• The Persistent Widow, by the Rev. James W. Hasse, S.J. (1934-2011), a Jesuit priest who served for more than forty years in African American parishes throughout the Midwest. Father Hasse earned bachelor's and master's degrees in philosophy and anthropology from St. Louis University, a Master of Fine Arts degree from the University of Notre Dame, and a Master of Divinity from Bellarmine School of Theology. In 2008, he received the Martin Luther King Jr. "Keep the Dream Alive" Award in recognition of his lifelong commitment to justice, community, and faith expressed through ministry and the arts.

Questions for Reflection

- As we sing, "Live into hope of captives freed, of sight regained, the end of greed," what would it mean for us to live into that hope beyond Sunday worship?
- Like the persistent widow, how might we keep seeking justice when the systems around us resist being changed?
- If God's law is written on our hearts, how do we let that inner covenant shape the way we confront greed and build just systems?
- As we sing that "the world is about to turn," what are the powers or patterns in our own lives that most need turning?
- How can our voices, our giving, and our daily choices echo the hymn writers' call to sight regained, captives freed, and justice set ablaze?

Gathering Hymn | "Live into Hope," pg. 7

The spiritual *Go Down Moses* is rooted in enslaved persons' conviction that they could be freed if those enslaved in Egypt could be freed. As in many spirituals, there is code language in the lyrics, with the South as the "land of Egypt" and Pharaoh signifying the slave owner. Just as God led the Israelites out of slavery from Egypt, enslaved persons under chattel slavery in the US had faith that God would lead them out of enslavement. It's a reminder that the spiritual is a powerful genre of music that centers around liberation, justice, and faith in God. — *Austen Wilson*






