Questions for Reflection

- Jesus says discipleship "will cost you everything." What barriers—social, physical, or spiritual—do we cling to because we fear the cost of tearing them down?
- The hymns call us to risk hostility, embrace difference, and learn from every body. Where have you resisted this call—choosing comfort over courage—and what would it look like to step into that risk today?
- If God's holiness is revealed in difference and limitation, how does that challenge our obsession with perfection, independence, and control? What would change if we believed weakness is sacred ground?
- We are sent out with both joy and unfinished work—ramps built, stigmas still lingering. What is one "light" you carry that could help dismantle a barrier this week? And who might be waiting for that light to shine in their direction?

Let us be bold, creative, thoughtful, empathetic, and faithful.


Let us rejoice, knowing there is yet more wisdom to learn on this journey of access.


