In this Late Byzantine masterpiece from the Church of the Holy Savior in Chora—now the Kariye Mosque in Istanbul, Türkiye—Christ shatters the gates of hell and lifts Adam and Eve from their graves. Surrounded by prophets, kings, and saints, he stands radiant in a mandorla of light. - If heaven and earth are full of God's glory, as Duruflé's Sanctus proclaims, how might our everyday actions echo that same song?

^{*} Note on Today's Music: Today's music intersects with a lot of different themes. The text from the Sanctus from the Requiem by Maurice Duruflé is from the centuries old Communion liturgy. Early in Abby Chen's tenure at St. Andrew, I talked with her about Logos Choir singing this movement, as it is one of the most challenging organ parts in all of organ literature. While the Requiem is a larger work, this movement is very special, as the music depicts the angels singing "Holy, Holy, Holy" in heaven. The music builds and builds over exclamations of "Hosanna in the highest" with a climactic chord on "in excelsis," or "in the highest." It ends as it starts with the angels singing distantly in heaven. In addition, while we often remember saints who have passed on, there are still saints presently all around us. The Sending Hymn gives homage both to those who have passed as well as the saints alive today. – Austen Wilson

643 Now Thank We All Our God



Although this hymn is often used on large and festive occasions, its first two stanzas had much humbler beginnings: they originated as a family table prayer during the Thirty Years' War (1618–1648). These words have been associated with this tune since the mid-17th century.

731 Give Thanks for Those Whose Faith Is Firm



Guitar chords do not correspond with keyboard harmony.

The first three stanzas of this text are organized around the three great virtues—faith, hope, and love—mentioned in 1 Corinthians 13:13. These have indeed been the marks of the faithful people of God always and everywhere, and the final stanza sums up our gratitude for them.
