encouraging as St. Andrew prepares to move beyond the debt that has shackled our giving (and our thinking) for the past decade. What new Mission, Outreach, and Service opportunities will arise when we no longer spend hundreds of thousands of dollars each year on a building loan?

And that's what we can start envisioning as our Pastor Nominating Committee, Personnel Team, and Session continue to search for our next pastor, our next organist, and more people to help care for our building and grounds.

Yes, St. Andrew remains in transition, but just as every season is always transforming into the next. And beyond that transition is something we can't yet imagine.

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4'FAITH BEYOND YOUTH GROUP': A NEW SUNDAY CLASS OFFERING

Lately I've been reflecting on how much student ministry has changed since I first started in 2012. Thirteen years may not seem like a long time, but in student ministry it feels like an age.

The pandemic certainly accelerated change, but even before then, the landscape was shifting. Students today are busier than ever. More demands, more expectations, more activities—all competing for their time. With so much on their plates, it can be difficult to make church or faith formation a priority.

This fall, Pastor Carl Anderson and I will be leading a Sunday School class we're calling *Faith Beyond Youth Group*, after a recent book of that title. Together, we'll explore ways students can actively engage with their faith, reflect on what practices truly help, and learn habits that endure well beyond high school. In a

world where anxiety and depression among teens are on the rise, the need for grounding, life-giving practices has never been greater.

We won't claim to have all the answers—there are no quick fixes to life's challenges, and faith itself is often a journey full of questions. But what we can offer is a safe place for honest conversation: a space to talk openly about priorities, faith, and the practices that can carry us into adulthood.

I'm excited for this conversation, and I hope parents and students alike will be too. I look forward to learning together and discovering how faith can grow deeper than youth group.

Confirmation Resumes This Fall



At St. Andrew, we are committed to creating space where students can ask questions, explore, and discover what faith means for them personally.

8'BOO!': LOOKING BEYOND FEAR TO FUN, SAFETY, AND SURPRISE

As I am sitting here writing, it is early September, and I'm still in the early stages of grieving summer. So, I say "Boo!" to summer ending—I'm showing my disapproval with this word.

But sometimes we hear "Boo!" when someone is trying to elicit fear. Fear is something many of us might be feeling right now. The daily news, the uncertainty of our world, and perhaps our personal life circumstances can all stir up fear in us. The word "Boo" can be frightening and startling. It can be an unwelcome word.

We, as a **Children's and Family Ministry Team**, want to assure you that we are doing our best to make St. Andrew a safe, welcoming, and comforting place for you and your family—not a fearful one. As you may already know, all staff, volunteer teachers,

and caregivers have been certified through the **Safe Gatherings** program, which trains us how to respond to child abuse, elder abuse, and best practices for care.

Through St. Andrew-specific policies, created by the **Child Protection Policy Team**, we have been trained on things like the two-adult rule, roving adult policy, what to do in the case of a same-family adult volunteer, and our check-in/check-out procedures. Additionally, the staff received training from the **lowa City Police Department** on how to respond in the case of a violent intruder in our building. We learned ways to make our doors more secure and created emergency routes for each classroom.

Thomas Hartley, Nichole Hoffman, and I are parents and teachers whose main passion lies in caring for the children under our own roof and in our daily lives, so we want you to know we take the protection of your children very seriously. Children's safety, health, and happiness are our top priorities. But learning and serving are right up there too, and that leads us to our last meaning of the word ...

"Boo!" can be said in fun! It can be surprising and exciting! And we have so many fun events in store for you and your family and friends.

First, our **Gifts of the Heart** school supply collection is going on until Oct. 1. Please leave supplies in the in the Atrium collection bins, or make a financial donation online: https://tinyurl.com/gifts-of-the-heart. Like last year, we plan to invite everyone to join us at 10 a.m. on Nov. 15 in the Pop-Up Ministry Room. We will pack school supplies in bags to prepare them to be sent to families across the country who find themselves displaced by natural disasters. And of course, she's right. My history with this church shaped me, and it lives richly in my memory. But that's the past.

around for a rainy day. Membership is one way to stop dating churches, and marrying one."









With hearts full of thanks, we celebrate the close of the pledge period for the Finish the Race | Owe Nothing But Love campaign. As of Sept. 14, the people of St. Andrew have promised \$1,723,135 toward our \$1.8 million goal—leaving less than \$80,000 between us and the joy of being debt-free.

This outpouring of generosity is a vivid sign of God's abundance at work among us. For 17 years and through five campaigns, you have given faithfully, sacrificially, and joyfully. Each gift—large or small—has been part of weaving a story of trust in God's provision and commitment to one another.

As we near the finish line, our gratitude only deepens. We thank God for your steadfastness and vision, and we thank you for making this dream possible. Together, we are not just paying off a loan; we are opening wide the future for ministry, mission, and welcome.
