## Questions for Reflection

- Jeremiah calls the exiles to "build houses and plant gardens" in a foreign land. What does it mean for us, as modern Christians, to "settle in" and seek peace in a place that doesn't always feel like home?
- Today, we sing of God's justice and mercy. How do you hold together the tension of a God who "tries us by justice" yet "defers our guilt by grace"?








Today, Temple Hiatt will lead St. Andrew's Learning Academy class to introduce the Be SMART gunsafety framework and explore its role in our shared congregational witness. As a lead volunteer with Be SMART and an advocate in the PC(USA)'s national partnership, Temple will guide us in understanding how faith communities can take practical, compassionate steps to help prevent gun tragedies and promote safer homes.


Be SMART is a program of the Everytown for Gun Safety Support Fund, created to encourage responsible gun ownership and reduce child gun deaths through education and awareness. The campaign outlines five simple but powerful actions—Secure, Model, Ask, Recognize, Tell—that help normalize conversations about secure firearm storage, engage families and neighbors, and increase awareness of the role gun access plays in youth suicide.

Join us to gain clear tools, thoughtful questions, and meaningful language you can use in your home, church, and wider community—so that together we can help reduce avoidable harm and live more faithfully as peacemakers.



# The Krapf Organ: 54 years of Musical & Visual Inspiration

As we prepare for two upcoming organ concerts, we invite you to look at St. Andrew's Krapf Organ with new eyes—and perhaps a pencil in hand.

What do you see in this 53-year-old instrument? When you squint at its pipes and façade, does the console at the center become the face of a living being—with towers rising like wings or talons? Do you see something quieter: breath, spirit, a pulse of sound that animates our Sanctuary each week?

Formerly the Clapp Organ of the University of Iowa, this remarkable instrument survived the Flood of 2008 and found a new home with St. Andrew.

Dr. Abby Chen's farewell concert ("And Grace Will Lead Me Home," Oct. 27) and the American Guild of Organists' concert ("Come Hell or High Water," Nov. 8) will celebrate that story of grace and endurance.

In the weeks leading up to these concerts, we invite artists of all ages to sketch, paint, or otherwise depict the animating force they find within the Krapf Organ. Your creations will offer a visual reflection on an instrument—and a community—that continues to rise, sing, and persevere.
